PUBLIC NOTICE

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO THE DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF TURKEY, TEXAS AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Turkey, Texas on the 19th day of December, 1972 on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said City, as follows, to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A

SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF TURKEY, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TURKEY:

Section 1: That a special election shall be held in and throughout the city of Turkey, Texas on the 19th day of December, 1972, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2: That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

CITY HALL
Elmer Lacy
Presiding Judge
Janice Wheeler
Alternate Presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two (2) clerks.

Section 3: That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Turkey, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4: That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's

Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5: That the election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6: That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said city, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the city not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the VALLEY TRIBUNE is a newspaper published within the City of Turkey, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said city.

(Your Editors received the following letter from Major Jasper A. Setliff, stationed in Vietnam, which we feel our readers will enjoy sharing with us.)

Dear Gaston:
If the military offers nothing else, it does provide a country boy with an opportunity to travel and see things that would otherwise be denied by circumstances. Have just finished one such opportunity and take this time to pass a few observations. The 16-20 Nov. was granted CTO (combat time off) and with Major H. H. Phillipus of San Antonio attended the annual elephant round-up at Surin, Thailand.

We flew Thai Airways to Ubon, then caught a train to Surin. We bought second class tickets but embarrassed the conductors by sitting in a third class car. (couldn't tell the difference.) The people were friendly so we didn't move. It was just as well, we met an English speaking Thai lady who was most surprised to see Americans on the narrow-gauge train. She asked where we were going and

Surin is a small town much like Nakhon Phanom (usually called NKP or Naked Fanny). There is one American type hotel and two or three Thai guest houses, all of the restaurants are open air or sidewalk type (requires adjustment but the food is good). All public transportation is by Samul (three wheeled bike with covered rumbleseat).

The night of November 16, we went to the fair and carnival, big affair with local schools and all organizations participating in some manner. We met a Thai veteran who had served with the Thai Volunteers in the Panther regiment in Vietnam. He outshot us both at the shooting gallery. The fair was considerably dampened by an inch or two of rain, that is for Hugh and me, but the locals just kept right on going except for the merchants trying to keep water off their wares.

Friday was elephant day in Surin. The arena was huge to accommodate 75 to 100 elephants, but otherwise, if the horns had just been higher on the head, could have been a Fourth of July rodeo in Texas. The events included races, games, obedience demonstrations, working—as in logging camps, etc., demonstrations of how

wild elephants are captured, and a parade of war elephants. Several other demonstrations of local customs.
Friday evening Hugh and I put some sunburn lotion on our faces, (just like July in Texas) and caught the train for Korat. We spent the night in Korat and went to Bangkok by bus Nov. 18. After two days in the big city, it was back to the war.

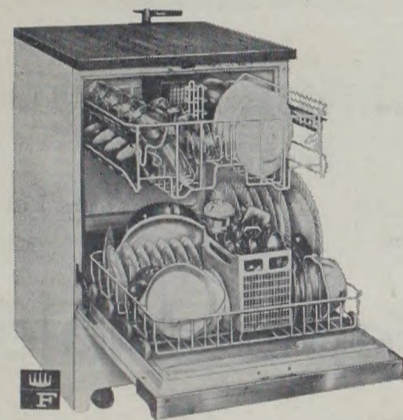
