Quitaque's Panthers and Pantherettes drove over to Lakeview Tuesday night to play their next-to-last district games of the season and the Pantherettes lost 40-31 after extending the league leaders all the way. The Panthers took an easy 78-32 win with the starters sitting out the second half.

The Pantherettes threatened to pull off a big upset and had it not been for a bucketfull of free shots awarded the Eaglettes the Pantherettes could have won. Lakeview owned an 9-7 lead at the end of the first quarter but the Pantherettes went ahead and led 19-16 at the half. Quitaque was still in the lead, 25-23 at the end of three periods. In the fourth quarter, however, the Pantherettes were whistled down time after time and couldn't hit their own shots. The Pantherettes outshot their opponents from the field almost two to one: the Pantherettes made 11 field goals to six for Lakeview. The Pantherettes played one of their best games of the season. Last Friday night the Quitaque teams both won victories over Es, telling. Friday night Quitaque hosts the Hedley Owls and Owlettes for the last scheduled games of the season. Supt. Sherman Conner has asked the Tribune to request that Quitaque fans be courteous to all the visitors Friday night and to be good sports at all times. Next Friday and Saturday the girls district tournament will be played at Memphis. The boys district tournament will be two weeks later, on February 25 and 26.

The Quitaque Jr. Panthers' first game was against Floydada and Floydada barely came out on top 25-23 in overtime. Penner Jones and Joey Barefield shared scoring honors with 9 points each. Saturday morning the Panthers won a 30-21 victory over Lockney B. Penner Jones scored 9 points to lead in the game and trailing close behind was Joey Barefield with 8. INSIDE THE LEGISLATURE

WITH
REP. TOM CHRISTIAN
 AUSTIN—Let me begin this introduction of the 62nd session of the Texas Legislature with a brief

comparison to the 61st—the big question being the veil of mystery that seems to surround the House at the present time.

In the 61st session it was not difficult to identify the so-called "team" of the Speaker's lieutenants who pushed the passing or killing of legislation. This year it is hard to establish who is where and what the direction will be in regard to legislation.

Speaker Mutscher has not yet fulfilled his appointed duties in regard to chairmen or committee members and will not until after the Governor presents his tax and legislation message to a joint session of the House and Senate.

One of the major points of concern in regard to the future of the 62nd session involves the amount of tax money needed. It is estimated between \$645 million and \$800 million more tax dollars, which is burden enough without the added threat of new taxes and the added problem of disarray in state agencies. I am afraid it will involve many personalities which could be a stumbling block in the overall process.

With consideration to method of taxation we hear a great deal of talk in regard to a personal income tax. I would not be surprised if such a bill would pass the Senate. However, I do feel that it would have its problems in the House. I think it's safe to say that we are again going to have a great deal of legislation to deal with, with more than 70 bills introduced on the first day of the Session. The Chief Clerk estimates that

 An organized effort to tighten the rules under which the House operates in relation to conference committees is aimed at restricting the power of the conference committee to adjusting the differences in House and Senate bills rather than taking the liberty of rewriting them completely.

The idea is to unify the rules under which the House and Senate operate in this matter.

It is my opinion that the majority of the debate concerning pros and cons of pending legislation before the 150-member House is a loss if a measure can be rewritten by a 10-member committee.

SECRET RUMOR
 The powers that be are sidetracking talk about special sessions this summer. However, conversations around the Capitol reveal that Senators were advised to take full year leases on their apartments.

The opinions of the people in Briscoe County are important to me in the decision-making process when legislation concerning the Panhandle area is before the House.

black. My texture must be fleshy, and my skin undamaged. Grade B dried prunes, on the other hand, may not be as tender and may have slightly scarred skins or a few other defects.

I am generally available in four sizes: extra large, large, medium and small. My size is based on the number of us that can fit into a pound. There are 43 extra large prunes in a pound; about 85 small ones per pound. We small size prunes are sometimes called "breakfast" prunes.

An interesting number of us now come pitted, ready for quick use.

As I said earlier, I am the most popular dried prune, and I owe it all to Pierre and Louis Pellier—and you, of course. These two men started my career as a commercial fruit in this country. They left France in the Gold Rush Days for California's Santa Clara Valley.

Although they were happy with their new home, Pierre became lonesome for his girlfriend, so Louis sent him back to France to marry her. I'll never forget the happy day in 1856 when Pierre returned to California with his bride. He brought Louis a present—some of my branches.

Now California is the world's largest producer of dried prunes, and the Santa Clara Valley accounts for about 25 percent of this production.

We California prunes are popular both as prunes and a prune juice. About 30 percent of us are made into juice. We who are sold as prunes are popular all over the world.

About one-third of us are exported to Europe and other countries. Another third are sold to large buyers, such as restaurants and the armed forces. The rest of us are sold in retail stores in this country.

Although we are basically the same as we were a hundred years ago, our life is a little different now. Back then, we ripened on the trees until we dropped off by our own weight onto a cushion of earth which had been loosened to break our fall. We were picked up, washed and put on beds to bask in the sun.

Nowadays, you people have a more efficient system. To protect us from possible damage when we fall, you place canvas under the trees. Many of us are gently shaken from the tree by mechanical vibrators.

After we are dried, we are stor-

ed for awhile. Next we are sized and washed. When we reach your store in special protective packages, we are clean, tender and ready to eat.

Now that you've heard my story, maybe you'll appreciate me a little more. And, please don't confuse

me with some of my relatives. Just remember my motto: All prunes are plums, but not all plums are prunes.

We are a little different, and I like to think that we are something special. "Hospital Strawberries," my foot!

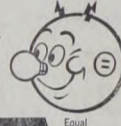

DRUG STORE OWNER SINCE 1927—Floyd Gilmore, son of Turkey's earliest medical doctor, has operated a drug store and pharmacy in Turkey since 1927.

During the early years of this century, when this country was being settled, the medical profession was raised to new heights in service to humanity by the country doctor. Without clinics, without hospitals, without miracle drugs—just a little black bag containing a few tools, a few pills and powders, and a world of faith, he went in answer to the call of the sick. No modern roads, no modern automobiles. A lap robe and maybe a heated sad iron or bricks kept off the chill and frostbite. No office hours—he got his sleep in a buggy drawn by a horse who knew the way home.

Since 1909, a Gilmore has had something to do with dispensing medicine for the sick of the Turkey area. Dr. Howard Gilmore, father of Floyd Gilmore who oper-

ates the Turkey Drug Store, was one of the first medical doctors to arrive in the Turkey area, after it began as a town in 1907.

Dr. Gilmore arrived right after the area had had one of its rare snow storms. He left the train at Estelline in the winter of 1909, transferred his luggage to a horse-drawn two-seated hack which made its way over a foot of snow to Turkey.

In those years, house calls were the rule for the medical man, and houses were far apart. Travel was by horseback or by horse-drawn buggies, and there were no paved roads. You followed the rough wagon roads or trails, and you kept to the ridges when there was rain or snow. Payment was as often in farm or ranch commodities as in cash.

Before his death in 1941, Dr.

Gilmore, who had served the people of the Valley so faithfully for so many years, liked to recall the trials of those early days as a frontier medical doctor; of the time when he wrecked his buggy on a hidden stump and had to continue on foot the rest of the way to the patient; of the deadly flu epidemic of 1918 when many of the medical doctors themselves were stricken and he had to work for twenty hours a day for weeks to serve the extra patients.

Dr. and Mrs. Gilmore had four children: J. Lee, who was in the Turkey School system for many years; W. C. (Carl) also in the Turkey Schools, and later elected as County Tax Assessor; Pauline, now retired and living in Turkey, and Floyd, who has operated a drug store in Turkey since 1927.

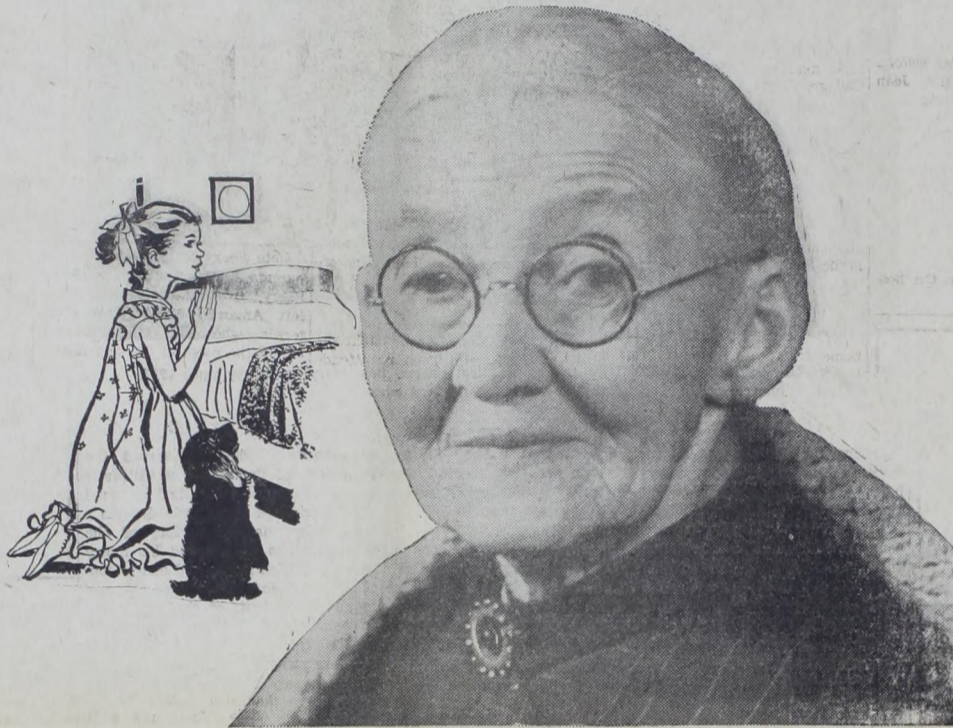

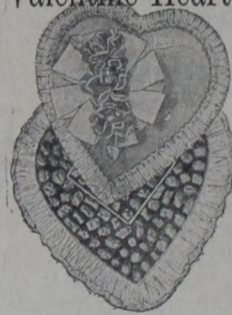

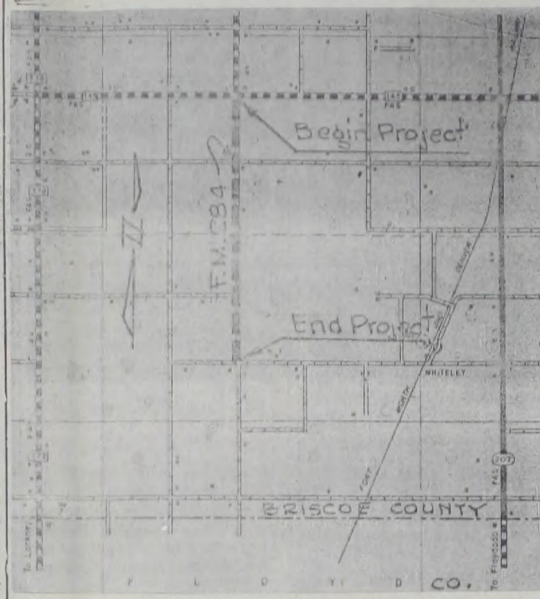

The proposed design will provide a two-lane road having a 20-foot surface with a 28-foot crown width. The right of way width will be a minimum of 100 feet. There will be no relocations on the project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, and any other information about the proposed project, are on file and available for copying at the office of E. H. Monroe, Donley County Residency, Clarendon, Texas. Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file in the office of the County Judge of Briscoe County.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction, can be obtained at

the Texas Highway Department District Office, P. O. Box 909, Childress, Texas 79201.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Donley County Residency Office, or to Mr. V. J. McGee, District Engineer, Childress, Texas, on or before February 25th, 1971. In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.
