Quitaque Residents To Be International Educators

James ("Duke") and Mary Woods recently completed training to become community educators on international development, as part of an innovative new program, sponsored by Volunteers in Overseas Cooperative Assistance (VOCA), entitled "Share the Experience."

Under the Program, the Woods and more than 100 other U.S. farmers and agricultural specialists—all of whom have also lived and worked overseas as VOCA volunteers—will make presentations to community groups throughout the Midwest on topics ranging from global interdependence to foreign aid. The first 20 "Share the Experience" educators received training at a workshop, held October 30 to November 2, 1990 in Des Moines.

"We live in an interdependent world," notes VOCA Vice President Joan Leavit, "and it's important for Americans to understand, not only the extent of that interdependence, but also how it affects us and how we can contribute to a more prosperous and more secure global future."

Who better than people like the Woods, Americans who know about international development first-hand, to convey these messages to their communities?"

"Duke" Woods, whose experience is as a farmer and equipment technician, and his wife, Mary, have served as VOCA volunteers in the African nation of Cote d'Ivoire (1988, 1989). Following their "Share the Experience" training, they are preparing presentations for professional, educational, reli-

gious, social and other community groups.

VOCA is a private, non-profit organization, based in Washington, D.C., that provides voluntary short-term technical assistance at the request of cooperatives, private-sector agricultural enterprises and government agencies in developing countries and emerging democracies.

1990 Revenue Reconciliation Act Effective December 1

On December 1, 1990 the new additional taxes will go into effect on gasoline and diesel.

The gasoline tax of 9 cents per gallon will go to 14 cents per gallon. The diesel tax of 15 cents per gallon will go to 20 cents per gallon.

The Highway Trust Fund will receive 2.5 cents per gallon of the increase while 2.5 cents will be allocated to Deficit Reduction.

The office of the Secretary of Energy states that over 63 percent of all petroleum consumed in this country is used for transportation. About two-thirds of that figure is used for automobiles and light trucks.

Therefore each time a gallon of gas is not used in our cars it will mean more to go to transport food, crops, etc. to markets without having to purchase more foreign oil.

Burial was in the Abernathy Cemetery under direction of Chambers Funeral Home.

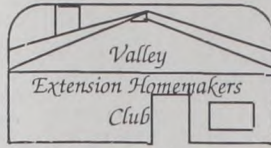
She died at 8 p.m., Wednesday in the Methodist Hospital after a brief illness.

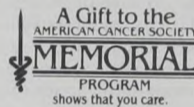
Mrs. Herrington Attends Shower For Daughter

Texans Not Unique In Allergies

According to allergy specialists, Texas is not unique in its number of natural enemies to allergy sufferers. However, word that other people, too, suffer from itchy eyes, runny noses, sneezing, headaches, general fatigue and other symptoms hardly improves an allergic Texan's disposition.

For many Texans, one of the most miserable seasons of the year is about to arrive, with the onset of cold weather. At about the time of the first frost, "cedar fever" will descend with the wind blown pollen that causes it.

Cedar fever is an allergic reaction to pollen of the male mountain cedar. The mountain cedar, which is actually two species of juniper, is indigenous statewide, but is especially concentrated in Central Texas. In a typical year, these wild shrubs release pollen from mid-November to mid-March.

Dennis Perrotta, director of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Epidemiology Division, said that cedar fever is second only to ragweed allergy in the number of Texans it affects. "The severity of cedar allergy may be greater in individuals than is ragweed allergy," he said. "Even people able to resist other allergies may suffer from cedar fever. Also, the severity of their reactions may vary from year to year."

For people with numerous allergies, cedar fever may compound earlier reactions to ragweed and fall elm pollen in November, and be further aggravated by oak, elm, pecan and other pollens in March. In addition, humidity at any time can increase the number of mold spores--another allergen--in the air.

"People in the midst of a pollen allergy attack may wonder about its seriousness. If there is any consolation for them, it is that while most reactions are uncomfortable, they are temporary. Relatively mild cases may be controlled with over-the-counter antihistamines," Perrotta said.
