Computer Course on Managing Finances In Agribusiness

On March 6-7, specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will begin a 2-day computer shortcourse on developing financial statements needed to accurately assess the fiscal health of virtually any kind of agricultural operation.

Producers can learn more about generating profit and loss statements, plus other special reports such as Schedule F and Form 1099. They will also need working knowledge of Quicken 7 software.

Issues to be covered include managing overhead expenses, inventories, growing crops depreciation, family living withdrawals. Instructors will be demonstrating methods for analyzing the progress of a business through its financial statements.

Worker Protection Training Must I Comply With Worker Protection Standards (WPS) Guidelines?

The training will start at 12:00 noon in the Matador Senior Citizens Building. Lunch will be provided courtesy of Zeneca Ag Company and Stockmen's Sup-

ply. The Worker Ptotection Standard, which came into effect on January 1, 1995, requires producers to take steps to reduce the risk of pesticide-related illness and injury. If a producer uses agricultural pesticides and/

Catastrophic Crop Insurance OfferedThrough Farm Bureau by Lana Robinson

Farmers must more order to be eligible for USDA ferm program begafite. The new cata strophic coverage is available through agents contracted with the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies.

Mike Gerik, vice president of Administration for the TFB Insurance Companies, said the new crop insurance is being offered by Farm Bureau agents through Rain and Hail Insurance Service, Inc. (RHIS) of Des Moines, Iowa, with a regional office here in Texas.

Gerik indicated that Farm Bureau agents have received the fed-eral training required to enroll farmers in the new catastrophic insurance program.

According to a company spokes-man for Rain and Hail Insurance Service, Inc., RHIS was among the first private insurance organizations to receive USDA approval to enroll farm program participants in the new cropinsurance program. There are many coverage choices available to growers at varying costs,

the maximum indemnity price. Most risk management and financial advisors feel that the 65/ 100 coverage is the very minimum amount of protection that is adequate, according to Gantz, and lev-els providing more protection are available. Details on the more meaningful additional coverages are only available from approved pri-vate agents, such as county Farm

Bureaus affiliated with RHIS. Growers already signed-up for the crop insurance can upgrade the coverage
