FRIDAY DANCE

Number twenty of the Bob Wills Celebrations will begin on Friday, April 26, 1991 at the Bob Wills Center from 9 p.m. until 12 midnight featuring ten to fourteen former Texas Playboys.



SATURDAY PARADE

At 10:30, April 27, the parade will begin to wind its way through downtown Turkey. Many riding clubs, organizations, and individuals participate in this each year. The 1991 parade will feature a float with local boys and families who were involved in Desert Storm.

Turkey Lions Queen, Shadi Mullin will be riding on the Lions' float.

Miss Bob Wills, Vera Ruth Pinkerton will also be riding a float in the parade.

**Be Aware Of
Storm Warnings**

It is that time of year when we should be aware of and prepare ourselves for severe weather in our area. Public awareness of the alarm systems is essential and should be known.

When the National Weather Service or neighboring town(s) alert us of the dangerous conditions then the Dept. Officials (Fire Departments, Sheriff's Office or DPS) will deploy along Farm-to-Market roads and Highways a few to several miles outside of the city limits. The radio communications, that are vital to the officials, by the weather spotter to the Department base unit is in constant contact of weather conditions; if a funnel is sighted by a spotter then the Base Unit will activate the alarm system in the city.

In the Quitaque area the system will be conducted one of two ways or both, that which would be by public address and or siren system. The public address system is noted when emergency vehicles (such as Fire Department, ambulance, Sheriff, DPS units) announce the threatening conditions to find a place of safety and to take cover.

The siren system (located at City Hall building) is noted at the number of whistles it sounds off. The number of whistles indicated are: Three signals indicate fire in the area and alert firemen for such. Two signals is for fire department meeting and drills and one constantly long whistle indicate a tornado in the area. When threatening weather occurs be prepared to take a place of shelter--it could save your life.

BARBECUE LUNCH

Saturday at 11 a.m. serving of the barbecue lunch will begin. Tickets may be purchased at that time. Yes, the lines are long but they move fast and you have time to visit with your neighbors or to get acquainted with visitors while you wait. Time Well Spent!

At 2:30 p.m. on the old football field, the 11th annual reunion of former Texas Playboys will assemble to give air to lots of Western Swing! Thirty-five to forty famous musicians should be gathered here.

Dr. Charles R. Townsend, Grammy Award winner and author of "San Antonio Rose", "The Life and Music of Bob Wills and Texas Playboys" will emcee the event. This special music is guaranteed to put your foot to tapping.

BOB WILLS MUSEUM

The Bob Wills Museum will be open to the public Saturday. Come and see all the memorabilia of Wills reign as King of Western Swing. The museum is located at the Bob Wills Center.

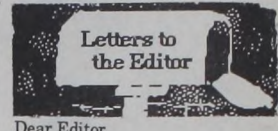
Douglas Lynn Self

In 1977, twenty-four fiddlers arrived to enter the old fiddlers contest, from the age of 11 to 68, Mrs. Betty Wills who had remarried and was now Mrs. Jim Sheets attended Sunday morning church service with her husband at Turkey Church of Christ. Kim Fletcher, Flomot reigned as queen.

Cindy Wills James, daughter of Bob Wills was grand marshall of the 1978 parade. Melissa Greenhaw, Silverton was selected as queen.

Tammy Hargrove, Memphis presided as 1979 queen while a cold north wind held the temperatures to the 50's.

1980 saw the beginning of breakfast being served to the crowd at 11 p.m. in the Bob Wills Cafeteria. Friday night dances were being enjoyed by local fans also. DeLane Proc-

tor, Turkey was queen for 1980. Twenty five former play boys attended the 1981 celebration while Jayne Eudy reigned as queen.

In 1982, travelers from Denmark, Holland, and Germany came to Bob Wills Day while Kelli Lynn Liner, Memphis reigned as queen.

Misti McElreath reigned as queen in 1983. Jimmy Burson who is now Briscoe County Judge furnished music for the queen's contest. Supper was served to the girls and their moms. Seventy craft booths were displayed to select hand made wares. O. H. Majors drove, Bob Wills last car, 1969 Lincoln in the parade. It was owned by Jim and Billie

Robison. The Kwahadi Indians performed just before the parade began.

In 1984 Sherri Chamberlain was crowned queen. While in 1985 a down pour could not keep the spirits of celebrators down. Dude Barton, Flomot, recent inductee to Hereford Cowgirl Hall of Fame was honored. Charla Barnett was 1986 queen.

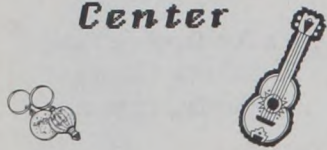

**Twenty Years Of Bob Wills

**TWENTY YEARS OF BOB
WILLS DAYS**

Twenty years ago a new tradition was started. Turkey, Texas decided to honor a "home town boy." On Saturday, April 29, 1971 a parade began to wind its way through downtown Turkey. This kicked off twenty years of celebrations at Turkey.

The crowds have numbered from around 1500 to an estimated 16,000 in 1989. Crowds came in wind, cold, even a down-pour to enjoy the music made famous by Bob Wills, Western Swing.

Each year barbecue has been prepared for the noon meal. In 1972 about 2,000 were fed beef and buffalo barbecue. In 1978, an estimated 5,000 were on hand for lunch. At noon in 1973, barbecue was served to 2,500 while 700 was served the evening meal.

Bob Wills was born in Limestone County, Texas on March 3, 1905 and in 1914 moved with his family to Turkey. Shortly after his sixteenth year he attended barber school and returned to Turkey to barber. In 1929, he left Turkey with a medicine show. Later he was hired to play with the Light Crust Doughboys of Ft Worth.

In 1933, Bob traveled to Waco and started another band. From there he went to Oklahoma and this is where his band became known as the Texas Playboys.

In 1971, Bob Wills, two brothers, Johnny Lee and Billy Jack and several of the band attended the celebration in Bob's honor. He had a stroke in 1969 and was confined to a wheelchair.

Fourteen were entered in the old fiddlers contest this first April celebration. State Representative Phil Cates, Lefors, led the invocation, and Eddie J. Leary, Childress led the pledge to the flag. State Representative Tom Christian represented Governor Preston Smith,

to give honor to Wills for his contribution to western music, as he was the originator of this type music in the 1930's Bill Buxton who represented Gov. David Hall, Oklahoma, also cited Bob Wills for his contribution to Western Swing Music.

In 1972 a square dance exhibition was sponsored by the Turkey Square Dance Club. Then at 9 a western swing dance began.

In 1973, the first queen's contest occurred. Around 30 girls entered the contest with Kim Ham reigning as the first queen of Bob Wills Day. Later it was recalled that when Bob Wills came back to Turkey to barber, Clayton Ham was also a Turkey barber at that time. Clayton Ham was Kim Ham's grandfather.

A marker was dedicated to be placed 14 miles north east of Turkey on FM 657, one mile west of the old John Wills Home. Bob Wills unveiled the memorial for his old home.

Twenty floats and riding clubs were entered in the parade in 1973. In 1976, 50 entries were in the parade. In 1989, 15 to 20 wagons from the wagon train participated in the parade. 1974 saw Nags and Hags Riding Club winning the riding club award. In 1978, the winning float was Valley FFA. In 1980 "Down Home Between the Rivers," float of the Dance Committee won first place out of 35 entries. "San Antonio Rose" float won the honors in 1986. The Turkey Lions float came in first in 1989 while an estimated 15,000 to 16,000 watched. Miss April Stephens, Quitaque, was queen that year.

Each year there is an old fiddler's contest held. In 1972 they started this tradition with 14 entries. Each year a few more participate, twenty-two were entered in 1973.

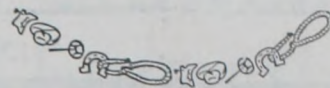

Bob Wills most famous record was San Antonio Rose. He made his first movie in 1940, "Take me Back to Tulsa." In 1968 he was installed in Country Western Hall of Fame in Nashville, Tennessee. In 1969 he suffered a massive stroke.

Early in 1974 Bob Wills suffered another stroke and could not attend the celebration. Jack Bell and Gus Timmons carried the flags for the parade that year. Bill Mack, of WBAP fame announced and Hoyle Nix and band, Big Springs played while Susie Parker, Silvertown reigned as queen.

In 1975, Hall County proclaimed April as Bob Wills month. The annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet at Memphis was dedicated to him. This year

an arts and craft show was added to the agenda. "San Antonio Rose-Life and Music of Bob Wills," biography by Dr. Charles Townsend, Canyon, an associate professor of History at WTSU was ready to read. Commemorative coins also appeared this year.

Hall County was designated National Bicentennial Community by American Revolution Bicentennial Commission in 1975. Miss Nesa Jackson, sponsored by KFLD in Floydada became queen. A former Miss Texas, Judy Mallett played fiddle, Miss Ford Country, Sandy Lankford, sang and Leon McAuliffe played in the afternoon. Joe Bob Barnhill also sang several numbers. Bob Wills passed away in May of 1975.
