An Open Letter To The Community

Dear Neighbors:

On January 12, 1995, our hospital rural health team conducted a county meeting at your request in the public school cafeteria. Thank you for giving us the opportunity to come and visit with the citizens in your area to discuss the opportunity of opening a new rural health clinic. The South Plains Health Provider Organization, Inc. had established a clinic in the existing Briscoe County Clinic. As you know, this clinic closed and numerous residents stated that this clinic did not meet their

I would like to express my appreciation for the wonderful attendance and reception expressed to our team. Based on your postive response to our question, "Do you want High Plains Baptist Hospital Health Systems to provide a clinic to this area?" we made a commitment to do so.

What is the next step? We are pleased to announce that we have successfully recruited a physician assistant and many of you have already met him--his name is Joe Foust. He will be moving to Silverton in late February 1995; his family will join him at a later date. We have begun interviewing local residents for the different needs of the clinic, which include janitorial, handyman, nurse and billing clerk. We will begin a series of newspaper and home mailings to keep you informed of the project. A projected opening date of mid-March 1995 has been set.

If you missed the meeting in Silverton, we will be conducting an identical program in the

Quitaque Community Center on February 2, 1995 at 7 p.m. We would encourage you to attend or tell a friend about the meet-

We believe a High Plains Baptist Health Systems clinic merits your support. The clinic must have local support to be a success in the long run. You are not interested, nor are we, in operating a clinic for the short term. The idea of a local, rural health clinic will not be successful if the community does not give it their full commitment and support. Our town hall meeting on January 12, 1995, indicated that you would give us your support if we agreed to open and operate a clinic where you can obtain immediate, local, and quality care. We are going to do our part and are counting on you to do yours.

We hope that, by our presence in your community, that you will have full faith and confidence in our ability to provide health care and that, if the need arises in the furture that can't be met locally that you will seek cifically, at High Plains Baptist Hospital. Remember, if you do not have a physicician and you need one, someone from our staff will assist you in obtaining a physician who will refer you, if necessary, to Baptist Hospital for either outpatient or inpatient care.

I hope to see you soon at the clinic grand opening. Watch for the announcement.




