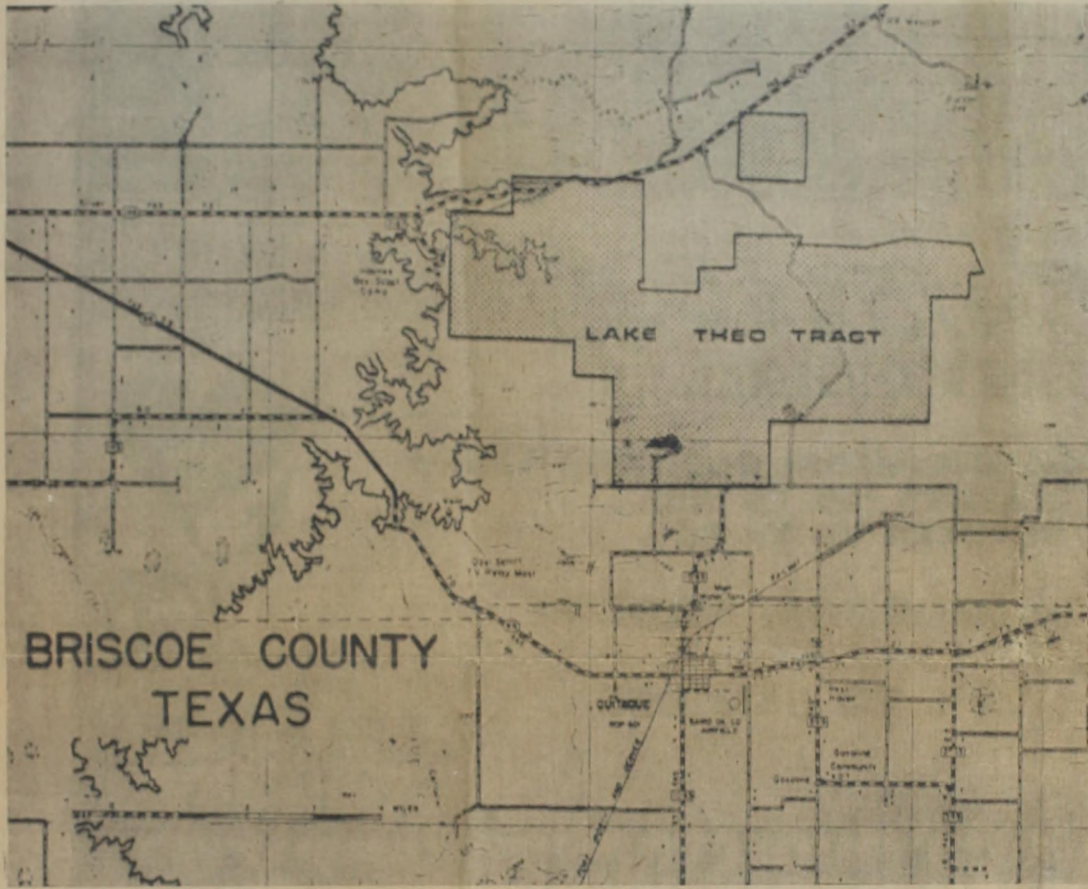

State Park To Be Established In Area North Of Quitaque



Announcement was made Sunday that a State Park will be formed out of the area around Lake Theo, north of Quitaque. The announcement came simultaneously from the offices of U. S. Representative Jack Hightower, State Senator Ray Farabee and State Representative Phil Cates. The area from which the new state park will be formed is better known as the Theo Geisler Ranch. No details have been released as to when construction will start on the park or just what the state plans for the area. The announcement is as follows:

The new Lake Theo State Park is shown in the shaded area on this map.

The creation of a new state park in Briscoe County of the Texas Panhandle has been announced jointly by Congressman Jack Hightower of Vernon, State Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, and Representative Phil Cates ofampa. Located approximately 95 miles from both Lubbock and Amarillo, the site will be known as Lake Theo State Park.

Instrumental in acquiring designation of the site as a state park was former Senator Jack Hightower who is now serving his first term in Congress.

The state legislative delegation from the area expressed pleasure with the creation of the park. Senator Ray Farabee stated that he felt the park would be "a tremendous asset" to the area. Representative Phil Cates noted that the park would provide "an economic boost" to the surrounding area while preserving some of the "rugged beauty of the caprock."

The park, more properly known as the Geisler Ranch, is accessible via FM 1065 and a county road north of uitaque. The park contains in excess of 13,500 acres including two scenic caprock canyons, several thousand acres of roughland below the escarpment, the 130 acre Lake Theo impoundment, and several smaller lakes and tanks. The scenic features of the Lake Theo site are somewhat similar to Palo Duro Canyon, but enhanced by the existence of a small fishing lake and the potential for creating other water features.

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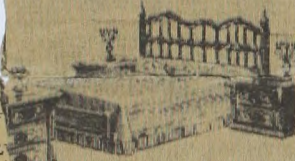
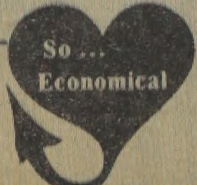

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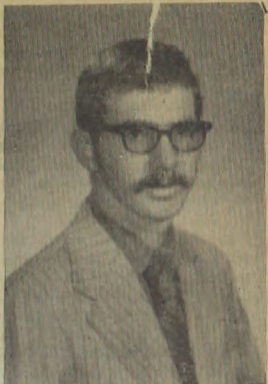
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TEXAS TALK

CATTLE TYPES ... There are three types of cattle: dairy type, beef type and dual purpose cattle. The beef type dominates the Southwest with more than 15 distinct breeds now being raised.

TEXAS BREEDS ... A breed is a selected group of animals with readily distinguished characteristics and a common origin. Of the 15 common beef breeds, five originated in the United States. Four of those five, the Charbray, Beefmaster, Santa Gertrudis and Brangus, had their origins in Texas. The fifth, Barzona, originated in Arizona. The Charbray began in the Rio Grande Valley area and is a mixture of approximately three-quarters Charolais and one-quarter Brahman. Beefmaster started near Falfurrias, Texas, representing a crossing of Hereford, Shorthorn and Brahman. Santa Gertrudis, developed on the King Ranch, is a cross of Brahman and Shorthorn. A single bull, Monkey, is credited as foundation sire for the entire breed.
