**Changes Announced For District Basketball Playoffs**  
Supt. Herman Moseley of the Quitaque schools has announced changes in the District 7-B basketball playoffs this year. These changes were made due to the fact that the Girls State Tournament has been moved to an earlier date.

The district championships, both boys and girls, will be determined by a double round robin, which means that each team in the district will play the other teams in the district twice, just as in the past, the championships will be determined on the percentage of the most games

won by a team. Should there be two teams to tie on a percentage basis, then there would be a one game playoff between the two schools tied. It actually amounts to the way the schedule has been in the past without the district tournament. The larger schools determine their championships in this manner, which is probably the fairest way to pick a champion.

Thus, there will be no district Tournament this year as in the past because there will not be time. The girl's district winner must be certified by February 14. Girls regional will be played on February 20, 21 and 22. The girls

state tournament will be held at Austin on February 26, 27 and 28. February 21 will be the deadline for certifying district champions in Class A, AA and AAA in boys divisions. The state meet for this group will be held on March 6, 7 and 8.

Class B and AAAA boys winners must be certified by February 28 and the state tournament for these two groups will be held on March 13 and 14.

**Recent Immunization Clinic Tamed A Success**

The Immunization Clinic for the Quitaque community which was held at Turkey on October 9 was very successful, according to Supt. Herman Moseley. There were 10 pre-schoolers, 68 students and 8 adults receiving various vaccines.

Future clinics will be scheduled in the Quitaque school cafeteria, with the next clinic to be held on November 13. This clinic will give the following immunizations: Diphtheria, Tetanus, Whooping Cough and Polio. If there are as many as 40 pre-schoolers that have not had the Red Measles or the immunization for them, then this will be given on November 13.

The field representative, Dar-

rell Morris was so pleased with the success of the clinic at Turkey that he has agreed to hold all future clinics in the Quitaque school.

All people who need the immunizations are urged to be present on November 13, especially the preschoolers. The records show that a good immunization program definitely cuts down on the number of days missed by students after they start to school.

**Quitaque Annual Staff Making Good Progress**

The Quitaque Annual Staff is progressing quite well on the school annual, according to Supt. Herman Moseley.

Three Quitaque students attended annual workshops at Texas Tech last summer. Eddie Owens attended the photography workshop, and Jackie Cheatham and Neva Morrison attended the school annual workshop.

A darkroom has been equipped in the middle building at school and Eddie is making and developing the pictures. He is doing some real good work and this will help the Annual Staff very much, for if a picture does not turn out well, it can be made over immediately and the staff will not have to wait on an outside photographer to come in and make the pictures over. The Annual Staff has some plans underway to make money to pay for the equipment in the dark room for developing the pictures. By the time Eddie graduates, we plan to have another student ready to take his place in making pictures. "We feel that the picture developing room will be a good training ground for students to get some technical training that will help them get a job after graduating from school and it could be a full time job or a job to help pay college expenses. 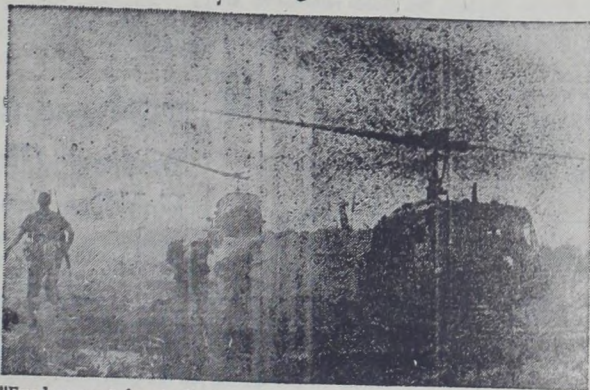

#### JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES TO ATTEND PLAINVIEW MEET

The Quitaque Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses is making preliminary plans to attend a 3-day training program in Plainview, Texas, it was announced this week.

V. D. Tiffin, presiding minister of the group, in discussing this announcement with the congregation pointed to the recent "Peace on Earth" International assemblies of Jehovah's Witnesses as being an example of the type of convention planned for Plainview.

"The object of having 3 conventions a year," Tiffin said, "is that each gathering advances Bible knowledge of all individuals in attendance and equips every one of the preaching fellowship of Jehovah's Witnesses with the practical use of the Bible as a help in fortifying the spiritual morale in our community."

The announcement came at

the conclusion of the weekly ministerial development school held at Kingdom Hall.

Mr. Tiffin said that over 87,000 new ministers had already been baptized this year and each one has become active in preaching in his or her own neighborhood. The pattern is the same for all who attend regular weekly meetings, namely to participate in 5 meetings each week in over 25,000 congregations throughout the earth and then share what is learned with each one's neighbor.

Family groups here are making plans locally to attend the 3-day gathering which is scheduled for the Plainview High School Auditorium, 1501 Quincy St., November 7-9, 1969.

Mr. Tiffin discussed with the group local arrangements which will include travel plans as well as rehearsals and other preparation for those having been assigned parts on the upcoming program.

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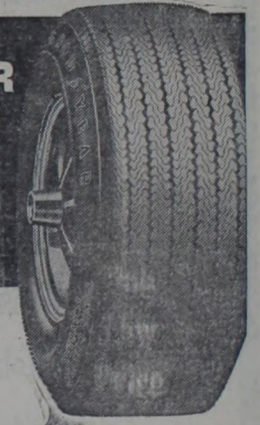

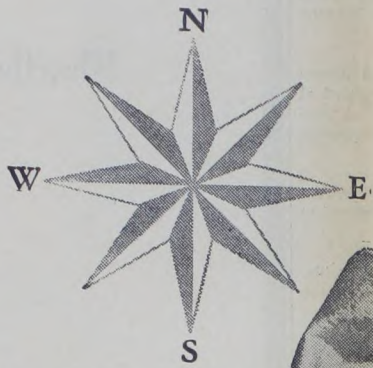

## Shirrtail Sermon

"Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us, and sent His Son to the propitiation for our sins."

The text is found in I John 4:10 and brings to mind several ways in which divine love surpasses human love.

First, man's love is limited by his years on earth. When his earthly life is ended, we no longer are loved by him. God's love is not limited in any manner. God is eternal and His love goes on and on into the limitless future.

Second, man's love is fractional. God's is total. Man loves to a certain point and beyond that point love has no influence. This is true

whether we ever discover that point or not. The occasion may never arise when we discover that point. God's love is total and is never limited by circumstances or by our actions. Of course, He loves us when we do His will, but He continues to love us when we refuse to do His will.

Third, man's love is local, God's is universal. Man loves his family and his friends that are in his immediate vicinity. He is not capable of loving those who live in far distant places as completely as he does those around him and with whom he is familiar. God's love is not limited by distance, color or creed. He loves every

man exactly the same, even when man does not love or even know God.

Man's love is sentimental, God's love is practical. Man's love is intensified by memories, by physical attraction, and by returned love. God's love is practical in that He wants all good things for all men. He desires that man have everything that will make life good and better than it has been before.

daughter, Alice. Thus Mr. Richardson's daughter-in-law is now his step-daughter and Mrs. Richardson's son-in-law is now her step-son. The younger Richardson is district manager of the phone company in Memphis and Alice works at a drug store.

Although information about social security beneficiaries is confidential, Mr. and Mrs. Richardson gave permission to the Social Security Administration to publish facts about their social security to better acquaint people with benefits provided by law.

Even though she has remarried, Mrs. Richardson will continue to receive widow's benefits on her deceased husband, Paul Geisler's social security earnings. This is because a recent change in the law permits a widow who is past age 62 to remarry without total loss of her social security benefits. A widow may receive a monthly check equal to one-half her deceased husband's "age - 65" benefit, or equal to the amount for which she could qualify as a wife on her new husband's earnings, whichever is higher. In Mrs. Richardson's case, benefits will be paid on her deceased husband's record since this is the larger amount.

Miss Virginia J. Hess, field representative from the Amarillo social security district office, said there may be some widows in the vicinity who remarried after age 60, but who are not eligible on their present husband's earnings because he is still working or has not reached retirement age. "If there are any persons who think they may qualify under this provision, they should contact the social security office," she said. The Amarillo office is located at 1006 Adams Street.

**Farm Commodity Legislation Discussed**

(From a talk given at a luncheon of the American Corn Millers Federation, October 6, 1969, in Washington, D. C.)

Farm commodity legislation is now entering a crucial development period, according to Carroll G. Brunthaver, associate administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Farm programs are sought which will help farmers share more equitably in the fruits of advancing technology and the benefits of the farmer's own efficiency. At the same time, the ASCS official said, "it is just about essential that program costs be checked, in order to be acceptable to Congress."

Farm programs for the 1970's are expected to be attuned to mar-

kets, both foreign and domestic, in promoting sales of farm crops and making commodity production adjustments.

Mr. Brunthaver said, "We must avoid decisions that ignore market opportunities and result in the loss of the farmer's markets to synthetic and foreign competition. The U. S. has the most modern and efficient marketing system the world has known, but if we are not careful, we will continue to limit the effectiveness of this system to seek out and expand demand for what the farmer wants to produce."

He cited the general recommendations Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin made when he appeared before the House Agriculture Committee. Mr. Brunthaver urged that the statement be read in detail. He pointed out that the Secretary's approaches to the farm programs would give participating farmers more freedom of choice than they have

now and would not penalize farmers who chose to stay out of Federal farm programs entirely.

The ASCS official concluded: "We are dealing with national policy in a time of great change, not only in agriculture, but in American society. Americans have become an urban people in just a very few decades, and we are feeling the pressures. The minority remaining in agriculture — slightly over five percent — find that their lives are drastically altered by changes in technology, communication, and the structure and organization of farming itself."

"Yet any new age must be dealt with in terms of the problems and circumstances it presents—not in terms of devotion to some traditional but outworn system. We must deal with the world as it really is. And this is what we are trying to do in the development of farm and food policies for the 1970's."
