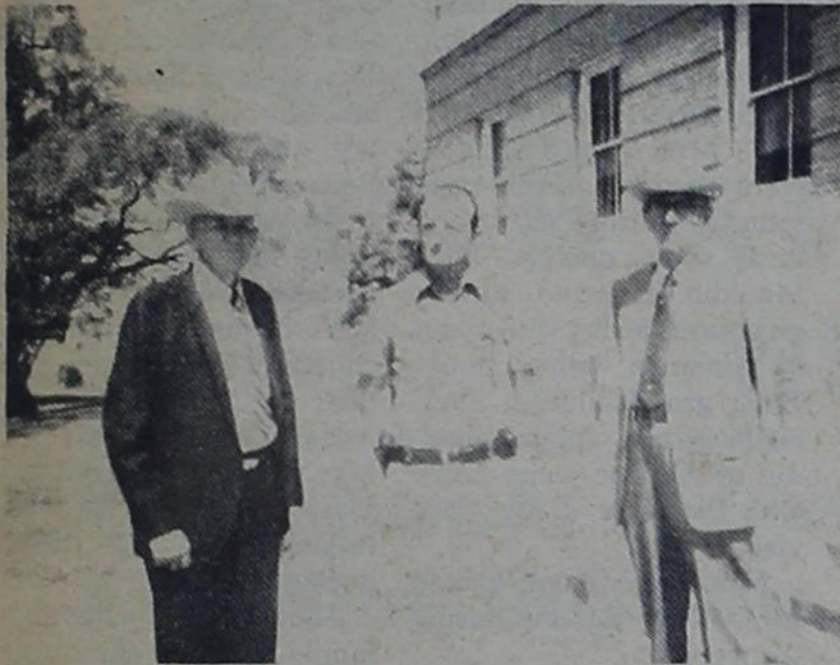

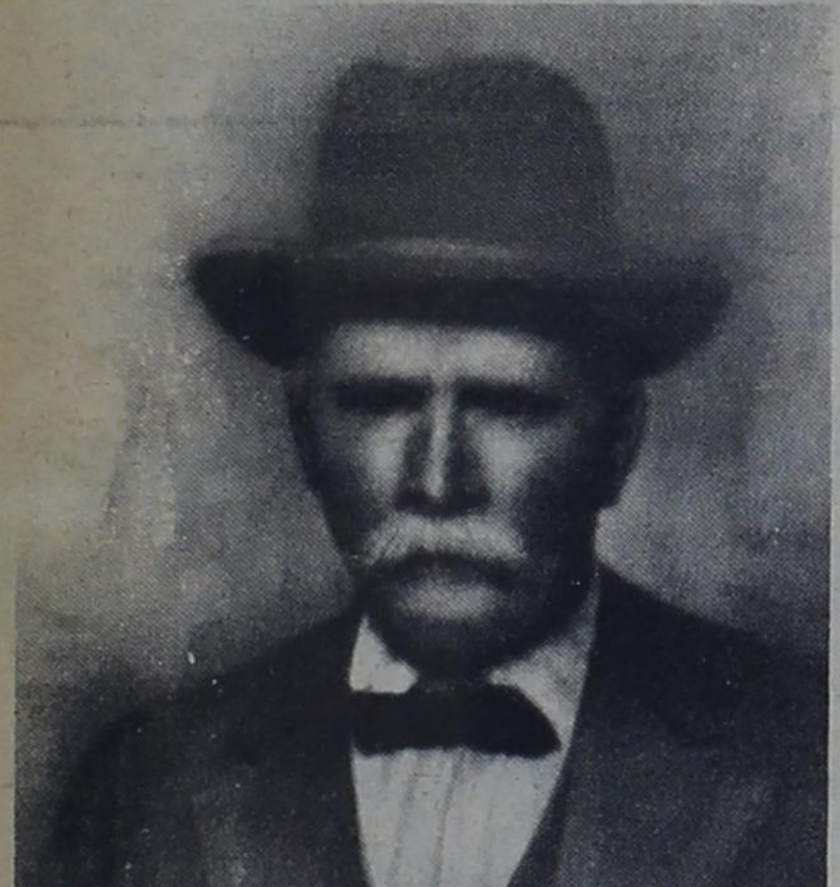

## 100th Anniversary of the 1st County Sheriff Sat.



**Past & Present Sheriffs Reminiscence**—R.L. Edwards, Callahan County sheriff from 1931 to 1938, Bill Skinner, present sheriff, and S.S. Nichols, Callahan County sheriff during 1947 and 1948, enjoy stories of past experiences during the 100th anniversary of the first sheriff of Callahan County.



**First County Sheriff**—T.J. Norrell was elected the first sheriff of Callahan County and took the oath of office July 30, 1877. He served to Jan. 7, 1879.

COUNTY—Saturday, July 30, will be the 100th anniversary of the first Callahan County sheriff's term, and preparations are in full-swing for the occasion. Present sheriff Bill Skinner, and the only three remaining sheriffs, R.L. Edwards, S.S. Nichols and Grayson Miller, along with all other county law enforcement officers will enjoy a luncheon at the U-Bar-U Steakhouse in Baird, beginning at 11 a.m. July 30.

A few people started celebrating early, however, as Mr. Edwards and Mr. Nichols paid a visit to the sheriff's office in the Callahan County Courthouse Friday, July 22, to reminisce.

R.L. Edwards, 83, sheriff from 1931 to 1938, is the oldest of the three remaining sheriffs and proudly remarked that he is the only living man that personally knew every sheriff of Callahan County. In the early part of his life, Edwards was in the cow business and then later in 1943 became a Texas Ranger. After living in San Angelo for 31 years, Edwards presently resides at 733 Clinton, Abilene. He has lived in Abilene for the past 3 years.

Edwards not only knew each of the sheriff's personally, but he also knew some amusing "jokes" on a few of them; and Friday he shared his stories.

During 1886-87 the county was experiencing a particularly bad drought, so T.J. Norrell, county tax assessor during that

BAIRD—The Baird All-Stars bowed out of the District 28 Little League tournament in a hurry last Thursday night, losing to Albany, 4-0. The game was played in 55 minutes.

Albany scored three runs in the bottom of the third when winning pitcher Jamie Garcia doubled in two runs and later scored on a single. All of the runs came after the first two batters were out.

Albany scored again in the bottom of the fifth when Garcia singled in another run. Garcia allowed Baird four hits, striking out 13 Baird batters.

Baird came up with several defensive plays and two Albany runners were thrown out at home plate. Another runner was doubled off second base and Ben Mendez made a great play, catching a foul ball against the first base dugout screen.

time, loaned county money to some of the ranchers. Word got around of his "loan", so he skipped the country and went to Pearl River, his birthplace, and stayed a year.

The ranchers paid the debt off, however, and Norrell came back and was appointed the first sheriff of Callahan County.

Edwards also told a story on J.W. Jones, second Callahan County sheriff. One of Jones' friends was being tried in a small justice court and the judge fined his friend heavily. So Jones shot one of the arms off of the woman holding the scale of justice (which was a statue on top of the courthouse) since there was "no justice".

Edwards commented that the Sheriff business has changed 100%. "When I was sheriff I did everything I wanted to do; today you have to ask the government."

Edwards never owned a pistol while he was sheriff. He also commented that during his 8 year term there was never a man indicted that he didn't bring to trial.

"There was more fun and less crime in Callahan County during this time period than ever before or since," Edwards said. "I went fishing and hunting with the old boys who were troublemakers, and I never had any trouble with them," he explained. "The kids were great, I played with them."

During Edwards' eight year service there were only 3 murders in the county. The first and biggest murder was the Kent Murder Case, and the offender was sentenced to 40 years in the penitentiary.

S.S. Nichols, sheriff during 1947 and 1948, noted that alot has changed since he was in office. Modern equipment and outside communications being some of the biggest differences in Nichols estimation. Nichols said that during his term, a red light was located on a pole atop the courthouse. When the law officers were needed, the light was turned on. Then during the last six months in office, Nichols got a receiver, but he still could not transmit messages.

During Nichols' term there were no murders, but one prisoner broke away from a deputy and fled. Three days later the man was caught in San Angelo, however. Nichols was also "jumped" twice in the jail.

Nichols also noted that there was no "Bill of Rights" to be read to each suspect while he was in office.

The kids were no problem during this time period either, Nichols commented.

Joe Pierce was Chief Deputy while Nichols was

sheriff. Other deputies included: George Clifton, Cross Plains, Sam Maynard, Putnam; and Tootsie Chatam, Hope Glover and Ruby May Stone, office deputies.

During his stay in office, Nichols said he and his staff were on call 24 hours, 7 days a week.

He has been in the station business for 26 years now, and presently resides in Abilene.

Saturday, July 30, will bring back many memories and several more stories will be exchanged around the table of the law enforcement luncheon. It will be a special day of remembering Callahan County's past and present sheriffs.

# Record Amounts of Electricity Being Used

ABILENE — West Texas Utilities Co. customers are using record amounts of electricity this summer, but generation engineers say the system is capable of supplying any demands.

Three new record peaks have been set and daily consumption is running above average. But in response to questions prompted by the recent New York blackout, WTU officials said that even though usage likely will continue increasing if the weather stays hot, the projected peak will be within the system's generation and transmission capacity.

Carl Yancy, WTU systems operation manager, said it is "highly unlikely" that a blackout similar to the one in New York could occur here.

"Of course no one can be absolutely certain, but there is no doubt in my mind that our system is reliable," Yancy said.

He explained that WTU's eight major power stations are strategically located near the load centers and that the transmission network is designed to eliminate too much dependence on one plant.

Total generating capacity is 1,055,500 kilowatts, Yancy said, and the all-time consumption peak so far

was 747,000 kilowatts, which was recorded at 5 p.m. on Monday, July 11. Last year's record peak was 725,000 kilowatts on Aug. 11.

## Interest Rate To Decrease

COLEMAN—James R. Isenhower, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman, announced today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7-3/4%. This reduction will be effective on August 1, 1977, and will affect \$1.04 billion in variable rate loans to 18,026 Texas farmers and ranchers. This billing rate change will be effective on both farm loans and rural residence loans.

The variable rate loan was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969 and provides for the rate to fluctuate with the variation in the cost of money. A more favorable money market has made this billing reduction possible. Isenhower stated, "This continues to demonstrate the Bank's policy to furnish credit to Texas farmers and ranchers at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business

practices." WTU officials have forecast a summer peak of 785,000 kilowatts, which is 270,000 kilowatts below the company's generating

capacity. This reserve of about 26 per cent is considered good by national standards. And the reserve would more than make up for the loss of the company's largest generating facility, which is the new 200,000 kilowatt unit at the Fort Phantom Power Plant near Abilene. The system also could receive back-up power from neighboring companies, Yancy pointed out. Heavy consumption occurring this summer in spite of customer efforts at conservation, company officials said. They attribute the increase to the hot weather and to the fact that WTU is serving about 3,000 more residential customers now than at the same time last year. Though the system is geared up for any emergency, company spokesmen acknowledge there is no sure guarantee against an electrical outage, particularly those caused by acts of nature. Yancy said the last system-wide blackout occurred in April, 1961, when a phone wire broke and fell into the Paint Creek substation. The outage spread throughout the system, although all service was restored completely within 40 minutes. Since then, automatic oil circuit breakers have been installed to prevent a recurrence.

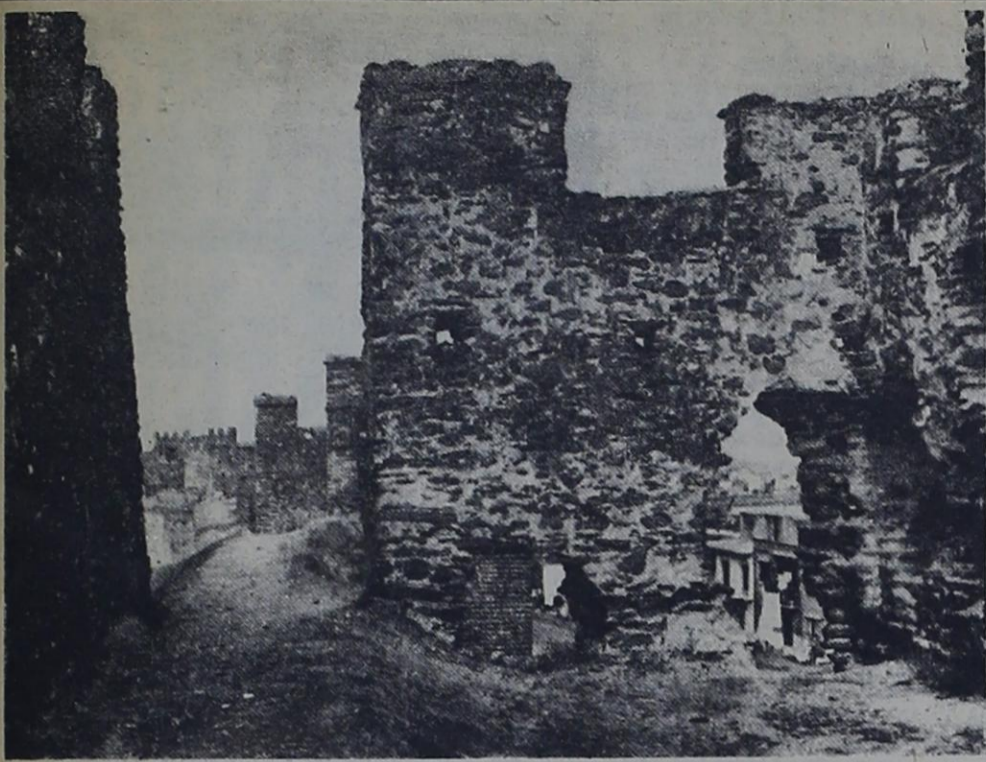

## Immunization Reminder

BAIRD-The parents of children who are entering school for the first time this fall should be aware of the state school law which requires that all children have certain immunizations before entering school.

These immunizations are a series of 3 diphtheria-whooping cough — tetanus (DPT) shots with a booster after age 4; three doses of oral polio vaccine with a booster after age 4; measles vaccine (Or a history of measles illness) and Rubella vaccine.

The Texas Department of Health and Education Agency are now recommending that a measles vaccine booster may be needed if a child received the measles vaccine before the first birthday. The family doctor can be contacted to determine if a booster is needed. The school is required to have a record of dates of each of these inoculations, therefore parents are asked to bring records with dates, so a copy can be made for school records.

A free immunization clinic will be held during the pre-registration, but parents are urged to have their child's immunizations up-to-date before that time if possible.

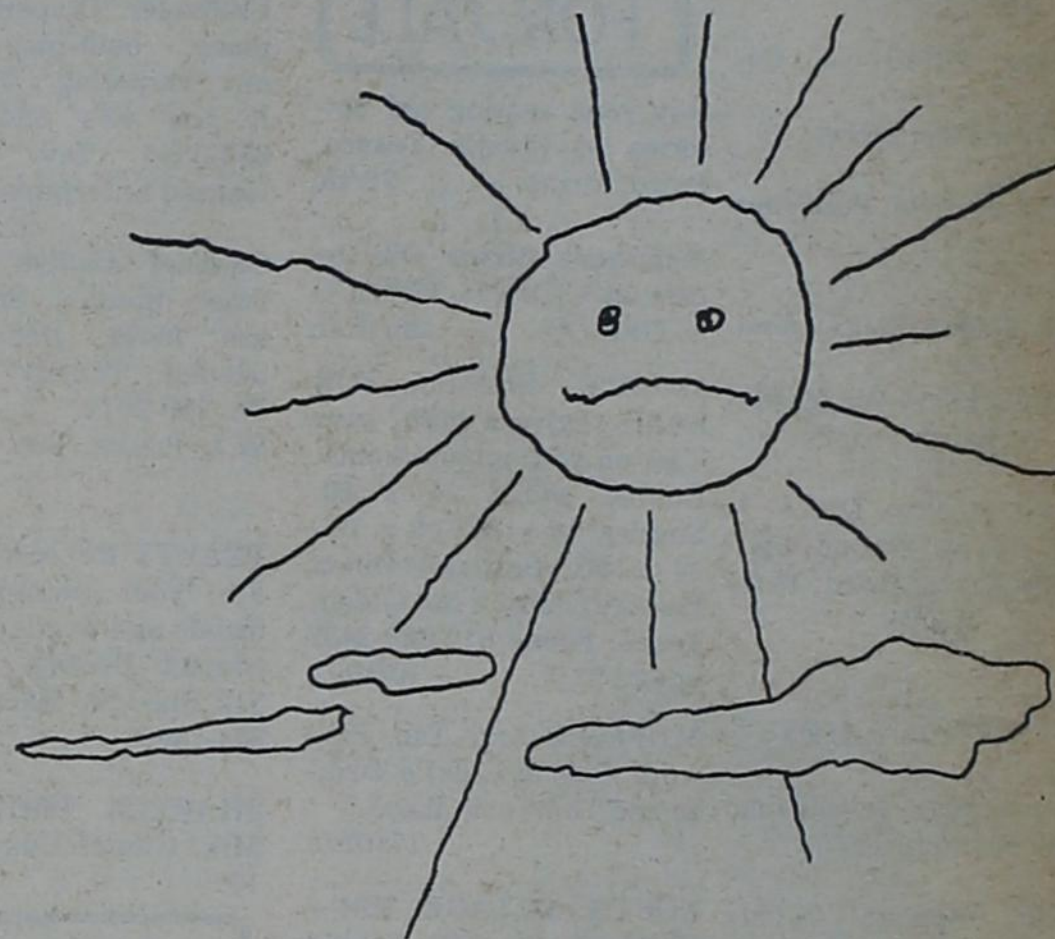

### Pesticide Workshop Set

COUNTY-Dr. Nick Wilson, Area Entomologist, has announced the dates for a training workshop for commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators. Commercial and non-commercial applicators interested in training programs for the categories: pest and pest damage, environmental considerations, field crop pest control-insect, field crop pest control-plant diseases, fruit and vegetable pest control-insects, fruit and vegetable pest control-plant diseases, weed control-crop-lands, and weed and brush control-grasslands will have an opportunity to participate in a workshop scheduled for August 9-10 at Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in San Angelo.
