The Briscoe County Livestock Show was the scene of a full day of activities, Saturday, January 23, 1993 at the County Show Barn in Silverton. The 1993 show included 168 steer, dairy heifer, beef heifer, lamb, prospect hog, and market hog entries, that were exhibited by Valley FFA, Silverton FFA and Briscoe County 4-H members from the Valley and Silverton Schools.

Judge Dennis Poole of Borden County named Clay Merrell's crossbred lamb Grand Champion of the show. The lamb was purchased by Valley Buyers Club for \$700.00 P Jay Merrell's 107 pound crossbred lamb was named Reserve Grand Champion of the show.

Clay Merrell's 1440 pound Maine Anjou Cross Steer which was named Breed Champion Exotic Steer and was selected as Grand Champion of the Steer Show. Judge Dennis Poole named Rickey Hughes's crossbred steer which was Reserve Breed Champion of the Cross Breed entries as Reserve Grand Champion of the show.

Brandi Price's 1120 pound bred Holstein Heifer was named Grand Champion of the 1993 Dairy Heifer Show. Entries in the show this year included three heifers in the bred class and three entries in the open heifer class.

**P.S.H.O.F Inducts Joe Ed Forbus**

Joe Ed Forbus, who was inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame last Sunday in Amarillo, is married to the former Maurine Boswell of Turkey. Maurine is the daughter of Cole and Thelma Boswell.

Mr. Forbus was a '39 graduate of Happy High School. He was one of 70 who tried out for West Texas State football team. Out of these 70, only 13 were given roster spots, and Joe Ed was one of the 13 lining up as a back when a freshman. As a sophomore he was moved to offensive guard and linebacker and became a three-year starter.

Because of his outstanding athletic ability he was selected for the All-Border Conference in 1942.

After graduating from West Texas he became the only assistant coach that the legendary Coach Chesty Walker of Phillips had. Under the Walker-Forbus guidance, the Phillips Blackhaws earned a pair of regional titles. That was the farthest advancement small schools were allowed at the time.

Forbus left coaching for a position with Phillips Petroleum Company in Phillips. Maurine was a teacher in the Phillips School System.

After retirement in 1986, the Forbuses settled in Kerrville to be near their daughter.

**Local Members Attend Texas State Meeting**

Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Blakney, Mr. and Mrs. Billy Neal Shannon, Mr. and Mrs. Larry B. Clay, Mr. and Mrs. Lee J. Browning and Max Meyer all of Hall County and Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Reed of Briscoe County joined with Texas farmers and ranchers from across Texas and expressed hope that the new Clinton Administration would help reverse the decade-long decline of the family farmers and ranchers in the state. The 89th annual Texas Farmers Union convention met in Austin from January 21 to January 23.

"Farm and ranch income has sunk faster than the Titanic. We want to work with the new administration to improve the farm economy and make rural America a better place to live. In order to do this, we need to make sure we have changes in the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) which will protect our producers from unfair trade practices," stated TFU President Joe Rankin.

The TFU urged the Clinton Administration to make changes in NAFTA and the General Agreement on Trades and Tariffs (GATT) to protect the nation's producers and consumers.

"Whether you are in agriculture or any other type of business involved in the international market, everyone knows there is no such thing as free trade. We need fair trade—a policy that would provide us an equal opportunity to compete in the world market," Rankin said. "We can no longer allow cheap foreign goods and unsafe products to replace quality American products in the marketplace."

At the state level, the TFU urged the Texas Legislature to protect the state's Homestead Law and prevent any changes which will infringe on the rights of property owners. Delegates to the convention also approved a resolution calling for a graduated state income tax with a comparable reduction in ad valorem and sales taxes.

Addressing the TFU convention this year were newly elected Speaker of the House Pete Laney, Comptroller John Sharp, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry, Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison and Texas Railroad Commissioner designee Mary Scott Nabers.

On federal issues, the convention was addressed by Congressman Jim Chapman and Congressman Charles Stenholm. NFU President Lee Swenson also spoke at the concluding banquet.


