New Year's festivals, among the oldest and most universally observed, generally include rites and ceremonies expressive of mortification, purgation, invigoration over life's renewal

The earliest-known record of a New Year's festival dates back from about 2000 B.C. in Mesopotamia, where the year began with the new moon nearest the spring equinox (mid March; Babylonia) or nearest the spring equinox (mid-September; Assyria). The year began for the Egyptians, Phoenicians and Persians with the autumnal equinox (September 21st) and for the Greeks, until the 5th century B.C., with the winter solstice (December 21st). By the Roman republican calendar the year began on March 1; after 153 B.C. the official date was January 1, and this was confirmed by the Julian calendar (46 B.C.).

In early medieval times mos of Christian Europe regarder March 25th as the beginning of the year, though for Anglo-Saxor England New Year's day wa December 25th.

William the Conqueror decrees that the year start January 1 but later England began its year with the rest of Christendom on March 25th. January 1st was restored as New Year day by the Gregorian calendar (1582), immediately adopted by Roman Catholic countries. Other European countries followed suit,


