Incumbent U. S. Representative Graham Purcell (D-Texas) has announced that he will seek re-election in the redrawn 13th Congressional District in 1972.

In making the announcement, the six - term Democratic Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee's Subcommittee on Livestock and Grains. said simply, "This is where I belong." Purcell's statement thus ended speculation that he would run in the newlycreated Dallas-Fort Worth District established when the Texas Legislature redraw Congressional District lines earlier this year. The trict lines earlier this year. The announcement also set the stage for what would undoubtedly be the most difficult campaign Pur-cell would ever wage—against Re-publican Bob Price who also has his eye on the new District which combines the Panhandle and other counties eastward.

"I was greatly impressed by the show of support I received during my visits with people around the Panhandle," said Purcell, who has been serving continuously in Congress since the 87th Congress, to which he was elected in 1961 when he left his post as District Judge.
