The Valley Patriots met their match in the Saturday night game with Booker played in the Canadian stadium.

# Hall County Retired Teachers Hear Talk On Education's Future

The Hall County Retired Teachers Association met in the Silver Room of First National Bank in Memphis Thursday night, November 17. Mrs. Alma Bruce gave an interesting and informative talk on "The Future of Education in Texas."

Some highlights of her talk were that 500,000 children are being taught by their parents at home and they are expecting 100,000 more soon. But, she says, schools should not carry all the blame for failures of education, as the home and many other factors enter in. Authorities think that by 1985 there should be a jump in the SAT scores, she added, and there is a move on to require more credits for gradua-tion. She concluded her talk with a humorous poem where each one was blaming someone else. It ended with this by the mother, "Poor child, he's not to blame, his father's folks are just the same."







# The Superintendent's Corner

Last school year, during the month of February, over 750,000 Texas students were administered a test which schools have come to know as TABS. TABS is an abbreviation for "Texas As-sessment of Basic Skills" and is an annual assessment of student achievement in math, reading and writing in grades three, five

The ninth grade TABS test is called an exit test and may be given to a high school student each year until mastered. The last Legislature gave schools an opportunity to require mastery of the test for graduation but few schools have adopted that policy Valley requires that a student retake the test one time if failed

initially.

The TABS test is similar to those administered in a few states which require minimum mastery before graduation.

Although there were some failures in TABS at Valley School, the percent of passage is somewhat above the state aver-


