



INVITATION TO BID Predator Hunting SUPERINTENDENT'S Laws Changed

It is now legal, with the proper permit, to hunt predator animals: feral hogs, bobcats, foxes, coyotes and cross breeds of coyotes and dogs, from airplanes or helicopters.

The bill, sponsored by Senator Steve Carriker, Democrat of Roby, became one of the new laws effective Friday.

Written specifically to eliminate feral hogs, the law allows the management of wildlife, including counting, photographing, relocat-ing or capturing, by use of aircraft, according to Capt. Harold Oates of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement division

Applicants for the permits must file affidavits with the department stating the kind and number animals to be taken, a list of counties and landholdings involved and reasons why the permit should

be issued.
In addition, permit holders, within 30 days of the end of each calendar quarter or on termination of the permit, must file a report showing the permit holder's name and address, the number and description of animals involved, a description of the area and dates of

flights taken.

There is no limit to the number of permits landowners may obtain. "Probably, the pilot of the helicopter and a designated shooter, will do the shooting," Oates said.

Matt Curry, a spokesman for Carriker, said that their office would assist anyone with the application process who may want to organize an aircraft hog hunt.

He further said that the Texas Department of Agriculture maintains a clearinghouse of hunters for landowners who do not want to hunt the animals themselves

"If you want hunters to go in, they'll come in on a fee basis and hunt your hogs," he said.
