The Valley varsity girls and boys were in Shamrock last Friday night for a pair of games. In the first game, the Lady Patriots were defeated 49-44. Katy Browning scored 14 points and Angie Pointer scored 10. April Brittain, Julie Clay, and Brandi Gaddis each added 6 points and Audra House added 2 points.

In the boys' game, Josh Scoggins scored 15 points and Laurence Hendrix scored 14, as the Patriots defeated Shamrock 49-38. Josh and Laurence also had 14 rebounds each -- 10 defensive and four offensive. Other scoring was by Chad Powell, 8 points, Jason Smith and Bubba Powell, 4 points each, and Bradley Price and Stevie Moore each added two points.

The Patriots and Lady Patriots began district play Tuesday against Claude.

Claude took wins in all four games. They defeated the Valley junior varsity girls by a score of 47-9. Kelly Fierro scored 5 points for the Lady Patriots and Joni Hancock scored 4 points.

The JV boys finished 41-18 behind the Mustangs with Danny House scoring 8 points and Clay Merrell with 6.

Claude outscored the Valley varsity girls by a score of 64-42. Katy Browning led all scorers with 11 points, followed by Julie Clay with 7, and Kacey Fuston with 6. Angie Pointer and Julie

Cruz scored 5 points each, April Brittain had 2 points, and Audra House added a free throw.

Varsity boys lost a close game by a 67-57 final score. Laurence Hendrix was high point scorer with 15, followed by Josh Scoggins with 11 points. Chad

Powell and Jason Smith each added 10 points, and Stevie Moore scored 7 point. Bradley Price and Paul Brittain had one basket apiece.

All four Patriot teams will play at home Friday night against Kress.

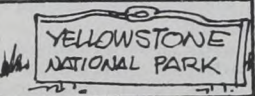

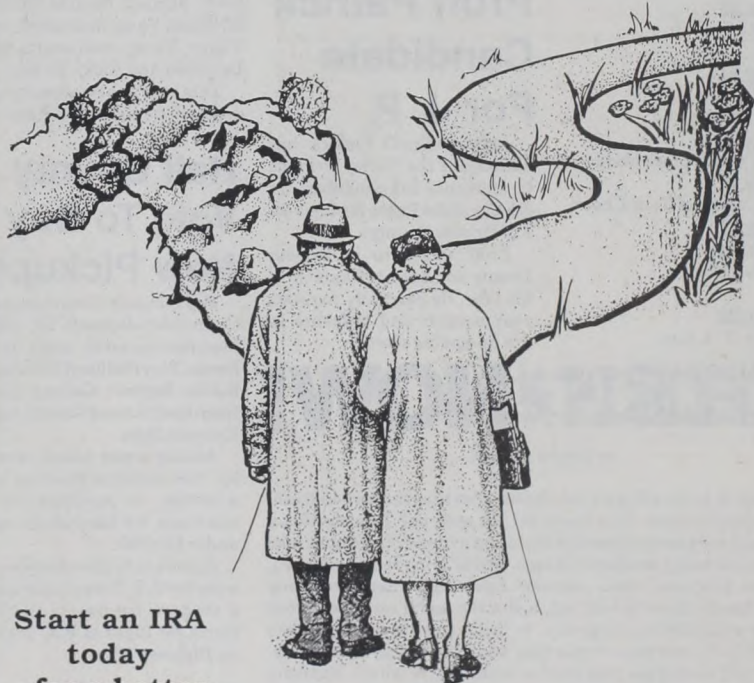
