# National Fire Prevention Week **Draws Attention To Dangers**

As most of us are aware, this week is National Fire Prevention Week. Actually a more fit ting name would be National Fire Awareness Week.

Prevention should be a habit that is practiced each and every moment of every day. Good habits are created through teaching and constantly reminding people of the consequences suffered by relaxing their efforts to prevent fires. I would like to share with you some of the facts concerning fires in Texas alone.

Fire Departments in Texas reported 88,468 fires during 1991. Those 88,468 fires caused 261 death 2,329 injuries and property damage totaling \$366

Following state and national trends, residential fires continued to account for the largest percentage of overall fire casualties and structural fire oc curances. Of the 25,026 building fires reported in 1991, 18,754 (or 75%) occurred in residences.

During the year, 179 people died and 1,583 were injured in fires in residences, more than any other type of occupancy.

Statistics show that very young and very old persons die in fires in disproportionately high numbers. Fire departments reported that 46 children under 5 years old died in Texas fires in This accounted for 18 percent of all fire deaths. Fiftytwo persons 65 years and older suffered fire related deaths, accounting for about 20 percent of all fire deaths

Adults between 25 and 44 years old are more likely to be injured in fires than any other age group, which accounts for about 54 percent of all fire injuries. All these combined account for about 51.6 percent of the population who suffer either death or injury in fire related incidents.

These are startling figures however compared to the 94,852 fires reported in 1990, this is a decrease of 7%. Fire related casualties decreased by 2%, and fire related injuries decreased

The key to reducing these needless deaths, injuries, and 1700.

property loss is through education and forming good fire prevention habits.

Fire prevention is a joint effort of the Texas Commission on Fire Protection, Texas school systems and local fire departments. But the bottom line is that it is an individual responsi-

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

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


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
