Lone Star Asks For Increase In Rates

AUSTIN — Lone Star Gas Company filed, May 2nd, with the Texas Railroad Commission an application for an increase in the intracompany gate charge for residential, commercial and distribution unaccounted-for gas.

The company asked an increase from the present gate charge of 35.4 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas to 44.8 cents per thousand cubic feet.

When the Railroad Commission establishes the new intracompany rate, specific computations will be made for each Texas town. In those towns where earnings are deemed inadequate, individual rate action will be pursued with each town's ruling body.

BAIRD — An organizational meeting for the Callahan County Brush Control and Improvement Association, has been set for 8 p. m. Tuesday May 13, in the district courtroom here.

John Matthews, chairman of the State Committee on Brush Control & Range Improvement will be present to discuss brush problems. He will also discuss a new program that is being launched in the State of Texas relative to brush problems which would be similar to the screwworm program, which met with such great success.

Temporary County Chairman, James Snyder, suggest that in order for this program to be successful in Callahan County, 100 percent participation is needed. All landowners are urged to be present at this meeting.

CLYDE LAKE BIDS LET TO COLEMAN FIRM

Ford Allen Construction Co. of Coleman, is apparent low bidder for installation of Clyde Lake. A bid opening in the State Soil Conservation Service Office in Temple on May 1, at 2 p. m., revealed three bidders for the job. The Allen Construction Company bid of \$246,648 for installation of Site No. 7 of the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed Program was \$7,706 below the bid by Lyles and Lyles of Ballinger. Leon Jenschke of

Kerrville submitted the high bid of \$298,595 for the multi-purpose dam. Work can be expected to begin with 20 days from the final award of the job. James Herring, District Conservationist of the Baird Soil Conservation Service work unit states, Principal bid items in the lake job include clearing brush from the approximate 450 acres permanent pool, excavation and placement of about 252,000 cubic yards of compacted earth

fill in the dam, foundation excavation involving some 20,000 cubic yards, principal spillway (draw-down pipe and outlet works) involving about 16,600 pounds of reinforcement steel in about 200 cubic yards of concrete and 510 feet of 26-inch concrete spun pipe set in anti-sweep collars or cradles.

The Clyde Lake is one of 47 planned flood control structures in the Upper Pecan Bayou and Turkey Creek Watersheds above Lake Brownwood. The up-stream program is designed to reduce annual flood damages to agricultural lands, cities, roads, bridges, public utilities by about 70 percent, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood. Thirty-one of the 47 planned flood dams have been installed. The Clyde Lake or Site No. 7, along with No. 8, located on the Farmer and Evans ranches about 6 miles south of Clyde, are the only remaining projects in Callahan County to be installed within the near future. The six upstream dams known as Sites 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18 are located within the proposed Bayou Lake project, just above Webb's Store, and will not be built if the currently talked about large lake is built by the Corps of Engineers, Hughes reminds.

Thus ten of the planned 47 flood dams above Lake Brownwood are yet to be installed with the Corps lake or 16 will be in the planned program without the large bayou project.

Supervision of construction on Clyde Lake will be under M. W. McNeese, Project Construction Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood. Clayton Anglin will be the job inspector. The Ford Allen Construction Company of Coleman is no newcomer to the area. Ford Allen has been one of the more reliable bidders and builders in the flood control program during the past approximate 15 years, Area Conservationist Hughes says. He recently completed jobs in this area on Sites 9 and 18A, Upper Pecan Bayou.

The Clyde Lake, being a multiple purpose structure having flood detention, municipal and recreational water, will be jointly cost shared by the City of Clyde and the Soil Conservation Service. Based on the work plan agreement, the City of Clyde will finance the municipal water development phase of the program with 34.4% of the cost of the dam being attributed to recreational and municipal water development. The Soil Conservation Service, representing the Federal Government, will pay 65.6% representing the flood control cost of the structure. Municipal water and recreational items will be included in additional contracts following installation of the multiple purpose dam as planned by the City of Clyde through their consulting engineering firm, Henningson, Durham and Richardson, Inc., of Dallas.

Spring Rains Drench Area

BAIRD — The spring rains continued this week in the county with rainfall reported to be unusually heavy in most areas. Tornadoes have been sighted in

some areas, with one reportedly dipping down west of Potosi Sunday afternoon, damaging barns, and sending Oplin, Denton Valley and Eula residents scurrying to seek protection.

Areas near Eula have reported up to 8 inches of rain in the past 10 days. Rowden reported 1.80 inches received during the weekend.

Clyde reports vary, amounts up to 8 inches and over in some gauges for Saturday and through Monday. Tuesday's storm brought another 2.10 inches with some damage reported. Gardens were washed away and high water covered bridges.

In Baird, storm conditions continued into the night Sunday. Tuesday tornado sightings, amidst confusion over smoke from a burning oil field slush pit which resembled a tornado north of Clyde, sent people to shelter, closed several businesses and caused the school to be dismissed early.

Rainfall for the city of Baird, as measured by official weatherman B. C. Chrisman, totals 4.92 inches for the first week of May, including a shower of .22 early Wednesday morning.

NOTICE ONAL AMENDMENT THE BALLOT (SJR31)

ature, No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

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PUBLIC NOTICE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows:

"Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of bonds to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

PUBLIC NOTICE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, for the assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate. The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year. Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes. Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner not to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state. Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At such election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount of federal matching money which may be available for assistance and/or medical care."

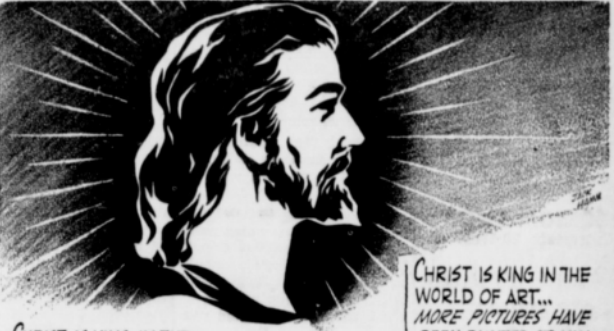

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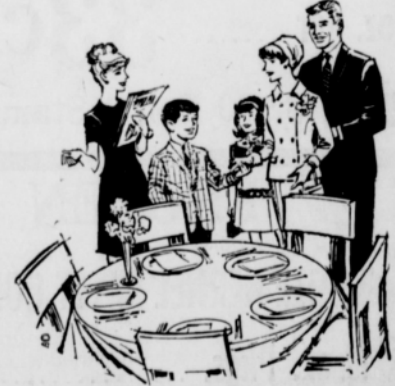
