J. R. Gleaton (left), President of Rolling Plains Production Credit Association, has announced his plans to retire July 11, 1975 having completed 32 years with the Association. He announced his plans to the Board of Directors at its regular meeting held in Stamford May 22, 1975.

Mr. Gleaton was reared in Jones County, moved to Stamford in 1934 and began his employment with the Association in 1943. He served as Vice-President from 1953 until his appointment as President June 30, 1972.

Mr. and Mrs. Gleaton will continue to make their home in Stamford. J. R. states that they plan to spend considerable time traveling and enjoying retirement.

The Board of Directors announced the appointment of R. C. Cobb as President effective upon the retirement of Mr. Gleaton. Mr. Cobb was employed with the Rolling Plains Production Credit Association September 1939.

Mr. Cobb entered the Army in mid-1942 and served 3½ years throughout much of Europe and received a battlefield commission as Second Lieutenant in February 1944. Mr. Cobb was recalled to active duty during the Korean War and served from July 1951 to December 1952. He also served in the Army Reserve and holds the rank of Major in Retired Reserve.

Mr. Cobb was Assistant Manager in the Haskell office and was transferred to Stamford in 1955, having served since then as Vice-President and Secretary. For four months in 1974, Mr. Cobb worked on a special assignment with the Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston in writing an operations manual for Production Credit Associations. The Board of Directors expressed its pleasure in having the qualifications and capabilities of Mr. Cobb to fill this position.

The Rolling Plains PCA serves the credit needs of farmers and ranchers in a 17-county area and has capital of almost \$6 million.

FARBEE OPPOSED PASSAGE OF BILL

State Senator Ray Farabee was one of several rural Senators opposing Senate passage of a new school finance plan. The measure, known as the Revised Foundation School Plan, passed the Senate.

Farabee said he voted against passage of the bill because portions of the legislation would cause increases in the amounts local school districts have to raise. School districts under the present plan are required to raise at least 20% of the cost to participate in the Foundation Program. Under the new plan, districts would be required to contribute approximately 30%.

"Under this new program," Farabee said, "it is estimated Turkey-Quitaque would have to increase its local payment by \$67,000. In return, it would receive an \$8,000 increase in State aid."

The Senator explained that a portion of the increase in local money required would be offset by increases in State funding.

"Since some programs are currently being paid for with local money," Farabee said, "it is unclear as to whether new taxes will be required at the local level. It is my contention that the Legislature should not pass a state-wide program such as this one and then expect local districts to shoulder such a tremendous portion of the burden for funding the program."

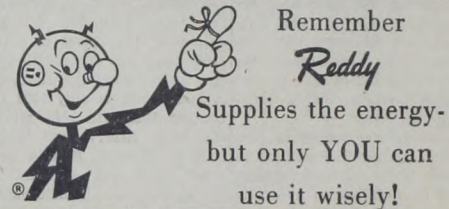
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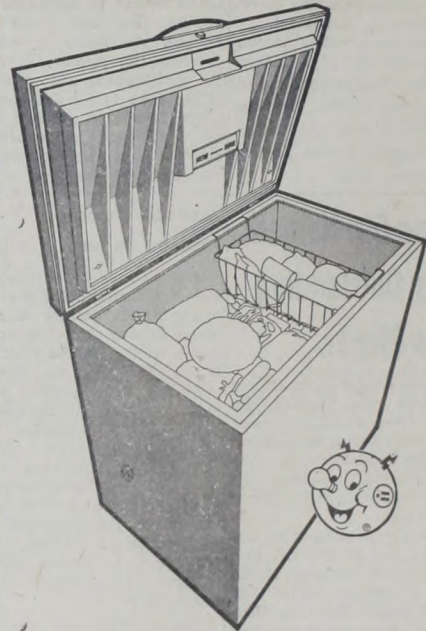

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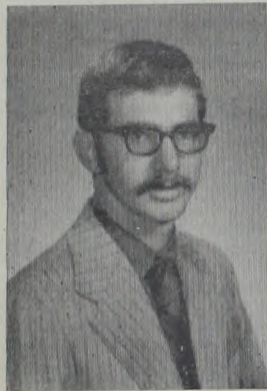

TEXAS TALK



DAVID BRUNSON

A marked decline in the number of varieties being grown commercially is one of the unusual things about Texas' number one cash crop . . . cotton. In 1910, F. J. Tyler, in an article entitled "Varieties of American Upland Cotton," reported for the United States Department of Agriculture that there were 613 varieties of cotton being grown. Sixty-five years later there are fewer than 50 with only about ten of those commonly used. Two reasons are predominant for the unusual turn-around. First the boll weevil infestation wiped out many susceptible long-staple varieties. Second, producers have developed the varieties they like best and are satisfied with the increases in crop yields, the storm resistant boll (for machine harvest) and the generally shorter growing season provided by relatively few types. Evidence of the success of the varieties being used is amply illustrated when comparing current yield per acre with that of 1950.

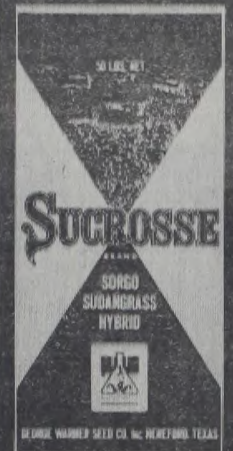
