# **Ordinance** Passed **ForHotel-Motel Tax**

On August 6, 1990, the City Council for the City of Quitaque met in a regular meeting.

Revenues from this tax must be used for the purposes of promot-ing tourism and certain other

# **Trooper Testing Dates Changed**

V. J. Cawthon, Regional Com-mander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock has an-nounced a change in testing dates for those persons interested in be-coming a State Trooper. "Even though we have not announced a beginning date for the next academy, we are actively seek-ing applicants in order to begin the testing and background stages.

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
