

\$880,400 Awarded In 4-H Scholarships

by Ronda Alexande County Extension Agent State 4-H Roundup is a time for

many events. It is when 4-H'ers who have placed 1st or 2nd in their District competitions exhibit their skills and compete for the honors of being the state champions and it is also the time 4-Hers to compete for for scholarships.

This year has definitely pushed Texas 4-H over the top as the largest, single scholarship donor in the United States. \$880,400 worth of scholarships were awarded to 123 Texas 4-H'ers. These scholarships ranged from \$500 to \$15,000. Getting one of these scholarships involves a variety of things. Of course, the first step is having good/excellent grades and SAT/ACT scores; next is 4-H involvement. These two factors

are considered and all of the 4 Hers applying are then ranked. The top ranking group then qualifies for an interview at State 4-H Roundup. Once a 4-Her has qualified for an interview, they are guaranteed some of type of scholarship. The interview then makes the difference according to their rank on how much of a scholarship they get.

The key to getting all of these factors together is a 4-H Recordbook. The 4-H'er who has put out the required effort to make a good recordbook, will have an excellent chance at one of these scholarships. At the very least, this 4-H'er will have become a well-rounded individual in learning about record keeping, leadership, citizenship and life. County 4-H recordbooks will be due on July 9th to the Extension Office, if you would like more iformation about scholarships or recordbooks, please come by the Extension

Summer School

Valley School began it's Summer School program for the 1993 school year on Monday, May 31, 1993, with a total of 47 students enrolled. These student ranged in ages from those going to begin kindergarten to those preparing the be in the fifth grade next year

Summer drew to a close on Friday, June 25, 1993 after spending four fun-filled weeks learning about various Indian Tribes. Each student was assigned a tribe, however they spent their time learning about many different tribes.

Teachers for this year's Summer School program we: Mrs. McBee, Miss Johnson, Mrs. Lemons and Mrs. Hinojosa. Teacher's Aides were: Judy Barrett, Belinda Barrett and Sylvia Castillo. The kindergarten helper was Jamie Wellman.

During the past month each student spent numerous hours working in areas of reading, writing, math, language and history. The students prepared history. journals where they enter Indian writings almost daily. They learned about the importance of the Indian's headdresses and the meaning of the different feathers used in decoration. They discussed the different tribes and each of their tribal cultures, food, homes, clothes, beliefs, religions, rituals. tools, weapons and alphabet.

The Indians caste system and oney was taught through the students earning wampum (beads). Students were awarded wampum for their behavorial and working efforts and then in turn each child was allowed to spend their earned money at the Trading Post. The students were allowed to purchase special items

The children spent time learning about the many Indian Chiefs and Heros, such as the well known Cynthia Ann and Quanah Parker. Others of much interest to the children were: John Smith, Sequayah, Pochantas, Squanto and Sacajawea.

Students watched educational films entitled "The Great Indian Wars" and "Stories at Sundown.

Interesting books read were: Dragonfly's Tale, Legend of the Bluebonnets, Brother Earth-Sister Sky, Legends from Keepers of the Animals and Legends from Keepers of the Earth. In keeping with customs of the Legends from


times the students made Indian masks, drums, patterns, vests, teepees, maracos, waterbags, concho belts, headbands, blankets and village shadow boxes. Each student was allowed to decorate and design their own t-shirt, and to help with the decorating and designing of a beautiful Indian Blanket Quilt.

The highlight of each week was the field trip taken each Friday. The first week the students enjoyed a tour of the Caprock southwest of Quitaque, where they saw sights of The Valley of the Tears, Historical Landmarkers, Gray Mule Cemetery and the Quitaque and Los Linguis Rivers. Their wonderful Tour Guide was Steve Ulrey from the Quitaque Chamber of Commerce.

The following Friday they group enjoyed touring the home of Otho Stubbs, well known artist. The students enjoyed his tour and program where they viewed many of his paintings and saw sights such as, diamondback rattlesnakes, siamese calves, skunks, badgers, antique guns and his enormous collection of arrowheads, dating back hundreds of years



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
