



Cholesterol has received a great deal of publicity and yet many are still confused about the sources of cholesterol, its role in the body and the best way to reduce it.

Our own body produces about 80% of the total cholesterol found in blood and tissues. Only about

20% comes from our diet.
Cholesterol is ONLY found in animal sources -- meats, cheese, eggs, milk, butter (not in margarines.) There is no cholesterol in fruits and vegetables or grain products. However, once grains are made into bread with the addition of eggs and fats, the bread will have some cholesterol.

Saturated fat may also be confused with cholesterol. Saturated fats are found mostly in foods from animals, but two vegetable sources -- coconut and palm oil -- also have significant amo of saturated fat.

Both cholesterol and saturated fats are found to increase the risk of coronary heart disease. For this reason, most physicians recom-mend that high risk patients reduce the amount of cholesterol

In most people, the liver regulates the amount of cholesterol it makes depending upon the amount taken in the diet. However, for some people increases in cholesterol from the diet increases the level in the blood.

How do we reduce dietary cholesterol intake? The primary concern is moderation, NOT elimination of all cholesterol foods. Substitute margarine for butter; skim milk for whole milk; low fat cheese or that made with skim

milk, such as mozzarella, for whole milk cheeses; lean meat for meat with more fat.

Finally, become a dedicated label reader and know what information you are looking for on the label. If the product says "vegetable oil" yet the label says, "coconut or palm oil" know that

you are using a saturated fat.


