Plains Cotton Growers Sign-up Begins March 1 For 1993 Program

by Shawn Wade The sign-up period for the 1993 cotton program is rapidly approaching and more specifics about the program are being finalized according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG). Sign-up for the 1993 program will begin March 1 and continue until April 30.

Some of the provisions previously announced include the 7.5 percent Acreage Reduction Program (ARP), the estimated 1993 Deficiency Payment rate of 20.55 cents and the advance deficiency payment rate of 10.275 cents, as well as the continuation of the 72.9 cent Target Price and 52.35 cent Loan Rate.

Newly announced provisions include eligible cover crops for planting on Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) and Conserving Use (CU) for Pay acres.

In addition to the cover crop announcement Optional Flex Acres (OFA) can be planted to any crop other than fruits and vegetables or peanuts and receive Planted and Considered

Tax Rebates Totalling Over \$210 Million Returned to Cities And Counties

Texas cities received \$192.1 million, up 17.5 percent over the \$163.4 million they received last February. Counties received a total of \$20.3 million for their February rebates, a 15.3 percent increase over the February 1992 rebates of \$17.6 million according to John Sharp, State Comptroller.

Quitaque has received \$4,367.90 to date while Silverton has received \$3,464.75 and Turkey \$2,781.31 for the time period including taxes collected on December's Christmas sales.

The filing deadline for City of Quitaque Alderman positions will be 5:00 P.M., March 17, 1993.

In other matters, the City Council, in a special called meeting, accepted the resignation of Public Works Director, Farrell Edwards. Farrell and Doris are moving to Shallowater where they will be relocating F & D Electric. The City Council wishes them well in their return to the former business endeavor.

Planted (P&CP) credit for the crop base that the acreage was flexed from. Limited cross compliance will not be applicable for 1993.

Eligible cover crops for ACR and CU for Pay acres are:

Small grains disposed of before reaching hard dough;

Small grains left standing when producer pays the required fee of ten dollars per farm;

Forage sorghums and sweet sorghums such as haygrazer, sudan and red top cane;

Blackeye peas used for green manure and incorporated into the soil when producer pays required fee of ten dollars per farm;

Close sown corn or sorghum;

Home gardens limited to a maximum of two acres in size;

Special approval from the Texas State ASC Committee will be necessary to harvest and donate blackeye pea seed to an approved food bank on no more than 50 percent of cotton ACR and CU for Pay acres.

Cover crops of corn, sorghum and blackeye peas are not eligible to be hayed or grazed at any time during the calendar year.

Producers are encouraged to contact their county ASCS office to make an appointment, if necessary to facilitate the sign-up process, and also to get clarification on specific program details.

Parks Personnel Will Be Hosted By Quitaque Lions

A delegation of engineers and planners from the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife will be in town next week. They are coming as part of the flurry of work going on to prepare for the opening of the new Caprock Canyon Trail System. The opening, complete with grand celebration and visiting dignitaries, is slated for Saturday, June 5, 1993!

The Quitaque Lions Club will host the group at their regular meeting on Monday, March 1, 6:30 p.m. at the Fellowship Hall of First United Methodist Church. The Parks personnel will be available to visit with anyone who would like to talk with them following the Lions meeting at approximately 7:30 p.m.

Mayor Conner Meets With Legislators in Austin

Mayor Elgin Conner joined a delegation of about 150 residents from the 26 counties of the Panhandle of Texas as they converged on Austin, Tuesday, February 16, to meet with legislators to air the Panhandle point of view.

The group arrived at the House of Representatives Chambers just in time to hear the House approve a resolution declaring February 16th as "Panhandle Day in Austin."

After visiting briefly with House Speaker Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, and a few other representatives, the group was off to the Capitol Marriot Hotel to host a luncheon for Governor Ann Richards. Richards turned the luncheon into a lobbying opportunity to urge the group to back the school finance constitutional amendment approved by the Legislature to avoid the closing of Texas schools by District Judge Scott McCown.

Richards said she is "scared to death" of how many years it would take to rebuild Texas' image if McCown closes the schools. The amendment will be submitted to voters on May 1. It allows the recapture of some local property tax money to equalize funding for schools.

After the luncheon, members of the Panhandle group were divided into twenty-four teams. Each team was assigned six or seven legislators to lobby on three major issues: products liability, trucking reforms and health care. Mayor Conner was designated team captain of his team. The highlight for Conner's team was a special conference with Attorney General Dan Morales. Morales and Assistant Attorney General Drew Durham discussed the settlement of the Ruiz case that brought about federal intervention into the state's prison system over twenty years ago. This has been a major accomplishment for the Attorney General.

Morales also lobbied the group to gain support with legislators for the passage of the Habeas Corpus bill that would establish a dual system to raise all points of an appeal at one time when a convicted felon begins the appeal process after conviction. This would speed up the appeals process extensively. Now a convicted capital murderer can expect to delay his sentence by an average of almost 10 years.

The day concluded with a reception help for all legislators. Most all of the area legislators were in attendance. A surprise visit was made by Andrew Sansom, Executive Director of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

As Mayor Conner visited with members of the delegation while waiting to board the plane back to Amarillo, everyone agreed that the day's activities had helped to inform Legislators of the way Panhandle people feel about several issues, and in turn, those who attended were better informed about how the Legislature works. With the leadership the Panhandle and South Plains has in Austin now, it is time for us to act, and make our feelings known.

Mayor Conner said "The only disappointment for the trip was in not being able to meet with Senator Steve Carriker, D-Roby, our senator for this district."

Immunization Clinics Held for March

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for March. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, and HIB (haemophilus influenzae type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

March Computer Classes Offered at Halfway

Three different courses will be offered during March at the Texas A&M Computer Training and Education Center at Halfway. One course will be offered for the first time. Two others are repeat offerings.

The training center is in the Moody Building at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station facility at Halfway, 14 miles west of Plainview on U. S. Highway 70.

Field Mapping will be offered for the first time. This program was developed by Pioneer Hi-Bred International and is marketed in Texas by Computer Solutions of Plainview. The program will allow the user to draw individual field maps to scale. It will be taught March 4 at the center by Computer Solutions personnel. No computer experience is necessary for this course.

Tellwriter Plus is an accounting software package that was developed by CPAs in Brownfield, specifically to meet the needs of South Plains farmers. This course will be taught March 8 at the center by the developers of the software. No computer experience is necessary.

Advanced Quicken is a popular offering at the center. This March 26 course will begin with a review of the basics of cash record keeping and the basics of Quicken. Topics to be covered include designing reports, sub-categories/classes, merging classes, managing files, reconciling issues and problems, and payroll. Participants must be familiar with Quicken. Each course will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The fee for these courses will include workshop material and catered lunches each day. Couples are encouraged to attend and will be charged only one fee if they share a computer. Registration for each workshop will be limited to 14 to provide hands-on computer experience.

ASCS 1993 Farm Program Sign-up

To be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments, and other benefits on 1993 crops, Briscoe County farmers must enroll in the 1993 Acreage Reduction Programs, according to Earlyne Hutsell, Briscoe CED.

Starting March 1, the ASCS office will begin accepting applications for the 1993 Wheat, Feed Grain, and Cotton Programs. Farmers may call the Briscoe County ASCS office for an appointment. Sign-up will end April 30.

The 1993 acreage reduction requirements are 10 percent for corn, 5 percent for grain sorghum, 7.5 percent for cotton, and zero percent for wheat, oats and barley. Farmers may request 50 percent of their estimated deficiency payments at sign-up time. The advance payments will be issued in cash.

Farmers participating in the 1993 programs may also plant soybeans or other oilseeds on

### Deadline Set For Sybil B. Harrington Merit Scholarship

March 1, 1993, is the deadline for applying for scholarships from the Sybil B. Harrington Merit Scholarship Fund.

Applications for the funds must reach the Amarillo College Foundation office no later than the March 1 deadline. Students applying will be eligible for up to \$3,500 in tuition, fees and book costs. The fund was established in late 1989 through the Amarillo College Foundation by Sybil Harrington.

Those eligible for the scholarship funds include graduating seniors from any high school in the 26 northern counties of the Panhandle of Texas; students graduating from Amarillo College; U. S. citizens and the applicant must enroll in 12 semester hours at the college of their choice.

Scholarships are awarded for one year only, but can be renewed if the student maintains a 3.0 grade point average. Eighty percent of the funds will be awarded for students to attend any accredited institution in Texas. Ten percent of the funds will be awarded for students planning to attend Amarillo College and 10 percent will be awarded to graduating Amarillo College students to attend any accredited institution in Texas.
