The Postal Service today ad-vanced its suggested Christmas mailing deadlines for domestic parcels and letter mail to Decem-ber 3 and 10, respectively, in anticipation of an exceptionally high mail volume

Citing the impact of greatly in creased mail volumes generated by the 15-state United Parcel Ser

by the 15-state United Parcel Ser vice strike in the East and South, and its residual effect on other parts of the country, the Postal Service said it is compelled to ask the public to mail even earlier than normal. The Service said that because of the delication of its employees, many of whom have been work-ing long hours, it has had little trouble handling the increased strike began in mid-September. 




