## County Leaders to Complete Research on Major Issues

Fifty-four of the county's key community leaders will meet on Tuesday, June 17, in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank in Silverton at 8:00 p.m. These leaders have been working in separate task forces the last two months. The four task forces work in the areas of home economics, agriculture, community development, and youth. Their objective was to identify the major issues affecting the county, now and throughout the next four years, in determining the major issues they have been developing background information on each issue.

The four major task forces have been led by Jimmy Burson in Agriculture, by Lottie Garrison in Home Economics, James Cathey in Community Development, and Kathy Frizzell in Youth. At the meeting on June 17, these leaders will present to the overall group of county leaders their respective task force findings. Task forces are temporary groups designed to address a specific problem or issue and when this is accomplished the group is disbanded. These leaders have played a vital role in the future of Briscoe County and the County Extension Program Building Committee will be requesting their help and input throughout the next four years.

**Voting Light in Quitaque Precinct**

The Democratic run-off election was held Saturday at the City Hall in Quitaque and only nineteen votes were cast. The election judge was Arnold Castillo.

John Sharp received 18 votes and P. S. Ervin one for Railroad Commissioner; for Supreme Court Justice, Place 1, Oscar H. Mauzy received five votes to 14 for Shirley Butts. For Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 2, Jim Brady received 11 votes to Robert M. Campbell's eight votes. Justice of Supreme Court, Place 4, Raul A. Gonzalez got eight votes and Jay Gibson got 11. Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, George (Jorge) Martinez got five votes to Rusty Duncan's 13. There were no local run-offs in Quitaque.

In Turkey, the voting was heavier, due partly to a local run-off between U. F. Coker, jr. and Doyle Proctor.

For Railroad Commissioner, John Sharp received 154 votes to P. S. Ervin's 21. Supreme Court Justice, Place 1, Shirley Butts 104 to Oscar H. Mauzy 56. Supreme Court Justice, Place 2, Jim Brady got 77 votes and Robert M. Campbell got 80. Supreme Court, Place 4, Raul A. Gonzalez received 33 votes and Jay Gibson 133. Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, Rusty Duncan got 127 votes and George (Jorge) Martinez got 29.

In the Hall County Precinct 4 bid for County Commissioner, U. F. Coker, jr. polled 143 votes to

102 for Doyle Proctor.

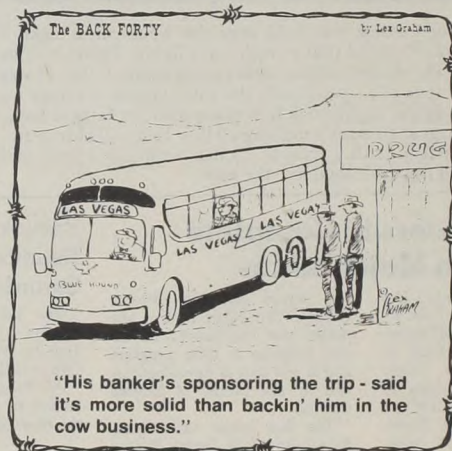

### Three Men Represent Quitaque On Memorial Trailride Event

Leroy Hamilton, his granddaughter, Vicki Hamilton, Fish Wilson and Ronnie Chestnut rode in the annual Memorial Day Trail Ride sponsored by the Randall County Sheriff's Possee to benefit the Panhandle Chapter of the Texas Head Injury Foundation.

The 65-mile ride began on May 24 at the Christian Ranch with an authentic chuckwagon breakfast complete with the chuckwagon, tin plates and cups, and all the eggs, sausage, bacon and gravy one could possibly eat. The ride began down the walls of the Palo Duro Canyons into the valley below. The slope was very steep and many of the horses, being city-raised, were very hesitant

about the steep terrain. The 54 riders all made the descent safely.

Lunch was served at the bridge in the canyons between Silverton and Claude. Everyone enjoyed roast beef sandwiches and drinks served by the Randall County Sheriff's Possee. The ride then proceeded deeper into the Palo Duro Canyons. Several horses and mules encountered quicksand and had to flounder their way out, but there was no serious injury because of this. Everyone was very tired at the end of the day and was glad to stop for the night at the Coon Creek cattle pens on the Cogdell Ranch, formerly a part of the

huge JA Ranch. There everyone fed the horses and mules and enjoyed barbecued beef for supper. Entertainment as well as education was provided by the Borger Boy Scouts, adorned with authentic Indian costumes as they presented a history of the Indians that once roamed the Palo Duro Canyons and surrounding area.

Finally everyone bedded down for the night. Fish Wilson, Leroy Hamilton and Ronnie Chestnut all slept in a tent, while Vicki, Leroy's granddaughter, slept in the cab of the pickup. All was well until a thunderstorm that lasted the rest of the night. Everyone in the tent except for Fish, who had a thick mattress, was soaked to the bone by the water coming through the floor of the tent. Fish kept the whole thing from being a disaster, however, by keeping the others entertained with his reminiscences of the days when he rode for the JA Ranch in the same area.

After a light breakfast, everyone packed up for the last day of the ride. There was a brief pause at the Burson Ranch for a worship service with a brief

message and prayer. Then everyone proceeded on through some very beautiful country. Finally, after a long, hard ride, the riders entered Caprock Canyons State Park. The most treacherous part of the ride was encountered in the park, with its steep trails and narrow passes. The horses were too tired to put up much of a fuss and went down the passes with very little trouble. A small crowd greeted the riders at the horse loading area of the park. After a hamburger supper, the participants were awarded attractive jackets, and Leroy and Fish, having ridden previously, were awarded patches to attach to their jackets.

After all was said and done, the Quitaque men all plan to do this again next year, and invite anyone else interested to accompany them.

REWARD IN CONNECTION  
WITH BRISCOE THEFT**
