Vonaceil grew up in Quitaque and has lived here most of her life.

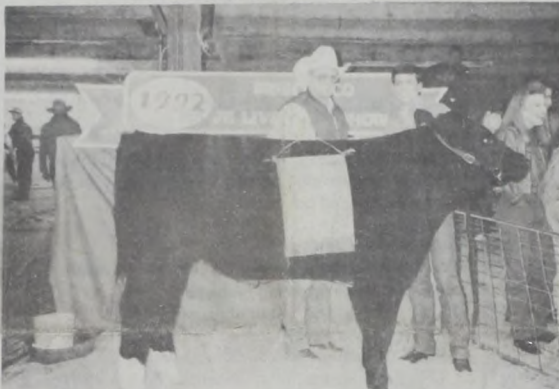

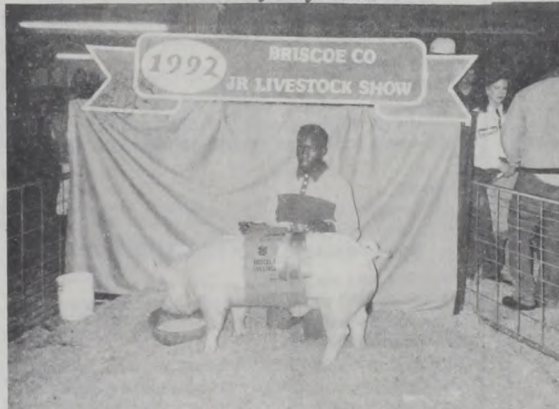

Briscoe County Junior Livestock Premium Sale Over \$40,000.00

The Briscoe County Livestock Show was the scene of a full day of activities Saturday, January 26, 1992 at the County Show Barn in Silverton. The 1992 show included 174 steer, dairy heifer, beef heifer, lamb, prospect hog, and market hog entries, exhibited by Valley FFA, Silverton FFA, and Briscoe County 4-H members from Valley and Silverton Schools. The show day ended with a premium sale that totaled over \$40,000.

Judge Jim Lewis of Levelland named Christa Tucker's 113 lb. Medium Wool lamb **Grand Champion of the Lamb show**. The lamb was purchased by Silverton buyers club for \$600. April Stephens' 102 lb. Medium Wool lamb was named **Reserve Grand Champion** of the show. April's lamb was purchased by the Valley Buyers Club for \$500.

Clay Merrell's 1155 lb. Maine Anjou Cross Steer which was named **Breed Champion Exotic Steer** was selected as **Grand Champion of the Steer Show**. Judge Ronald Gooch named P-Jay Merrell's Hereford Steer which was breed champion of the British Breed entries, as **Reserve Grand Champion** of the show. There were eleven steer entries in the show this year. Clay's Grand Champ steer was purchased by Tulia Wheat Growers for \$750. P-Jay's Reserve Steer was bought by Valley Buyers for \$525.

Brandi Price's 1300 lb. bred Holstein Heifer was named **Grand Champ of the 1992 Dairy Heifer Show**. Entries in the show this year included five heifers in the bred class, and two entries in the open heifer class. B.J. Price's Champion Open Heifer was named **Reserve Grand Heifer**. Brandi's heifer was purchased by Valley Buyers for \$700. They also purchased B.J.'s heifer for \$500. Mr. Floyd Collins, Ag Science teacher at Jayton High School was the judge of the Dairy Heifer show.

Langdon Reagan's Shorthorn heifer was named **Grand Champion** among the five entries in the **Beef Heifer show**. Molly Brooks' hereford heifer was named **Reserve Grand Champ**. Judge for the Beef Heifer show was Ronald Gooch. Langdon's heifer was purchased by Silverton Buyers for \$600, and Molly's heifer was purchased by Tulia Wheat Growers for \$525.

The **prospect hog show** included all entries under 200 lbs. Judge Mark Edens, Agriculture Science teacher at Levelland High School selected Jo Dee Robison's 165 lb. breed Champion Hampshire pig as **Grand Champion** of the show. Jo Dee's hog was purchased by the Silverton Buyers for \$600. Rickey Hughes' 194 lb. Champion Yorkshire barrow was named **Reserve Grand Champion** of the show. The Bob Willis Foundation purchased Rickey's hog for \$400. There were seventy-three entries in this year's prospect hog show.

Hogs weighing from 200-260 lbs. were entered in the **Market Hog** show. This show had 56 entries. Judge Mark Edens selected Dewayne Davis' 246 lb. Breed Champion Yorkshire Barrow as **Grand Champion** of the show. It was purchased by Valley Buyers for \$625. **Reserve Grand Champion** was exhibited by Lacy Brunson, and was purchased by Tulia Wheat Growers for \$525.

Showmanship winners selected at the 1992 show included: **Dairy Cattle** - Bradley Price; **Swine** - Rickey Hughes; **Lamb** - P-Jay Merrell, and **Beef Cattle** - Langdon Reagan. The prestigious **Don Burson Memorial Award** was awarded to Langdon Reagan.

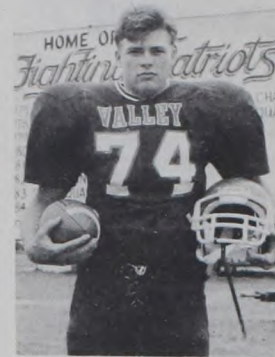
