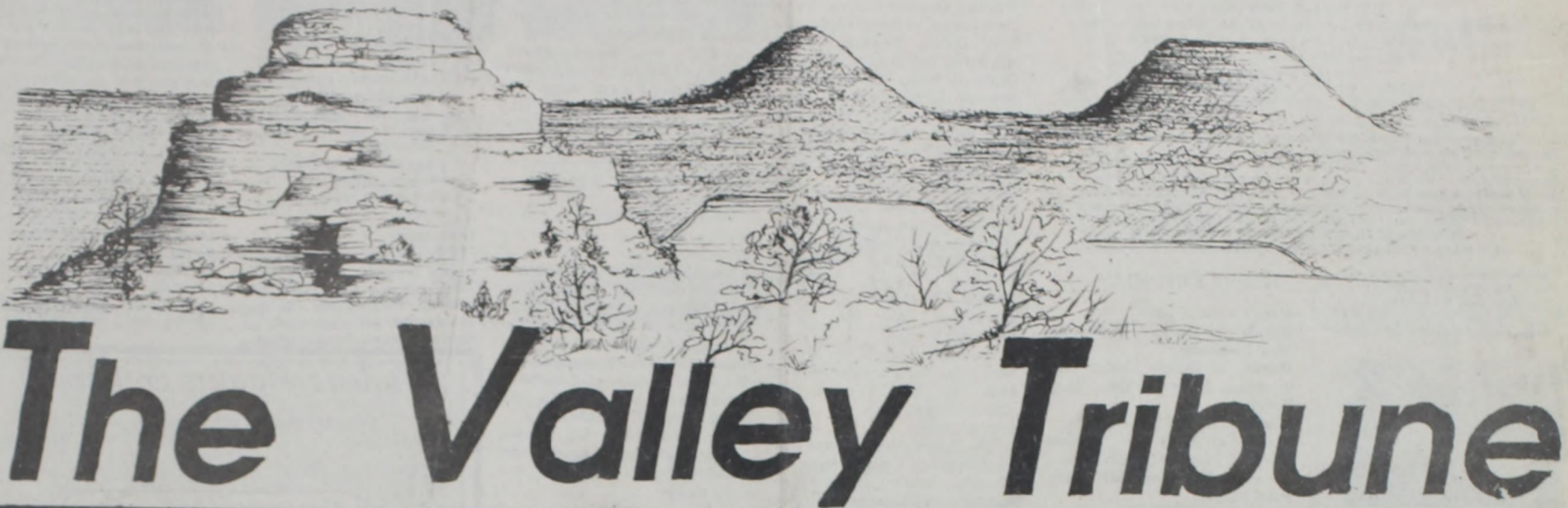

She thrilled audiences from coast to coast with her piano rendition of the "Ginastera: Sonata #1 Opus 22, 4th Movement".

Listed on the President's Distinguished Honor Roll at Baylor University, she was graduated in 1988 with a degree in communications.

Prior to being named Miss Texas 1989, Miss Lyle was employed as a research associate for the Texas Legislative Council in Austin.

As Miss Texas, she is appearing in major cities of

**Cooking Corner** Tips To Help You

**Mocha Mousse**

Packed with rich, luscious chocolate taste, it's hard to believe that this favorite contains as few as 52 calories per serving.

**Ingredients:**

- 3 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1 1/2 tablespoons instant coffee
- 2 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 2 cups skim milk
- 1 egg yolk, lightly beaten
- 6 packets non-nutritive sweetener
- 2 egg whites, at room temperature
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

**Directions:**

1. In a large bowl combine the cocoa powder, instant coffee, cornstarch, and milk until smooth. Microwave on high, uncovered, for 3 minutes, stir, then microwave 3 more minutes.

2. Fold the beaten egg yolk into the hot mocha mixture, and microwave 2 more minutes. Remove from microwave, stir in the sweetener, then let cool.

3. In a separate bowl beat the egg whites until soft peaks form, add the cream of tartar, then beat until stiff. Carefully fold the egg whites into the chocolate mixture, mixing just until no whites show. Spoon the mousse into 8 parfait glasses and chill serving. This will keep in the refrigerator for several days, tightly covered.

Each serving has approximately 52 calories, 3.6 g. protein, 1.2 g. total fat (0.6 g. unsaturated fat, 0.5 g. saturated fat), 7.3 g. carbohydrates, 27 mg. cholesterol, 0.6 g. fiber, 46 mg. sodium, 84 mg. calcium.

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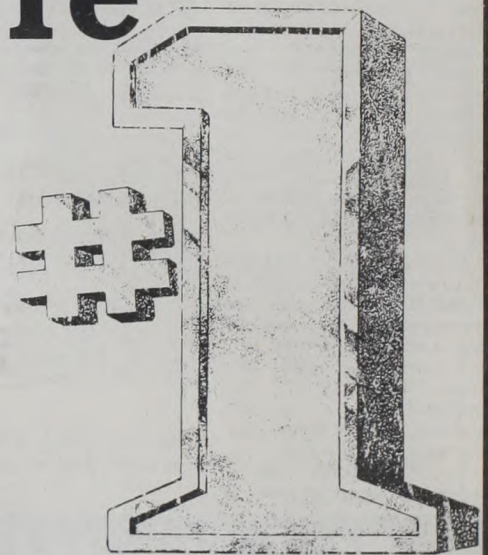

# Farmers To Withhold Taxes

Starting in January 1990, employers are required to withhold income tax from their employees, regardless of the number of employees. Prior to 1990, agricultural pro-

ducers with 10 or less employees did not have to withhold federal income taxes out of the employees' paychecks. All employers, including farmers, were required to withhold Social Security contributions. As a result income taxes were not withheld from many workers' pay under the old rules. This change will require employees to complete a W-4 form, Employees Withholding Allowance Certificate. Next January, employees should receive a W-2 form, "Wage and Tax Statement

and common, IRS allows several other methods. Concerned employees should check with their employers as to the method used to determine their income tax withholding.

Agricultural workers may be exempt from income tax withholding requirements if they meet all of the following tests: had no income tax liability in 1989 (received a total refund); do not expect to have a tax liability in 1990 (would receive a total refund); are not a dependent on anyone else's tax return and, if claimed by someone else, total wage and non-wage income is less than \$500.

However, all employees, including agricultural workers, are not exempt from Social Security payments.

1990," from their employer showing the amount of income tax withheld.

The amounts withheld are paid to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) through an authorized bank by employers on a periodic schedule. Employees will have to use the W-2 form as a basis to file an income tax return at the end of the year. They will then determine if they owe more taxes or if they are entitled to receive back all or part of the taxes withheld.

This new change means that employees of farmers who were not withholding income taxes under the old rules will probably receive reduced paychecks starting in January 1990. As an example, a

single worker receiving \$3.50 per hour in wages would be entitled to \$140 for a 40 hour weekly salary. With one exemption listed on his W-4, his employer will be required to withhold \$12 in income taxes. The employee would be entitled to receive the remaining \$128.

Employees should keep in mind that Social Security taxes would also be deducted from the paycheck. The Social Security tax rate is 7.65

percent of the first \$51,300 of annual salary.

This means that the \$128 in this example would be further reduced by \$10.71 (140x7.65%) and the employee would receive \$117.29.

Readers should keep in mind that the amount of income tax withheld is heavily dependent on the size of the paycheck, marital status and the number of exemptions. If, for example, the employee declared 4 exemptions on his W-4 form, no federal income taxes would be with-

held, but the \$10.71 Social Security taxes would have to be paid.

While this method of determining withholding amounts is typical

## NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. ## Lines From Lynda



Are you a chicken fried steak and gravy man? Do you think a good day begins with bacon and eggs? Such eating habits could be hazardous to your heart and health.

Your heart has to last you a lifetime, and I know you want that to be a very long time. A healthy, low-fat diet has been proven as one means of reducing the risk of heart disease.

It's hard to change a lifetime of eating habits, but have you noticed that those who have survived a heart attack suddenly develop a taste for salads, baked fish and chicken, and fruits instead of chocolate cake?

You don't have to give up everything you love, but just be willing to make a few changes to reduce fat and calories in your diet.

Build your daily food choices around the basic food groups-four or more servings of vegetables, fruits and juices; four or more servings breads, cereals, pasta or starchy foods; two or more servings of low-fat milk or dairy products; and two servings (six ounces) of lean meat, fish or poultry.

Limit fats and oils--this includes fat in fried foods, bacon, butter, salad dressings, baked goods, etc.--to no more than 5-8 teaspoons per day.

Broil or grill meat instead of deep frying. Trim all visible fat from meat. Remove skin from poultry. Chill soups, stews, and broths and remove the fat from the top. This saves 100 calories per tablespoon.

Use reduced calorie dressings and low-fat cheeses like mozzarella for higher fat hard yellow cheeses. Omit bacon from

your diet, or reduce its use. Bacon is high in fat and sodium and has very little protein.

Enjoy a nutritious baked potato but reduce the butter and sour cream. I know--that's what makes it taste good, but wouldn't you like to stay around longer?

When statistics continue to indicate that heart disease is the number one cause of death and that we have control over many of the heart risk factors, it would seem that the stakes (not steaks) are high enough to motivate a change in our lifestyles habits.

We will be planning educational programs throughout the year to address the problem of heart disease risk and hope that each of you will take responsibility for the health of YOUR heart.

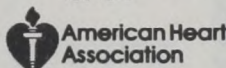
