Hall and Briscoe Time To File County Decline In Sales Tax Rebates

Texas Comptroller John Sharp last week delivered a total of \$230.9 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,072 Texas cities and 111 counties, including a record \$40.3 million to the city of Houston.

The monthly sales tax re bates grew by an average of 4.8% over payments made in February of 1994.

However, Hall County and Briscoe County refund was down. Hall County had declined 5.01% over the February 1994 report. Briscoe County had a decline of 7.87% for the same period of time. Other surrounding counties were Collingsworth with a decline of 6.22%, Donley County had a decline of 16.45% and Motley County a decline of 20.42%.

Are the citizens of these counties not trading at home as they should?

have to call a number in perhaps Timbucktoo. When you finally reach the office, you will get an answering machine which tells you to hold, then on comes the loud "funeral" music. Ten minutes later you will finally get a person who then tells you that you have the wrong department and they can not help you with your problem and you must redial the new number. You, then hang up and dial the new number.

When you finally reach a person, they will listen to your tale of woe and promptly tell you that they can not help you but they will connect you with another person who can. After waiting several more minutes, you get to tell you tale all over again--and if you are lucky this is the right person, if not, you will continue repeat the story every time a new party comes on the line. Finally you get to the right party and they tell you that a company representative will call at your convenience! And you think, allright at last some service! Wrong, by now "to your convenience" would have been yesterday!

These large companies still want to collect money for their services" to our small communities which by the way were the backbone of their companies in the beginning. They do not seem to realize that the small towns are what probably put them where they are today!

Is there any thing that we as an individual or as a town can do to stop the trend of the large companies moving their offices from our midst? Probably not because most of the services that they offer, they have a monoply on in the small towns. We can however let them know that we disagree with their policies to move or close their offices and no longer offer good service. But we need to let the head fellows know how we feel. The local representatives are in the middle just like we are, working people trying to keep a job so that they can take care of their families.

We need to trade at home and help keep our local businesses afloat but also the local businesses that have their roots elsewhere need to give some consideration to the small towns who are so dependent upon their services!



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
