Important School Legislation Passed

At the recent Quitague P-TA neeting, Supt. Herman Moseley explained to patrons how the state determined how many teachers a school was entitled to

Since that time some changes have been made, Mr. Moseley

has passed many important school laws during the regular session and also during the spe-

ial session that just ended. One very important law passed by the 61st Legislature was House Bill 21 that permits schools to have a choice of current Average Daily Attendance for determining how many class room teachers they will have, or use the Average Daily Attendance that has been established during the prior year. This law also provides for a school to apply for addiional class room teacher units due to increased enrollment dur-

ing the school year.

This law will be most helpful for school that have lost pupils during the summer or those who have a more or less static pupil opulation. Quitagee school is in class of schools as our school earned nine class room teachers during the school year of 1968-69 on Average Daily Atendance and the new law No. 21 drums assures the school of having that many teacher units approved on the Minimum Foundation Program for 1969-70. Before this law was passed, we would not til after school was out next May of 1970. This law makes the oudgeting of school funds more practical and based on a soundsiness basis of operation. This very important school

gislation was submitted by Gov. slation and all rules of both houses were suspended so that the bills could be passed more rapidly and provide the school administrators with definite in formation in regard to budge funds for 1969-70. Lt.-Gov. Ber Barnes and Speaker Gus Mctcher of the House of Represening these bills an opportunity to be passed into law. Represen tative George Henson and Sec A. M. Aiken were responsible for the bills being put into law so apidly. 
