TAX CODE REVISIONS SHOULDN'T BE OVERLOOKED Farmers prefiguring their final tax bill for 1970 should not over-look those 1969 revisions in the Federal tax code, many of which went into effect for the first time this year, reminds County Agent Jackie D. Johnson.

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 contains nine provisions that deal specifically with reporting income from the farm, as well as numerous other changes that affect all

Producers would do well to consult the new regulations before deciding whether to buy (or sell) a particular item between now and the end of December—or whether

it would be more advantageous taxwise to wait until 1971.

Two of the Act's provisions af-fect the reporting of income from sales of livestock purchased for draft, breeding, sporting, or dairy

purposes.

Formerly, all such income could be treated as capital gains, which are taxable at the lower capital

gains rate.

Livestock used in the farm business were specifically exempted from recapture of depreciation. Depreciation claimed in the past could then be deducted from ordinary income at the usual rates. Under the new law, the gain on the sale of livestock is to be treated as ordinary income, rather than

ded as ordinary income, rather than capital gain up to the full value of previous depreciation deductions. This applies to depreciation taken after 1969.

NATIONAL FARM - CITY WEEK The period from November 20-26 is National Farm - City Week, so few for their food and fiber needs.

The 5% of our population en gaged in agricultural production gives the other 95% food and fi-ber unsurpassed anywhere. In 1969 we spent only 165% of our incomes for food as compared with 24% some 20 years ago and with 24% some 20 years ago and this despite the fact the producer is getting about nine cents less out of every food dollar than he received 20 years ago. Production expenses have continued to rise; thus, keeping the cost - price squeeze a major problem for agricultural producers.

Producers are continually sear-

Producers are continually sear-ching for better and more effi-cient ways to keep the food and fiber lines filled. Today the U. S. farmer produces enough food and fiber for 45 people, about 39 at home and 6 abroad. A decade ago he supplied the agrallural and he supplied the agricultural need of only 24 people.

Other problems of common in-terest to farm and city residents are also cited by President Nixon in his Farm - City Week proclama-tion. He said, "With two-thirds of our population crowded onto only two percent of the land, many of our people are denied economic opportunities, adequate space, health, cultural fulfillment, and those spiritual values with-out which no nation can achieve greatness. "The time for action is at hand—for careful plans to be formulated, and for decisions to be made at local government levels, to foster the improved distribution of population and ac-companying economic activity needed during the decade of the 1970's and beyond. The Govern-ment can provide assistance, but will succeed only Americans take part in developing a policy of sound national growth. "In this effort, city dwellers and

rural people alike have reason to together toward
The well-being Americans and the welfare of rural America will increasingly in-tertwine as our total population expands. Better living in the one depends on better living in the

I have available at my office a Fact Sheet, prepared by Extension Farm Management Specialist Jas. I. Mallet, which gives in brief form important changes that will have a strong bearing on tax man-agement opportunities for farmers and ranchers.

Information contained in the Fact Sheet should be useful to all taxpayers but it should be of particular value to agriculturists. in planning tax management strategy prior to the end of the current tax year.

Some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers, including a representative number in Briscoe County, will be involved in the 1970 state ivestock survey.

During the last half of November survey questionnaires will be mailed to the selected livestock producers by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Each should fill out the questionnaire as soon as possible and return it in the enclosed envelope.

The reports will be used by the state statistician in making an accurate estimate of the cattle, hogs and chickens on the farms

There are many uses, both in and out of Texas, for this infor-mation. We use it here in the county in connection with our program building activities and in conducting educational programs

involving livestock.

The more questionnaires returned, the more accurate will be the estimates; therefore, it is im-portant that each producer in Briscoe County who receives a questionnaire, complete and return it immediately.

Spread cake with 1 cup heavy cream, whipped and flavored to taste with sugar and vanilla. Roll up the cake, using the paper as an aid, slide the roll onto a flat serving platter. Sprinkle with more confectioner sugar. (Rum or almond flavoring is also good.)






