Quitaque's City Council Adopts New Budget

Quitaque City Council adopted the proposed budget for 1996-97 in their June 24 meeting. The city's fiscal year ended June 30, and the new year began July 1, 1996.

The newly adopted budget totals \$188,525, a \$13,228 increase over that of 1995-96, which was \$175,297.

Total revenue expected for the 1996-97 year amounts to \$189,800, as compared to last year's \$177,150.

The current tax rate is \$0.4795, up just 3% from the old tax rate, according to Maria Cruz, city secretary.

Quitaque City Council Holds Regular Meeting

On September 9, 1996 the City Council for the City of Quitaque met in regular session at 5:30 p.m. Mayor Jimmy Davidson called the meeting to order. Council members present were Wilburn Leeper, Arnold Castillo, Janice Henson, Rhonda Rogers, and Randy Stark. Also present were City Secretary, Maria Cruz and City Manager, Robert Patrick and guest Alvin Proctor with Energas.

Robert Patrick reported that the Fire Department would be electing new officers later on that evening. New fire fighting equipment will be viewed on Tuesday.

Eight ambulance runs were reported for the past month.

A proclamation of "Fair Housing Month" for the month of September was passed by the Council.

The Council then discussed Energas rate change. Energas proposal of 7.6% rate hike was reviewed by the West Texas Steering Committee. The Committee proposed that all cities agree to a 5.3% rate increase to be implemented on the November bills. The motion was passed unanimously by the Council.

Only one bid was received on the Galvan property. The Council voted to accept the bid by Jimmy and Maggie Martinez for the Galvan property.

Two bids were received for the Rosenbaum property. Council accepted the higher bid submitted by Leopoldo Regalado.

After bills of the month were reviewed and voted to be paid the Council adjourned.
