Patriots Speed To District Title

The Valley Patriots raced to the team track championship at last week's District 3ATrack Meet. The Patriots scored 121 points to easily outdistance runnerup Happy, who finished with 93 points. Derrick Cruse and Ramiro Ramos each won a gold medal in a field event to get the team started

quickly. Cruse jumped 5' 10" to win the high jump, while teammate Douglas Payne cleared 5' 8" to finish third. Cruse also placed second in the Long Jump with a jump of 18' II" and Clif Yeary placed third with 18'8'

Ramos threw the Shot Put 44' 6 1/2" to win the event while teammates Rodney Fuston and Robert Mendoza threw 42' 10 1/2" and 41' 1 1/2" to finish second and fourth.

The top four from each event will compete in the Area Track Meet tomorrow. Anthony Ortiz also qualified for the Area Track Meet by placing fourth in the Triple Jump with a leap of 36' 6 3/4". Ortiz also placed fifth in the High Jump while Payne jumped 34' 8 1/2" to finish sixth in the Tiple Jump.

In the running events, Valley qualified both relays for the Area Meet. The 400 meter relay fin-ished fourth while the 1600 meter relay finished third. Senior Justin Lucero and freshman Fidel Valdes join Cruse and Yeary on the 400 meter relay. The 1600 meter relay is made up of Valdes, Daniel Alanis, Adam Ortiz, and Gary Chavez.

The Patriots scored 30 points in the hurdle events, qualifying all hurdlers for Area. Tyler Messer, Anthony Ortiz, and Justin Wilks finished second, third, and fourth in the 110 meter hurdles, while Wilks, Yeary, and Messer finished third, fourth, and fifth in the 300 meter hurdles.

Cruse qualified for Area in the 200 meter dash by finishing fourth, while Juan Mendoza and Robert Valdes barely missed extending their season by finishing fifth and sixth in the 1600 meter run. Lucero finished fifth in the 100 meter dash, whileAdam Ortiz and Gary Chavez finished fifth and sixth in the 400 meter dash.



The Cotton Team will compete at state on April 27th at the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock. This spring wildflowers growing along T exas' roadways will be enjoyed by many, but looks can' be deceiving. Nestled among these spring flowers is a blue flowered form of branched broomrape. That is a parasitic weed that looks much like a wildflower, but is a threat to agricultural production if not properly contained. Broomrape can actually lower crop pro-ductivity. The branched broomrape stands 4 to 12 inches tall. It's best recognized by its yellow straw colored stems and blue snapdragon like flowers. Major spreading of broomrape has been done by highway mow-ers. Department of Transportation officials are currently experimenting with different chemical andications on radaways in an attornet to specificate the second state of the second stat with different chemical applications on roadways in an attempt to conain branched broomrape.

Do You Really Know What You Are Feeding Your Horse?

Top quality roughage is vital in equine nutrition. Quality roughage assists in maintaining a healthy digestive system. However, maturity is the main contributing factor in the nutritional value of hay. Characteris-tics of good quality roughage include a high leaf to stem ratio, cleanliness, and a fresh smell and appearance. Bales that are bright green in color are normally full of vitamins and carotene. Moldy hay should never be fed. In addition, check the bales for dirt, dust, or trash. This may indi-cate careless harvesting and may be harmful to the horse. The horses cate careless harvesting and may be harmful to the horse. The harvest season also affects the quality. Horse owners may also mix grass hay with legumes to provide a tasty meal for their horses that is safe, palatable, and moderate in nutrient content.

USDA scientists have developed a technique turning chicken feathers into paper. The first commercial use for this process may be home and office air filters. Traditionally, most of these filters are made from wood pulp. Feather fiber is finer than wood pulp. Wood pulp filters have a width three times bigger than that of feather fiber filters. The feather fiber filters have smaller holes trapping more spores, dust, and dander . Fine filterion radives allergies and sick building syntrome. Feather Fine filtration reduces allergies and sick building syndrome. Feather fiber can also replace the wood pulp used to make paper. Only half as many trees are needed because chicken feather composite paper is made of 51 percent feather fiber and 49 percent wood pulp.

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




