Fort Worth And Denver Railway Resumes Childress to Plainview Run

The Fort Worth and Denver Railway has resumed operation of its line from Childress to Plainview through Turkey, Quitaque and Sterley, effective Wednesday, January 1, according to H. W. Baker of Plainview, who is the company's Mobile Agent.

This section of the line has been closed from Quitaque west since several cars jumped the track inside the tunnel about 10 miles southwest of Quitaque on August 4, 1973. The company estimated that cost of clearing the tunnel and resuming operation of this line was prohibitive and they leased another line and routed traffic through Crosbyton to Lubbock for several months.

The company has since had a change of mind and decided several weeks ago to reopen the tunnel and resume traffic on this line.

There will be a train running over the track twice daily just as in the past, from Childress to Plainview and return.

Mr. Baker said that it would be well for residents along the line to start looking for a train when they approach the tracks. Since no trains have been running a regular schedule for more than a year people probably have become careless about looking for a train.
