

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The Superintendent's Corner

The October student attendance accounting period is over and Valley School can report an excellent figure. Despite the fact that this year's student enrollment is less than last year, the daily average is almost the same. According to the report, the average daily attendance is just over 315, compared to 316 last year. Last year membership was 334 while the most recent figure this year is somewhat less at 321 students. This is possible because an outstanding 97.8 percent of Valley students was in school every day compared to 96 percent last year.

Every student enrolled in grades K-8 received a special T-shirt if they were in attendance every day during the accounting period. When final tallies were complete, 181 students, or about 80 percent of the 230 grade school children, were awarded T-shirts. The sixth graders completed the October accounting period with the best overall percent of 99.5, followed by the second grade with 99 percent, third grade 98.7 percent, and 12th and 10th grades with 98.8 and 97.8 percent respectively. It is very unusual for elementary grades to record better attendance than high school students but this year the four highest grades with good attendance were in the elementary school.

The directors of Greenbelt Cotton Producers, Inc. have decided that the corporation has served its final purpose and has liquidated its assets. According to the by-laws of the corporation, following payment of expenses, the remaining money would be following payment of expenses, the remaining money would be distributed among the school districts within the boundaries of the corporation. The action by the directors became a windfall to Valley School because it was presented a check by director Donnie Brunson in the amount of \$3,437. According to information received from Mr. Brunson, there was \$27,752 available to be distributed among seventeen school districts. Each school's share was based upon money collected by cotton gins in each school district and was distributed. school district and was distribu-ted among the schools in the same proportion as collections

same proportion as collections were received.

The Valley School Board gratefully accepted its designated share and determined that the money should be used to further the School Vocational Program by contributing the money to a newly-created Ag Farm Fund. Funds furnished to the Ag Farm Fund will be used by Agriculture Teacher Jon Davidson to improve facilities for student animal projects.

Valley School would like to extend its thanks to Donnie Brunson, members of the corporation, and other directors of Greenbelt Cotton Producers for the contribution. It will be used mal projects.

The Robert Johnson-Shane Smith Memorial Fund continues to grow and is supporting a number of Valley student agri-cultural animal projects. Through this fund, students enrolled in agriculture at Valley School have a source through which loans can be made to purchase animals and feed. The loans are repaid when the animals are sold.

We have just received notifica-tion of the election results for Hall County Appraisal District board of directors. Five members were elected to the board by were elected to the board by votes cast by the nine taxing entities, of which the City of Turkey and Turkey-Quitaque ISD, are a part. Each entity was allowed votes based upon the tax levy for 1984. The school district was entitled to 755 votes of a possible 5000 votes within the county and the City of Turkey.

possible 5000 votes within the county and the City of Turkey received 105 votes.

Mr. U. F. Coker, a nominee of the school district, the City of Turkey and of Hall County, received 1223 votes. Lynn Bryant of Memphis received 1000 votes, Bobby Barbee of Lakeview, 854 votes, Hulen Clifton of Estelline 843, and Jack Montgomery of Memphis received 610 votes. The remaining 1570 votes were distributed among other candidates.

HOLIDAY WILL END IN TRAGEDY FOR SOME TEXAS DRIVERS

Major V. J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "With Thanksgiving approaching, many families are thinking about the traditional family reunion with turkey dinner and all the trimings, but for many, this occasion will end in tragedy because of a traffic accident."

Statistics indicate at least 50% of these accidents will be attributable to the drunk driver. One or two beers may not make a person drunk, but consuming any amount of alcohol will increase that person's odds of having an accident. Add a little speed with these drinks and the results are

"Almost 98% of all people killed in traffic accidents were not wearing seat belts. Approximately 25% of the deaths and 80% of all injuries could have been prevented if people would just use their seat belts," Major Cawthon stated.

Major Cawthon concluded by saying, "If the motoring public would use seat belts, child restraints, reduce their speed and not drink and drive, this would go a long way toward keeping this Thanksgiving a pleasant one."


