Coach Dill paid tribute to the whole squad as the victory was a team effort, with reserves coming through with a great job in the absence of two regulars and three starters injured during the game. Senior Patriot Jimmy Woods was lost for the season because he had to undergo surgery to correct torn ligaments and cartilage in his right knee. The Booster Club extends best wishes to Jimmy for a speedy recovery.

After viewing the Silvertown game films, it is most obvious the Patriots are improving each week and are going to be tough to handle. Coach Dill urged everyone to come out and support the Patriots this Thursday night when they take on the undefeated Childress JV. Coach Phelps gave a report on the Junior High Patriots' victory over Lubbock Christian Junior High. The Junior High took the game 40-0. Coach Phelps gave credit to the whole team and gave the following offensive statistics: Randy Clay, 27 yards rushing and one T.D.; Michael Dowd, 42 yards rushing and two T.D.'s; James McNary, 150 yards rushing and two T.D.'s, with one other TD being called back on an infraction; Ken Crump, 22 yards rushing and two PAT. Total yards 326 to 92 for the Lubbock Christian Junior High. The Junior Patriots are a very exciting team and if you haven't seen this young team play, you've missed a great treat. So go out and support the Junior Patriots this Thursday at 4:30 p.m. at Childress.

Coach Dvorak gave a report on the JV game with Kress. The JV Patriots were on the losing end of this effort but Coach Dvorak commented he was very proud of the JV, even though they were out-manned, they never gave up and showed that Patriot "Never Die" Spirit.

The Booster Club is very proud of the entire Patriot squad and want them to know we're with them all the way.

In the business meeting, Boosters Earl Patrick, Thurman Young and Jarrell Rice volunteered to help park cars at this week's game. It was reported that next week's game film will be in color because the Booster Club voted to pay the extra cost for colored film. The Owls won the battle but the Patriots won the football game, a very physical contest between two teams that were pretty well matched in most instances.

Valley won the toss of the coin and elected to receive, Wheeler taking the kickoff on about the ten yard line and running it out to the 30. Three running plays produced only six yards for the Patriots, forcing them to kick, with Couch booting to the Owls on their own 34 yard line. Three plays netted the Owls eight yards and they had to punt and the kicker got off a very poor kick with the Patriots taking over possession on the Valley 45. Valley picked up a first down, courtesy of an Owl 15-yard penalty, then another on the 12 yard line. Then on fourth down at about the four yard line, Eudy hit Kirk Proctor for the TD. Eudy kicked the extra point. With 3:10 left in the first period Valley led 7-0.

Valley kicked to Silvertown at the 20 and the KO was returned to the 35 yard line. The Owls picked up a couple of first downs, then were hit with back-to-back 15 yard penalties and had to give up the football, with Valley taking over on their own 20. The Patriots then fumbled the ball right back to the Owls, who could pick up only a couple of yards and the Patriots were in business again. Valley picked up a first down at the 30 yard line and then stalled. This time Valley got off a short kick and the Owls owned possession at the 50. A couple of plays later Dave Patrick intercepted an Owl pass. Two plays later the Owls recovered a Valley fumble just a minute before halftime with Valley leading 7-0.

Silvertown scored on a pass play on their first possession, then tried a two-point extra point conversion that failed and with 9:32 left in the third quarter Valley led 7-6. The Owls recovered a fumble on the Valley 30 yard line for a good opportunity to go out in front. After picking up a first down at the Valley 7, the Owls tried for a field goal that missed. The Patriots moved into Owl territory before stalling and having to kick away again, then held the Owls and took the punt on the Owl 40. The Patriots again started a march toward paydirt and once again the Owls helped Valley along with a 15 yard penalty and Ron Eudy hit end Kenny Chandler for another six yard pass good for the touchdown. The try for extra point after failed this time and with 9:10 left in the game Valley led 13-6.

The Patriots held the Owls following the next kickoff and forced the Owls to give the ball again. It looked like the Patriots just about had the game in the sack. However the Owls held the Patriots and took possession again at the Valley 35. The Owls then set sail toward paydirt and drove deep into Valley territory with a chance of winning with a TD and a 2-point PAT but the Patriots stopped the Owls and ran out the clock.

It was a good win for Valley for the Patriots had lost three games in a row, one of them a district game with Sudan.

The Patriots lost Ron Eudy late in the first period when he was knocked out of action and did not play the remainder of the first half. During the second period Jimmy Woods' high school career ended when he suffered an injury to a knee and he underwent surgery for torn ligaments at an Amarillo hospital Saturday morning. He is reported to be recovering

satisfactorily, but he will play no more football since he is a senior at Valley. Eudy, the senior quarterback, was able to return to action during the second half. He was replaced by sophomore Kirk Proctor, who did a very creditable job. About midway of the last period Kenneth Helms, a very fine two-way performer, was struck down with a back injury. Kenneth was carried from the field by ambulance (he was protesting saying that he was all right) and carried to Lubbock where it was determined that he had suffered a pinched nerve. The injury was very painful but is not believed serious. He has been on the practice field in shorts this week and is scheduled to see the doctor today (Thursday) to be re-examined to see when he can resume football.

The Patriots will host the Childress JV team here Thursday night in a non-district game. The Patriots will be out to even up their season record at three wins and three losses. The JV Bobcats will be tough and the Valley team will have to play its best to notch another win.

Next week is Homecoming Week for Valley and they will be host to the Happy Cowboys.

This week's game with Childress is scheduled to start at 7:30 which will be 30 minutes earlier than previous games.

To date the Valley Junior High team is undefeated this season, owning wins over Tulla, a 20-8 win over Spur, a 34-0 win over Silvertown and a 42-0 win over LCC. The locals will go to Childress Thursday night of this week to tangle with the Bobcats.

The JV team lost to Silvertown 6-0 and to Kress 42-0.



## AN OPEN LETTER TO THE VOTERS OF THE 13th CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT FROM CONGRESSMAN JACK HIGHTOWER

Two years ago I was elected to Congress by an overwhelming margin against an incumbent Congressman. During the 1974 campaign I refrained from any personal attacks on my opponent.

At that time I made it a point with my volunteers and my staff that they should treat anyone who opposed me with the utmost respect. I thank all of my friends, supporters and staff for keeping the 1974 campaign on the highest level possible.

Responsiveness of government was a key issue. Our government does a poor job when it compounds our problems with red tape and burdensome regulations. Bureaucratic brush-offs of legitimate requests are very frustrating. I decided to organize my staff in such a way that people could deal at the local level with the bureaucratic maze of the federal agencies.

I promised two years ago that you would be able to call a number in the district and get an answer. When I took office I immediately established district offices in Amarillo, Vernon, and Wichita Falls—staffed by personnel who have been instructed personally to be responsive to the wishes and needs of my constituents. I am pleased that many people have told me they appreciate the work and attitude of my assistants. This is the only way I know to have a responsive Congressional office and I assure you I intend to try to improve this service constantly.

The Postal Service has been a bigger mess than ever since the Nixon Administration reorganized it. This is one reason I have chosen not to flood the mails with political propaganda such as newsletters. My alternative has been to communicate through the news media and to come home to the district at every opportunity for personal contact with constituents. All you ever heard about Washington having an artificial atmosphere is true. It has been my experience that the worst Congressmen are those who rarely come home. I am not going to let that happen to me. My policy is to talk with the people at home to see what they are thinking, and return to Washington and vote their philosophy and interests. I live in the district and commute to Washington.

As many of you know, I am being attacked, broadside, by my opponent in this 1976 campaign. His allegations and innuendos are based upon a misrepresentation of the record. I have voted in my two committees—Agriculture and Small Business—and on the floor in exactly the way I have reported to you and as I promised. My record is conservative by any measure. It is also independent of domination either by the Democratic leadership of the House or the Republican White House. I am neither an obstructionist nor a rubber stamp.

As this Congress adjourns, its overall record is mixed. This Congress has done some things it should not have done and left undone some things it should have done—such as enacting a "sunset" bill to cut down on federal bureaucracies or formulating an effective energy plan. We have been able to enact a bill to provide for prompt payment for the cattleman. We were able to pass a bill to provide for some relief on the estate tax problem which should benefit everyone who wants his or her property to remain in the family. These steps are not enough but they are movement in the right direction.

All of us feel sometimes that our views are not reflected properly in Washington. I would prefer a Congress that holds a tighter rein on spending, but I do not choose the other 434 members of the House. I work with them and try to influence them, but I cannot dictate their votes. I feel my job is to represent you—the people of the 13th District—and I pledge to do my best to represent you well.
