I have heard it said that we begin to die the moment that we are born-this is quite true in one sense of the word but we also have a lot of growing to do before the final glorious hour comes to each of us. Yes, growth is hard work. It takes time to discover, discipline, and discern what is worth spending time on to encourage personal

First of all we need a good clear observation of the problem or lesson to be handled. We need to focus on and observe people well. As you observe people--imitate the good traits you see in people-soon it will be second nature for you to act in the same way--By the same token avoid those traits you see in others that you dislike. For example study a person who is undiciplined--Would you like to cope with the problems caused by non-dicipline? If not, avoid this type of life style. Work out a life style that is satisfactory for you and pleasing for your family.

Next, you need to observe needs and opportunities. No matter how talented you are, if there is no need for your talent you are wasting your time trying to sell the talent. Therefore try to develope your personal life through experiences that are beneficial to you and your family. If you are afraid to take a risk--you will be quite safe but will you gain your wishes for your future? As an example, if you are shy and an opportunity to work in the public eye at a job you really want and think you could do well comes along-To succeed at the job you must conquer your shyness so that you can truly enjoy your job--GROWTH!

Another way to grow is through books . Biographies help us to learn from the experiences of others. Idea-related books that challenge our old ways of doing things and old attitudes. Self-help books give us practical suggestions for daily living. Inspirational books can inspire us emotionally or spiritually. One such book is the

You can also grow by listening. Not only listen to what people say but what they don't say. You can also listen to people by observing their body language--their words may say one thing while eyes, hands, feet speak a different version.

Mostly we need to train ourselves to recognize an opportunity when it is presented -- even if it is presented in the form of a problem--catch it, work with it and go ahead and start growing!! Discipline yourself for true growth!



# **Fire Safety Can Save Holiday Spirit, Lives**

'Tis the season to be jolly, so keep the holiday spirit uncharred this December by practicing fire safety at home and in the workplace.

On the average, a Christmas tree caught fire somewhere in Texas every day last December, and each fire caused about \$42,000 in property damage, according to State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson. "During the holiday months of 1990, 32 residential fires related to Christ-mas trees caused 13 civilian injuries, two fire service injuries and property damage totalling \$1.4 million," he said. "Another 19 resi-dential fires involved holiday decorations and caused property damage amounting to \$97,000. In business properties, there were six fires that caused damage of \$68,000." Emerson warned consumers that

natural Christmas trees are particularly dangerous. "All of the Christmas tree fires reported dur-ing holiday months in 1990 were natural products, not artificial trees," he said.

"It's important to remember that cut trees are not living and that it's essential to keep them as moist as possible. The longer a tree is kept in the home, the more likely it will be involved in a fire," Emerson added.

tree fires occurred on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day or after, even through the first two weeks of Janu-

Carefully inspect light strings, cords, plugs and receptacles. Check for worn or frayed insulation and loose conections. If the item is damaged, throw it away.

Don't overload electrical circuits extension cords. Read and follow directions on cord labels regarding connecting light strings and exten-

Use plastic holders for string lights. avoid nailing through wires or wrapping wires around nails.

Use only lights that have been laboratory tested. Check for UL or Factory Mutual labels.

Remember general safety rules throughout the holiday season: Check your smoke alarm each week. If you don't have a smoke alarm, buy and install one. (State law requires the installation of smoke alarms in rental property.)

Keep all heating equipment at least three feet away from any combustible items, especially up-holstered furniture, bedding, Christ-

The Weatherization Assistance

Program is not a renovation nor rehabilitation program; therefore the program does not address cosmetic improvements or other work which does not directly affect the

energy efficiency of your house.

The condition of every house is different. An assessment will be made of your house to identify the location of cracks, holes and areas where air escapes. In winter, this means cold air entering the house and warm air escaping. Naturally in summer, this works in reverse hot air enters and, if you use an air conditioner or evaporative cooler, expensive cool air escapes.

The following work may be per formed to decrease your house's air leaks and energy consumption: Caulking, repairing/replacing doors; repairing/replacing windows or broken glass panes; reglazing loose glass panes; patching holes where air is entering the house; patching holes in floors and ceilings; installing electric switch and outlet gaskets; weatherstripping doors; in-stalling threshold covers and doorsweeps; wrapping accessible exsed water pipes, installing insu lating blankets on non-energy effi-

The Weatherization Assistance Program limits the amount of money that can be spent on a house for weatherization improvement. Weatherization costs and the work done on a house will vary based on the condition of the house and the availability of funds.

At a minimum, the tasks identithe individual budget permits, the following areas are also evaluated and a determination made of the need for: insulation of ceiling, installation of storm windows; installation of solar screens.

Applicants are required to qualify by income guidelines.

# Use Care In Decorating For Holiday

USE CARE IN DECORATING FOR SAFE HOLIDAY SEASON

Decorating is half the fun of the holidays. But those festive items that brighten your home and office can darken your holiday cheer if they aren't handled safely. If you're using a fresh-cut Christ-

mas tree, Texas Safety Association reminds you to keep it fresh by adding water every day. Over 600 fires are started by Christmas trees each year. Keep your tree away from fireplaces and space heaters and use electric lights, not candles. Use care in picking the tree, too. If the tips of the branches won't bend without breaking, the tree is al-

Artificial trees should be labeled flame-retardant. Never put electric lights on a metal tree

Inspect strands of lights for fraying, bare wires, loose connections, and broken sockets. Make sure that they carry the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) symbol, and that out-door lights are labeled for outdoor Unplug lights when you leave the house or go to bed.

Tinsel, garlands, and evergreen wreaths shouldn't be hung too close heat sources. Be especially care ful with candles. Keep them out of a child's reach, and always extinguish them when leaving the room.

Holly berries and mistletoe are poisonous. Poinsettias are not, but eating the leaves can lead to an upset stomach. Man-made decora tions may contain toxic materials, too. Teach children that decorations are for fun, not food. Avoid henging breakable ornaments near the bottom of the tree, where children and pets can reach them

If you use a fireplace for holiday warmth, keep a screen in front of it to keep flying sparks off carpets and furniture. And don't burn gift wrap-pings-they may contain dyes that will give off toxic fumes. Put the wraps in the trash can instead, or recycle them next year!
