Family History Workshop Scheduled At Hotel Turkey

Historic Hotel Turkey is the unique setting on July 28, 1990 for a writers workshop, "How To Write Your Family History As Fact Or Fiction," conducted by author and literary consultant Cyndy Buchanan.

Fast-gaining a reputation as the place for family reunions, club celebrations, and company

retreats, Hotel Turkey's fame has spread largely by word of mouth, even to distance shores. Recently the Johnson's received reservations from a German disc jockey, the first of perhaps many international visitors destined to visit the rugged beauty of the Caprock. Once popular with traveling salemen and drummers, the hotel, recently included in the National Registry of Historic Places, incorporates antiques, artifacts and western art of the region into his decor.

Ms. Buchanan expressed excitement about being able to offer the workshop in the intimate surroundings of the bed and breakfast where hosts Jane and Scott Johnson create an ambiance of southern hospitality with a western twist.

"I help people write books, family or personal histories. Every family has a wealth of information to record," explained the teacher of Continuing Education classes at Texas Tech. "Most of those taking the course are interested in preserving the history of their family as a gift for other members of the family."

Though a professional writer with national publishing experience, Buchanan's favorite role is that of teacher. "I love helping people. If they just have an idea of something they have always wanted to write, fiction or non-fiction, a script or a novel, I can work with them as a consultant." That role might include editing literary content, developing narrative ideas, or shaping

Maupin Attends Institute For Teachers Of Algebra

Patricia Maupin of Quitaque recently completed a Five-Day Institute for Teachers of Algebra at Amarillo College.

Maupin, who teaches at Valley High School, was among 31 participants.

The institute was conducted by four master teachers who participated in a four-week Summer Institute on Algebra held at Princeton University under the direction of The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation.

The institute focused on the development of teaching strategies that encourage students of all ability levels to move freely among geometric, algebraic and

numeric representations of a problem.

Participants explored algebraic problem solving using graphing calculators and computer software including function plotters, symbol manipulators and spreadsheets.

The institute emphasized the communication of algebraic concepts through the use of journal writing, manipulatives and participant sharing.

AC's site was the only Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation for algebra teachers in Texas. Institutes in chemistry, physics, mathematics and history were held at other Texas sites.

City Council Ups Solid Waste Rates

On Monday, July 2, 1990, the City Council of the City of Quitaque voted to increase the rates for trash hauling to residential and business customers to \$6 per month and \$7 per month respectively.

This increase was brought about by the increased cost of disposing of solid waste by the City, caused by the increased regulations by the Texas Department of Health and the Environmental Protection Agency. The City's solid waste is presently being hauled to a permitted site in Randall County.

During the same meeting the City Council voted to file a joint application with the City of Silverton to the Texas Department of Commerce for a Texas Community Development Program grant for the development of a solid waste transfer station. This transfer station will be located between Silverton and Quitaque and will serve as a holding facility until enough solid waste is gathered to be transferred to a permitted disposal site.

Nathaniel McKay

Services for Nathaniel McKay, Jr., 64, were held Saturday, July 7, 1990 in the First Baptist Church of Turkey with the Rev. Sammie Holloway, pastor of the Mount Olive Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery under the direction of Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors of Turkey. He died Wednesday, July 4, 1990 in Memphis, Texas.

Mr. McKay was born in Itasca and attended Booker T. Washington School in Itasca. He was a U. S. Army veteran of World War II. He lived most of his adult life in Turkey. He was a former Mason and a member of the Mount Olive Baptist Church.

Junior was preceded in death by his father, Nathaniel McKay in 1955, a sister, Mary Sewell in 1973, and a brother, J. C. McKay in 1979.

Survivors include his mother, Ruth McKay of Turkey; a son, Clarence Ray McKay of Johnston, South Carolina; four brothers, Billy McKay and Joe McKay both of Ridge Springs, South Carolina; Johnny McKay of Dallas and David McKay of Memphis; six sisters, Virginia Cornish of Denver; Lanita Brewer of Memphis, Carrie Ball of Turkey, Elanor Cornish of Oklahoma City and Mildred Buckley and Wilma McFarlin, both of Dallas; and one grandchild.

Funds Earmarked For Crime Victims

WASHINGTON--A total of \$3.9 million has been earmarked to help Texas crime victims, U. S. Senator Phil Gramm says.

The funds will be allotted by the Department of Justice to support state and local agencies that provide services for crime victims and their families.

The award is from the Crime Victims Fund in the U.S. Treasury that was established by the Victims of Crime Act of 1984. The fund is financed with fines and penalties assessed on convicted federal defendants.

Program guidelines require states to give priority to supporting programs that provide services to victims of sexual assault, spouse abuse and child abuse.

Open Letter to the Voters of Quitaque.

The Quitaque Chamber of Commerce applauds the action taken by our Mayor and City Council in calling for the vote of the people on our sales tax. The 12 grants have been awarded to institutions of higher education, research groups, or private, non-profit organizations in Abilene, Athens, Bakersfield/Midland, College Station/Edinburg, Corpus Christi, Galveston, Houston/ College Station, Lubbock, Nacogdoches, San Antonio, Uvalde and Warren/Houston.

Ag Grants Totaling \$115,000 Awarded

Twelve new Texas Agricultural Diversification Matching Grants totaling \$115,000 have been awarded recently. The matching grants will be augmented by nearly \$800,000 in local funds for feasibility studies, training programs and alternative crop and livestock demonstration projects throughout Texas. The 12 recipients were chosen by the six-member TADP Board from among 83 applicants.

To date, 30 projects have received \$400,000 in state matching grants, which have been augmented by approximately \$800,000 in local funds.

"These are not pie-in-the-sky projects. They are sensible, effective grassroots initiatives that are helping to widen and deepen the mainstream of agriculture in this state," Commissioner Hightower said.

"These 12 grants, ranging from \$7,500 to \$15,000 each, will help finance such ventures as an Asian

Income Tax Anniversary

August 5 marks the anniversary of the federal income tax. Signed into law by Abraham Lincoln in 1862, the tax was levied as an emergency wartime measure only. Persons with yearly incomes over \$600 paid a 3 percent income tax, and those with yearly incomes over \$5,000 paid 5 percent. The first tax went into effect Jan. 1, 1862, and was repealed in 1872.

An income tax again was enacted in 1894 by President Grover Cleveland. However, the Supreme Court declared it unconstitutional because it was a direct tax, levying a 2 percent income tax on all persons with yearly incomes over \$4,000. This forced income tax supporters to seek a constitutional amendment that would give Congress the right to impose income taxes without apportionment among the states. In 1913, the Sixteenth Amendment was ratified by the states, and a new personal income tax was approved by Congress.

Today, federal income taxes consist of individual income taxes, taxes on corporations, social insurance or payroll taxes, excise taxes and customs duties.

BRISCOE COUNTY EXTENSION NEWS

Recent dry weather has left the soil very dry, especially in the topsoil layers where young trees have most of their root systems. Without weekly waterings, these shallow-rooted tree seedlings will dry out and die rapidly.

A properly designed drip irrigation system can easily be installed to insure that your trees will be getting enough water. The Soil Conservation Service recommends the following amounts for young trees:

8-10 gallons a week for the first year

16-18 gallons a week for the second year
32-34 gallons a week for the third year

Using a drip system, water is applied directly to the tree and root area at rates of one to four gallons per hour. This optimizes soil conditions for best plant response and reduces weed competition between trees. The entire system is designed to be operated directly off an ordinary water hydrant. Once installed, all you do is turn the faucet on, let it run for a designated period of time, and turn it off.

There are several advantages to using a drip system. They include: high tree survival rates, easy installation, low irrigation system maintenance, the relatively small amount of water needed, uniform water distribution, and low evaporation losses.
