## Tax Pamphlet Available at Appraisal Office

Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser for the Briscoe County Appraisal District, offers area property owners a 1993 pamphlet called Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Remedies Rights, Responsibilities to help them save on their property taxes.
Published by the State

Comptroller's Austin, the Office "Remedies" pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and offers sug-gestions for possible tax savings.

"Appraisal district staff can offer more information about special land appraisal, tax renditions and exemptions," Fleming said.

The chief appraiser pointed out though that over-65 homeowners do not need to reapply for the exemption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year. Only those who became 65 during 1992 and those who have never had the exemption and tax ceiling must apply in 1993.

pamphlet describes other exemptions available, such as those for disabled veterans, disabled persons and senior citizens.

'A tax freeze, or ceiling, on residence homestead for total school taxes is a benefit for homeowners who were 65 or older on January 1 of this year. "Fleming said.

"I urge all property owners in the Briscoe County Appraisal District to read the pamphlet and learn about all possible property tax relief," Fleming said. "Rementaxpayers must file "Remember applications with the appraisal office by April 30 and any protest by May 31 of

The pamphlets are available in the appraisal district office.
