Animals Running At Large On Highways

Livestock Laws Of Texas

Any person owning or having responsibility for the control of any horse, mule, donkey, cow, bull, steer, hog, sheep or goat, who knowingly permits the animal to cross or roam at large, unattended, on the right-of-way of any U.S. highway or state highway, but not including numbered farm-to-market roads, is guilty of a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00. Each day that an animal is permitted to roam at large is a separate of-

It is lawful, however, to move livestock from one location to another by herding them on, along or across a highway, or to lead or drive the stock on, along, or across a highway.

State Highway Patrolmen, and county and local enforcement officers have the power and duty to enforce this statute, and they are authorized to enforce it without the use of a written

history with his cattle drives West Texas A&M University's buffalo mascot, Thunder VI (nicknamed Sadee, pronounced Saydee), hopes to save a piece of history with her petition drive.

That piece of history is the Goodnight Herd, kinsmen of WTAMU's first mascot, Charlie, who was purchased from and named for the colonel in 1922. The herd has been wandering the JA Ranch near Quitaque, but now, according to ranch and state officials, it's time for the herd to move on to greener pastures. Their new stomping grounds may be JA Ranch neighbor, Caprock Canyons

Col. Charles Goodnight made State Park-or a state park outside the Texas Panhandle. State officials are expected to make a decision within the month.

Perhaps Caprock Canyons Range!

The JA Ranch has given the herd of buffalo to the state of Texas and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials are to decide where the buffalo will roam in the future.

"It would be a shame to relocate the buffalo outside the Texas Panhandle," Dr. Garry Nall, WTAMU professor of history and Panhandle-Plains Historical Society board member, said. This is their natural habitat. and the buffalo have been part of the history of this region for centuries.

This historic herd, part of the Texas Panhandle's frontier heritage has been at home on the JA Ranch. This herd is de scended from the buffalo herd which Col. Charles Goodnight, legendary rancher of the Panhandle worked and cared for to save them from extinction.

Geoff Hulse, Caprock Can-yons State Park Manager stated that the park is willing and able to accommodate the herd. "We are not going to put them in a pasture and leave them." "We will become a buffalo ranch.
