## Now is the Time To Render "Unto Caesar What is Caesar's"

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1992. The form is available at the appraisal district in the courthouse at Silverton, Texas, or you may draft a similar form yourself.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. Also, individuals must render all vehicles, boats, motorhomes, mobile homes, travel trailers,

etc. The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a rendition: You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district wants a higher value for your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a "report of decreased value". To notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1991.

The last day for filing or post-marking 1992 renditions is Tuesday, March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at: Briscoe County Appraisal District, P. O. Box 728, Silverton, Texas 79257-0728.

### Super Tuesday Sees Large Voter Turnout In Area

Large Voter Turn-Out On "Super Tuesday"

Quitaque voters turned out in large numbers to exercise their voting rights in Tuesday's Democratic primary. Voting Precinct 2 registered 187 voters with Voting precinct 6 registering 65 for a total of 252 voters.

In the election for Justice of the Peace, there will be a run-off on April 14, 1992 between Dale Ramsey with 124 votes and Arthur "Proff" Patrick with 79 votes. Vonaceil Chandler came in third with 60 votes.

The Briscoe County sheriff's race was won by incumbent Richard (Dick) Roehr. He received 440 votes and his opponent Steve Miller received 252 votes.

In other Briscoe races, Becky Bybee McPherson ran unopposed for District Attorney, 110th Judicial District. Sharon Sutton Pigg was unopposed for County Attorney.

Betty Ann Stephens, also unopposed, won the Democratic primary election for County Tax Assessor Collector.

Bill Clinton, the presidential nominee frontrunner gathered the majority of votes in precincts 1 and 2.

OTHER VOTERS

In other area races Motley County voted 295 for James, "Jim" Meadow for sheriff. The present sheriff, Alton "Susie" Marshall received 207 votes in the primary while Jim Stockton came in third with 132 votes.

In the race for Floyd County Sheriff, Charles Overstreet came

away with 759 votes to Ellis Butler's 522.

TURKEY VOTES

Turkey voters turned out to exercise their right to vote, Tuesday in the Democratic Primary in Voting Precinct 401.

Kenny Schull received 39 votes in Turkey and 703 county wide in Hall County while Tim Wiginton cornered 157 votes in Turkey and 549 county wide.

In November, Schull will face Republican Glen Callahan for sheriff of Hall County.

Pat Floyd, unopposed, won the Democratic Primary for Tax Assessor-Collector with 130 votes in Turkey and 855 total Hall County votes.

David McKay, unopposed, for District Attorney won the primary with 132 votes in Turkey and 962 total votes. John Forbis, unopposed in the primary received 141 votes in Turkey and 985 in Hall County for District Judge.

Arville R. Setliff was elected Hall County Democratic Chairman with 160 votes coming in at Turkey and a total of 822 in Hall County.

Precinct 401 voted Virgil Blakney as their precinct chairman with 176 votes in Turkey and a total of 286 for the precinct.

Clinton and Bush carried the primaries in Hall County.

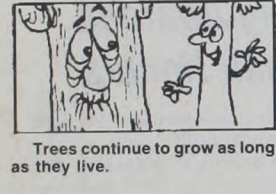

**Loans Available For Farmers And Ranchers**

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers of agriculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Becky V. Rainer, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Mrs. Rainer asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought and hailstorm make their needs known at the Farmers Home administration office at 104 E. California Street, Floydada, Texas.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until August 31, 1992 for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Mrs. Rainer said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5 percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

**IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY, WILL WE BE ABLE TO FIND YOU?**

In preparing to establish 9-1-1 service in your area, the Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network, in conjunction with local emergency service providers, is asking all residents and business operators to complete and return this form.

The information you provide will aid emergency service personnel in locating your residence or business operation and cut precious seconds or minutes off their response time. The information will be very beneficial in finding rural locations since many homes are generally not numbered and many rural roads are unnamed. The information should be periodically updated by the resident and/or business operator when changes occur.

The information will remain strictly confidential. It will only be used when responding to a 9-1-1 emergency call.

The following should be considered before completing and returning the form:

1. If you have a telephone located elsewhere than just your business or residence, note this in the COMMENTS section. If it is a different number and within the vicinity of your residence, list that number also.

2. When giving directions from the nearest city, rural residents should give the highway number and begin routing directions from the city limits marker on that highway. If bad weather frequently causes the normal route to be impassable, include an alternate route.
3. In the COMMENTS section, list any circumstances or situations that would be helpful in responding to an emergency, such as health problems, guard dogs, locked gate, flammable material, etc..
4. If you wish, include nearest relative or friend to contact in an emergency situation, including name, address and telephone number in the COMMENTS section.

# P.A.Y. Day Spent At Valley School By Sixth Through Seniors

 P.A.Y. Day (Preparing America's Youth) was held on Tuesday, March 3, 1992 at the Valley School for students in the sixth through twelfth grades. Students were taught skills to become productive citizens and remain drug free.

Dianne Bosch, an R.N. from Palo Duro Care Unit in Canyon and a City Commissioner in Amarillo kicked off the event with "An Inside Look at the 'Fine' Family" (The perfect family may not be what they appear). Through role playing, students could experience behaviors of family members in an alcoholic home and know it is not their fault if a family member drinks. "The best thing you can do for yourself is stay in school and get an education," encouraged Ms. Bosch.

Students were then given the opportunity to attend three sessions of their own choice. Dr. Stephen Turner, M.D., doctor of pediatrics and adolescent medicine practice in Plainview, spoke on "Kids, Cars, and Trouble," (Problems teenagers encounter as they become more mobile).

Bandi Carter, Lorraine Maine

and Cora Lagrone from Region XVI Education Service Center spoke on "Games, Gimmicks and Going Somewhere", (Realistic goal setting), "Building Healthy, Supportive Relationships" and "Stress Management."

Charlie McMardie, Assistant Program Director of the Adolescent Unit and Dr. Son Nguyen, psychiatrist, both with Cedar Creek Hospital in Amarillo, spoke on saying "No" to bad situations and healthy self-esteem. Representing Catholic Family Services in Amarillo was David Erickson MMPT, an adolescent and family therapist who spoke on "Styles of Love" (Dating Relationships).

Mike Springer, director of the Texas Department of Health in Lubbock provided a slide presentation and discussion on AIDS. Former University of Texas football player, Greg Lott, discussed dealing with problems in your life in a healthy way, rather than turning to drugs and alcohol. Greg Lott is with Charter Plains Hospital in Lubbock.

From Lubbock Council on alcoholism, Rosenda Sanchez talked to students about the effect the media has on teens. He encouraged students to stay "drug free".

Students were asked to evaluate P.A.Y. Day for its effectiveness. Student comments were as follows:

"I learned to make my own decisions and not let others influence me."

"I learned how to be me."

"Alcohol and drugs don't solve your problems, only make them worse."

"I can be myself without worrying about impressing others."

"Set goals in life and try to accomplish them."

"No one is perfect and can't be."

"Cars are not only for fun; they have big responsibility."

"I learned the importance of friends and a good self-esteem."

"I learned about AIDS Prevention."

"I learned how to manage my stress."

It is hoped P.A.Y. Day may become an annual event for the Valley students. Students requested topics such as pregnancy, marriage, college preparation and death be included next year.
