## Texas F.H.A. Loan **Volume Largest** In Nation

J. Lynn Futch, Texas State Dir ector of the Farmers Home Administration, announced today that the agency extended credit to rural Texans in the amount of \$155, 456,817 during the 1971 fiscal year ending June 30, 1971. This credit was furnished farmers and rural residents through the many oan programs administered by th agency with rural housing leading the way with \$72,302,453. Loans for community services facilities such as rural water systems and sewer systems totaled \$24,205,192. Credit extended to individual far mers and ranchers for operating expenses, capital purchases and land purchases totaled \$58,949,172. This was the largest yearly vol-ume of loans in the history of the organization, which has as its overall mission the development of ru-

al areas.
