Four points are important in studying an insurance policy, ac-cording to Dorothy Powell, Coun-ty Extension Agent. First, the buyer should under-

stand what happens if he has any "pre-existing" health conditions. Second, he should know how

nuch his policy will pay per day Third, he should check time lim tations on collecting money from

the company.

Fourth, he should learn how much he must pay in premiums.

"Although most mail order pol-

icies don't require a physical ex-amonation, they do have some special limitations on benefits for pre-existing health conditions," the agent said. Most policies, for example, have
