The boundaries for this association go north to the Oklahoma Panhandle line, west to the New Mexico line, east to the Oklahoma line and just below Plainview to the south. However, there were some representatives from Bailey County and Cottle County who attended this meeting and are considering

joining the Panhandle Association.

During the meeting, the gavel was turned over to the new president, Commissioner U. F. Coker of Hall County who is commissioner in Precinct 4, Turkey area.

Coker served as secretary-treasurer this past year and as vice president the year before. He is the only judge or commissioner from Hall County to ever serve as an officer in this association. Commissioner Will Chamberlain of Clarendon served as president three years ago. Will is married to Brenda

Just Ramblin'

(The following is taken in part from the TPA Messenger, September, 1992)

The professor asked his promising journalism students, "What is the primary purpose of a newspaper?"

Somebody answered: "To inform its readers."

Another student said, "To watch politicians."

Nobody got the right answer.

"The primary purpose of a newspaper," the professor explained, "is to make money. It's a business, not a public utility. If it doesn't make money, it will eventually go out of business."

Newspapers are folding -- no pun intended -- literally every day, and when a newspaper dies, it should scare us to death; it certainly does me! How many more will be disappearing in the future?

Will we one day get all our news from a computerized version of a newspaper, or radio or television? Maybe radio's days are numbered, too, for that matter.

Have you ever stopped to think about what we would do without our newspapers? Without this small newspaper in the community?

How would we know of the weddings and engagements and anniversaries of our friends and neighbors? How would we keep up with what our schools and our school-children are doing? Where would we learn of our city and county governmental activities, and officials to be elected, and laws being enacted?

Where else would we hear of the criminal's doings and the law enforcement agents' work in our small community? Where else would study clubs and com-

munity comings and goings, and 4-H Clubs, and Lions' club activities be reported? What other news medium would be interested in a photo of a kid fishing on the last day of summer, or the winner of this year's Bob Wills parade float?

How many radio stations and TV stations are going to carry your hometown football or basketball games in detail, so that your child can have that clipping to keep? Or carry a photo of that youngster and his calf or show pig to go in his scrapbook?

How many radio or TV broadcasts do you find preserved for posterity, to show your grandkids some of these days?

Yes, we are a business; we are here to make money -- is that a crime? We hope that in trying to do that, we can do those other things too -- inform our readers, keep a watch on politicians and governments; that is the duty of a newspaper. Provide a service to our readers -- that is what we want to do. But in order to do this, we must sell advertising, just as retail businesses must sell their goods to stay in business.

Unlike other retail businesses, however, we have nothing to sell but space. If we don't sell space (advertising space) we don't have room for news or your stories. If we don't have news and your stories, we don't sell papers, and around and around it goes. We can no more afford to give away free advertising, than a retail business can afford to give away free shirts or groceries!

I realize that in a small, economically depressed place like our town, money spent for advertising may seem to be money that could be spent more use-

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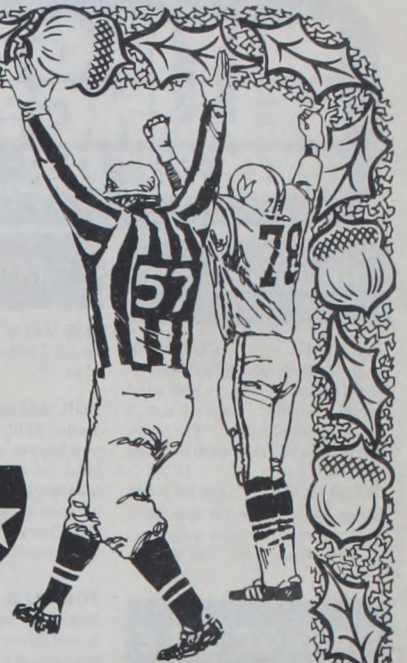
