# Some Taxpayers Right !

According to "U. S. News and World Report,"May 15, 1989 even taxpayers who did it right did it wrong. That's what the Internal Revenue That's Service is about to tell people who had to pay the alternative minimum tax a year ago when they filed 1987 incometax returns.

Everyone who paid the minimum tax, which limits the extent to which upperincome people can use deductions to slash their tax bills, now owes more money. Here's what happened: As part of the 1986 tax-reform package, Congress unintent-ionally allowed people paying the minimum tax to claim personal and dependent exemptions. Realizing their error, lawmakers retroactively revoked the exemptions in amended return late 1988.

aque The letter states "Having an income (collecting) of at least 83 cents per capita and reaching an all time high is indeed an accomplishment for which you can be proud."



Direct deposit of social security benefits to an account in a bank or other financial institution is becoming very popular. Presbecoming very popular. Pres-ently, \$8.4 billion in benefit pay-ments go directly to the bank accounts of 18 million retirement, survivor, and disability bene ficiaries. And it is predicted that 80 percent of all beneficiaries will receive benefits through direct

deposit within ten years. Why is the popularity of this method of payment growing so fast?

For many reasons: Safety -beneficiaries have the assurance that their benefits will arrive on time to their bank accounts without any chance of being lost or stolen; Freedom - the beneficiary can be out of town without having to return home earlier out of concern for the safety of the check; Convenience the money will be safe in the bank account, available to be used at any time from any place; Time saving - the beneficiaries don't have to go to the bank to deposit or cash their checks. With these advantages, there is

To the Social Security Administration, direct deposit means savings in time and cost. Studies show that it costs 30 cents

to prepare and deliver a check and that it costs four cents to process the same benefit through direct deposit

Beneficiaries have to keep social security informed of any change of address. In case of the death of a beneficiary, the family

of the deceased should notify social security. With direct deposit it is more difficult to keep track of beneficiaries if they do not notify social security of their where-abouts. If notices mailed to a beneficiary are undeliverable, and the search to locate is exhausted, the payment of benefits may be suspended.

Enjoy the advantages of direct deposit of benefits, but keep social security informed of your present address; this way both can benefit from this method of payment.





by Frieda Counts I have known of several churches being bought, moved some distances, relocated, restored and proud of. These isolated and almost forgotten houses of God. People that have a yen for these courtees are also proud of their possessions and their handy work of restoration. This must be some comforting, warming thing to know you have succeeded in the

great effort. People have moved off, passed on, and getting too old to do the work that would be required, also a longing to do these things and keep the church alive. But a lost cause for them

People call this story an "Act of God" - what or who else?

There are only two possible explanations for what you are reading. It was either the most phenomenal coincedence that ever ccured or it was an Act of God. iterally. There are a stack of Literally. statements and legal sworn documents say it is so. This happened on a rainy Thursday afternoon one hundred summers

There was just one problem with Swan Quarter, North Carolina. It was a low land, so naturally the choicest real estate was on higher ground. In the event of heavy rain the closer you were to sea level, the harder you were hit

A little more than a hundred ars ago the Methodist's of Swan Quarter had no church, the only lot available on which to build a church, was a plot of low lying

property on Oyster Creek Road. This being far from an ideal location, but they had acquired the land and construction began.

Methodist Church-the whole building, intact-was floating down the street! The flood waters had gently lifted the structure from the brick pilings, and had sent it off slowly, siler Creek Road. silently, down Oyster

Within minutes, several concerned town folks were slashing around in the creek, waist

deep, trying desperately to reach the still moving church so they could moor it with rope.

The ropes were fastened, but in in. There was no stable vain.

structure secure enough to restrain the floating chapel. As the building passed by, more attention was attracted, more aid

was enlisted. To no avail, the church moved on.

By now the building had made it to the center of the town, still on

Oyster Creek Road. There as dozens of amazed, helpless people watched, the Swan Quarter Methodist Church, still floating, a sharp inexplicable right

turn and continued down that road as if the chapel were alive -a mind of its own.

For two more blocks the towns people held on fighting the ropes to hold it back, unsuccessfully. And then, in the same decisive manner with which it had moved.

the church veered off the road, headed for the center of a vacant lot - and there - stopped.

While the flood water receeded, the church remained and is there to this day.

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The church was to be a white frame, small but sturdy, propped up on brick pilings. In 1876 the building was completed and on Sunday, September 16 a joyous dedication ceremony was celebrated. Three days later, on Wednesday, a terrible storm lashed Swan Quarter. The wind howled and the rain came down in gales

By night fall devastation. Much of the town was flooded; many homes destroyed, homes ripped The storm apart. The storm raged all through the night and into bleak

morning. By Thursday afternoon the wind had subsided, the rain stopped. For the first time in more than a day, there was almost an eerie calm. One by one the citizens of Swan Quarter threw back their curtains and shutters and peered at what was left of their homes.

Most saw only desolate waterscape, a community ravaged by water. But those within sight of Oyster Creek Road could not believe their eyes.
