erson that has voted for me or had a kind word of support throughout these years. Sincerely,





Bridge To The Future

(NAPS)-Whether it's the ma-(NAPS)—whether it's the ma-jestic beauty of the Golden Gate Bridge, the architectural marvel of the Brooklyn Bridge or the great sweeping expanse of the Verrazano-Narrows, a bridge is a sight to behold.

Halfway around the globe, Hong Kong holds a special treat for all bridge lovers. The Tsing Ma Bridge, the world's longest road-and-rail suspension bridge, links three historic islands to each other, the mainland and modern times

modern times. The "Ma" end of the bridge is Ma Wan Island, where a small community nestles in a Qing Dynasty pirate's lair. It still needs its own ferry service to reach the mainland reach the mainland.

Facing Ma Wan is Lantau Island, whose green hills are dot-ted with Buddhist monasteries and nunneries where vegetarian meals or silence are the orders of the day.

Plans are now underway to build a Hong Kong Film City theme park on Tsing Yi Island, the "Tsing" side of the bridge. As a result, the Tsing Ma Bridge—a sightseeing attraction in its own right—may soon become a global symbol of Hong Kong.


