The Briscoe County Appraisal District Board of Directors meet in regular session on Thursday, August 12, 1993.

In the financial report that Carlye gave she stated that the 1992 tax collections through the month of July were as follows:

Briscoe County, 97.0% Silverton I.S.D., 97.7% County Education District,

City of Silverton, 94.5% City of Quitaque, 95.1% Mackenzie Water Authority, 94.5%. This represents over-all 1992 tax collections of 97.1%

Certified values for 1993 were discussed. They are as follows: Briscoe County, appraised 1993 value, \$106,557,463 with \$75,944,383 taxable and a taxable value difference from 1992 of \$3,044,755; Silverton I.S.D., 1993 appraised value \$76,866,492 and taxable amount Silverton, appraised 1993 value of \$12,953,371 and taxable value of \$12,947,371 and a difference from 1992 of \$677,049; City of Quitaque appraised value of \$8,567,361 and taxable 1993 value of \$8,557,361 with a difference from 1992 of \$287,586; and the Mackenzie Water Authority has a 1993 appraised value of \$12,953,371 with a taxable amount of \$12,947,371 making the value difference from 1992 of \$677,049.

at Valley. Attendance is an important factor in determining the success or failure of school students. Realizing the importance of attendance, the Texas Legislature has enacted a law that makes truancy a Class C misdemeanor

A fine of up to \$500.00 can be levied against a student who has unexcused absences on 10 or more days in a six-month period four-week period. The states compulsory attendance requirement applies to students in the first grade through age 17. The new truancy law, en-

acted as a provision in Texas' new school finance package, doubles all fines for violating the states compulsory attendance requirements. Parents now can be fined from \$10.00 for a first offense and up to \$200.00 for subsequent offenses.

Keeping your 911 file updated with current addresses, list of persons who reside in your home, current ages, medical problems and medications is a very important part of your 911 system. Judy recently received a copy

of the 455 (Quitaque) 911 database file and of the 274 recorded listings only 54 were updated with current information

The following items are some that you should check to see if your file is updated:

1. Have you ever registered with 911? GTE does not provide this information, it is up to the individual to report new phones.

2. Have you moved to a new location since you first received your phone?

New additions to your household.

4. Deceased family members. New medications being taken, or changes in medica-

tions. 6. New medical problems that you are now being treated

Tremendous changes way cotton is grown, graded and processed have occurred during the past ten years. According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the job of figuring out what some of the changes mean just got a little

To help keep producers abreast of these changes the United States Department of Agriculture Agricultural Mariant (INDIA AMS) has keting Service (USDA AMS) has printed an updated version of its handbook titled "The Classification of Cotton". The new handbook details the authority of the USDA AMS Cotton Division and explains the methods used to classify cotton and get the information back to the producer.

The subject of how cotton is classified also receives thorough explanation. Sections are included detailing the quality factors determined by instrument evaluation and those which are determined by qualified classers There is also an overview of the

quality control procedures used insure accuracy in

classification system.
"Producers should find the new handbook very helpful," says Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "Many producers are looking for a better understanding of how the classing system works and this handbook will provide many of the answers they want.

The "new" handbook updates a previous edition printed over ten years ago. Copies of the handbook are available on



### **Confusion About** Dove Bag Limits, Identification

Each fall some hunters get confused about daily bag and possession limits for mourning doves and other species. Hunters

also should be aware of which species of dove they are hunting.

Ron George, deputy chief of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's wildlife branch, said a daily bag limit is defined as, "the assistant purpose of the indicated." maximum number of the indicated species that legally may be killed, taken or possessed during the permitted shooting hours in one calendar day."

A possession limit is defined as,

"the maximum number of the indicated species permitted to be possessed by one person when lawfully taken in the United States,"he said. "A possession limit of magratory game birds usually is twice the daily bag limit. A person cannot legally shoot a daily bag limit of doves in the morning, then go out in the afternoon and shoot more doves," he said.

Eligible pecan growers, grower-shellers and importers can vote October 4-6 on whether to continue the Pecan Promotion and Research Plan.

L.P. Massaro, acting administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service, said that to be eligible to vote, growers, grower-shellers and importers must have produced or imported pecans sometime from Sept. 1, 1991 through Aug. 31, 1993. For the plan to continue, it must be approved by a majority of those voting in the referendum.

Eligible growers, growershellers and importers must register Sept. 27-Oct. 1. Ballots will be distributed at the time of registration.

Growers and grower-shellers must register in person at local offices of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Importers may either register in person at local ASCS offices or by writing to the Reearch and Promotion Branch, Friuit and Vegetable Division, AMS, USDA, Rm. 2535-S, P.O. Box 96456, Washington, D.C. 20090-6456. Mail registrations must be received by AMS on or before Oct. 1.

Voting must be by mail and ballots must be postmarked during the Oct. 4-6 voting period. Ballots postmarked before Oct. 4 or after Oct. 6 will not be counted.

The pecan plan has been in effect since May 1, 1992, and operates under the Pecan Promotion and Research Act of 1990.



Horse owners in US border states are being advised by the US Department of Agriculture to vaccinate their animals agains Venezeulan Equine Encephalitis after an outbreak of the incurable mostly fatal disease in southern Mexico forced USDA late last month to close the border to Mexican equine, says Reuters

The highly infectious viral disease, carried mostly mosquitoes, has been contained in southern Mexico, a veterinarian with the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service says.

We don't consider it a direct threat right now to the United States, to people or to horses," she

Mexican officials reported that 92 horses have shown signs of the disease, and 42 have died in the southwest state of Chiapas

# Farmers Warned To Be In Compliance

Time is getting short to have all scheduled practices completed on Food and Security Act Plans. Farmers, who developed FSA plans by the 1990 deadline, have completed many scheduled practices. Many practices were scheduled for 1993. Practices such as grass seeding, critical area planting and waterways should have been completed if

they were scheduled for 1993.

If you had any of these practices scheduled and did not complete them, you are out of compliance. In routine servicing or spot checking by the SCS staff, it is found that scheduled practices were not completed we must turn it over to ASCS. The SCS is like the Highway Patrol. If we catch someone breaking the National Law, we must write a ticket and present it to the ASCS.
The ASCS will be the judge that
issues a fine of \$500 to \$5,000 or
complete forfeitures of all Government payments that could be as much as \$50,000.

The local SCS employees live in the community and do not want to write any tickets, but like the Highway Patrol, it is our duty. Time is getting short, therefore no warning tickets will be given for a violation of the Food and Security

You may make an appointment calling 1-800-377-HOPE (4673) or 806-359-4673.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer in women and the second most common cause of death (second now only to lung cancer). Early detection is very important because early treatment of cancer is highly successful.
The American Cancer Society recommends women age 40 to 49 years of age having a mammogram every 1 to 2 years; and women 50 and over having yearly mammograms.

There will be a cost of screening fee. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mam-mogram. Not only scheduled practices must be installed, but manage-ment of existing practices must be completed. You should look at your terraces before planting wheat. If there are any breaks or blocks needing repair, this must be done before drilling wheat. If a crop is planted across a wash in a terraced field, the farm is out of

Another management practice is Emergency Tillage. If not enough residues or growing crop exist to protect the land from wind erosion, plowing of some kind is needed to control erosion. Many acres were in this practice or should have been or should have been.

Also, it is again time to be considering over-seeding small grains into cotton. This should be done as soon as possible and no later than September 15. Just over-seeding the small grains in cotton is not all that matters. The small grain must make a stand and produce at least 2,000 pounds of Flat Small Grain Equivalent of growing wheat. This must be kept on the soil surface through April 1. This means no deep breaking, listing or heavy disking before April 1. Wind strips is probably the best alternative.

It is very important for each farmer to look over their plans and carry them out as scheduled. All permanent practices must be installed by December 31, 1994. For this reason no warning tickets will be given. We will have to submit all violations for non-compliance to ASCS. We will do our best to help everyone who wants to be kept in compliance,

On that autumnal like weekend in June that the Rails To Trails project was dedicated with the ceremony here in Quitaque, I had the privilege to accompany Dr. John T. Baker and Dr. J. O. Baker (my father and great-uncle, respectively) from Dallas to attend the event. My great-Uncle Obed had been a teacher in the town of Quitaque some 70 years ago, where he also coached various athletic teams. One of his best students and players was one of Quitaque's favorite sons, 85 year old Fish Wilson.

An avid outdoorsman all of his life, my father was inspired by the challenge and esthetic beauty of this newly available trail. He immediately began making plans for a family outing along a 18 mile stretch of the trail. Our group started hiking 2 miles east of South Plains, staying on the railroad right-of-way. The 6 miles down the Caprock to Emerson Creek is some of the most beautiful, wild, remote, and secluded my group and I had enjoyed in 12 years. That was my own perception of the wilderness around us, and in particular the area around

Emerson Creek, where we elected to stop for lunch. Once the air was a little cooler, we hiked on to the tunnel and into even more rugged and beautiful country-

### Valley Booster Club Heart Complications In Young Athletes

Sudden death for football fans is only a tiebreaker. But for families who have lost young athletes to sudden death from heart complications, it is a tragedy.

"What is devastating is that most of these young people appear perfectly normal but then, during the stress of athletics, they die from heart failure," said Dr. Jeffrey Towbin, an assistant professor of pediatrics and molecular genetics at Baylor. Many were aware they had heart conditions, but how many were never evaluated and monitored? If we knew they were at risk, we could recommend therapies and

possibly prevent them from participating in sports."

Chief among the causes of sudden death is hypertrophic cardiomyopathy, a genetically transmitted heart condition causing defects in the left ventricle-

the main pumping station for the body's blood supply. Death occurs when the ventricle thickens, impeding blood flow or from heart disturbances called

Long Q-T syndrome is the most sinister of silent heart conditions because, in children, there are rarely symptoms prior to sudden death. The disorder results from irregularities in the heart's natural rhythm leading to seizures, sudden

fainting and death.

"Although they may show no prior symptoms, long Q-T patients can be diagnosed early on," Towbin said.

Another cause of sudden death in athletes, Wolff-Parkinson-White syndrome, also results from abnormal heart rhythms caused when the left ventricle is stimulated prematurely by

electrical waves gone awry. Wolff-Parkinson-White syn-drome may disappear with maturity, but arrhythmias associated with the disorder sometimes occur later in life and can cause sudden death.

All three heart disorders can be detected in infancy through EKG readings and electrophysiological studies. One common symptom is syncope or sudden, unexpected

Syncope results from exercise loud noises, extreme surprise, drops with no warnin resulting in injury. The faint may

last for more than a minute."
Although no guidelines have been established for prescreening of young athletes, Towbin stresses increased awareness of heart disorders when considering demanding activities such as




