a wasp or honeybee is to stay a asafe distance away," says Dr. Robert Fromm, Jr., Director of Emergency Services at the Methodist Hospital Dr. Fromm says swatting at them
with your hand may just stir them up, so its best to just move away as fast as you can. "If you should
disrupt a nestor beehive, run!" says disrupt a nest or beehive, run! says
Dr. Fromm.
Certain flying insects, like the Certain flying insects, like the
honeybee, can sting just once, but honeybee, can sting just once, but
several will strike several times and several will strike several times and
that means more poison penetratthat means more poison
ing your skin. "Nausea, vomiting, shortness of
breath, weakness and generalized breath, weakness and generalized
swellingusually mean aloto to fvenom swellingusuallymean a oto tof venom
has been secreted into the skin" has been secreted says Dr. Fromm. If you notice those symptoms, it's time to see a
doctor.' If you are stung by a honeybee, the bee will eave its sthnger stuck
in your skin along with a small sack which contains venom. Don't
squeeze it! Dr. Fromm advises gqueeze it: Dr. Fromm avises venom will not penetrate.
All insect thtings will duce some localized swelling, redness of the ekin, pain and an itching
sensation. The best way to treat sensation. The best way to treat
most stings is tp apply ice for the
swelling and a lotion or cream to relieve the itching." says Dr.
Fromm, "but try toresist the urge to scratch the affected area since that often causes an infection."
