Two Charged With Capital Murder

Courtesy Briscoe County News Two people have been charged with capital murder in connec tion with the shooting death of a former Quitaque man and his

girlfriend in Dallas. Charles R. (Bubba) Clardy, jr., 21, and Laticia Brown, 19, re shot late Thursday or early Friday (Christmas Eve) in their northeast Dallas apartment, police said. Clardy was a lifelong Quitaque resident before moving to Dallas two years ago, a family member said.

Their bodies were not discovered until late Sunday when Clardy's co-worker came to the apartment complex to find out why Clardy had not reported for work, police said.

The couple's 11 month old daughter. Camesha LaShell Clardy, was missing when police arrived on the scene, according to a Dallas Police Department report.

Zeola Taylor of Quitaque, a relative of Clardy's said Police told Clardy's family that Camesha was taken by the two suspects, who surrendered to police on Monday.

Mrs. Taylor said the girl is in the custody of Children's Protective Services in Dallas.

Steven A. Carriker Senate's Only Farmer Files For Re-election

Thirtieth District State Sena tor Steven A. Carriker has filed in the Democratic Primary for re-election to the office he has served in since 1988.

At the age of 43, Senator Carriker is among the youngest members of the Texas Senate and the only member of the Senate to make his living as a farmer. He is a graduate of the University of Texas and his wife Kathy, a Texas Tech graduate, is a public school teacher. They have three children: Jake, a student at Southwest Texas University and Karen and Stephanie who attend elementary school in Roby.

Senator Carriker has been active in health care issues and was responsible for the 1989 law that has helped create over 170 rural health clinics in communities that had lost or were in danger of losing their health care facilities entirely. His work in health care has earned him awards from the Texas Association of Community Health Cen-ters, the Joint Conference on Aging, and a special resolution honoring him by the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature.

Senator Carriker has passed six bills reducing taxes and protecting taxpayer rights. Among those are bills reducing the oil severance tax, abating property taxes, and protecting retirees from illegitimate income taxes levied by other states.

Senator Carriker has also just completed a four year term on the Texas Sunset Commission where his work resulted in the abolition or consolidation of ten agencies and a savings to taxpayers of 54 million dollars.

I am proud of the confidence the people of the Thirtieth District have placed in me and am glad to have the opportunity to continue to represent them, Senator Carriker said.

Ranger, Native Quitague Dog, Saves Five Lives

A Leopard Catahoula is a ranging dog of various colors. It is also the state dog of Louisiana and ranges in all sizes. One such Catahoula began his life in Quitaque at the Sid McFall residence with seven brothers and sisters. He was one of the smallest of the litter. He was a "freebie" to a girl who took him to East Texas and she named him Ranger. She soon decided she couldn't keep him. so he again moved on. This time to a man who owned a dairy farm His children had recently lost a pet, so he decided Ranger might fill

Even though Ranger was supposed to be "just a pet," he took to the fields and dairy quickly. One morning three weeks later, the dairy man went out to begin his morning chores and he noticed all the orphan calves were at the gate in a row. He thought this was a bit unusual, but he soon found something even more unusual. Ranger had gathered all the little orphans up in a row and if one tried to wander off, Ranger just raised his lips and very quietly growled--no loud barking or snapping needed. The calf filed back in line—this from a three-month old puppy. Needless to say, Ranger soon "graduated" to the big barn with the "big" dogs.

As soon as Ranger would finish his morning chores, he would go to the house yard and play with the kids like a little puppy.

One night after Ranger had everybody bedded down in the yard, barn and house, he was doing his Hank, the Cowdog snifflin', snufflin' and checkin' things out before he went to his nest. As he came into the yard, he noticed something quite different and frightening. He'd never really seen fire before, but he knew instantly something was wrong. He set up a howl, and when this did not rouse anyone, he literally took the door of the house off its hinges. He ran inside and found the dairy man and his wife, woke them up and helped them get one child out of the house

He immediately went back inside and helped bring out another child. He made three trips into that inferno. He was looking for his playmate, the baby of the family. He showed the dairy man where one child, who had crawled under the a bed was, but he could not find the baby. The firemen told the family that no one could still possibly be alive in the inferno. So Ranger was chained to a pole which he nearly took out of the ground. He was burned and had all his hair singed off his body, but still fought to go back inside

Because he was so insistant, he helped save five lives. The fire chief assured the onlookers that had Ranger not awakened the family when he did, they would have all died in the fire.

What began as a free pig-in-a-poke became worth far more than his weight in gold. I wonder if there is any amount of money that could buy this little six-month-old hero?

Mrs. Taylor said police told Clardy's family that the suspects probably knew Ms. Brown and Clardy because there was no sign of forced entry at the apartment.

Clardy, who was born in Lockney, grew up in Quitaque and was graduated from Valley High School in 1991. Mrs. Taylor said he moved to Dallas soon after his graduation.

"Bubba," as Clardy was known by friends and family, was remembered as a gifted athlete by one of his former coaches at Valley High School.

"He played football and was a good running back, but track was really his sport," said Rick Price, an assistant football coach Valley from 1986 through 1990, "he went to the state track meet in the 200 (meters) and was on the sprint relay team that went to state.

"He was a good athlete, and a nice, quiet kid, too. He was a yes-sir, no-sir kind of kid. You really had to work on him to get him to say much else.'

Clardy had been working at a restaurant across the street from his apartment, which was in the 8300 block of Park Lane, police said. Ms. Brown worked at a Pizza Hut nearby.

The murders were discovered when a neighbor and a co-worker looked through the apartment window and saw Clardy's body lying on the floor in a pool of blood, according to a story in The Dallas Morning News.

Ms Brown's body was found in a closet, the story said.

Ms. Brown, a Dallas native. was several months' pregnant when she died, according to Mrs. Taylor and the police report. Ms. Brown and Clardy had planned to marry in March, when the

baby was due, Mrs. Taylor said. Charged in the deaths were Johnny Aaron Sanders, 22 and Conquista Desheon Ellison, 19, both of Dallas. They turned themselves in to the Dallas Police Department on Monday. The police report said. They could face a maximum sentence of death or life in prison if convicted of capital murder.

Processing Of FmHA Loans

"Texas farmers applying for assistance from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will experience a breath of fresh air this year," George Ellis, FmHA Texas State Director, said today.

"I have today taken action to delegate the full loan approval authority allowed under the Federal regulations to FmHA County Offices in Texas," Ellis

This action means that FmHA Supervisors at the County level will be able to exercise loan approval authority up to the full County limit without prior reviews being required at other locations or even by FmHA officials at the same location.

"As this new year begins, I feel this will be a real help to our farm customers, and I intend to pursue this type of change in the future, wherever I can," said Ellis. FmHA County Supervisors

were previously subject to a complicated system of reviews and re-reviews of loan applications in order to approve an FmHA loan. This system was instituted several years ago in order to insure fewer mistakes and more uniformity from County to

"I still intend to hold FmHA Supervisors to the same high standards as in the past, however, am also dedicated

streamlining the process so that our farm customers will have funds available to them at the time they are needed," said Ellis.





"Eligible lands may include



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

Filling Stations Clean Fuel

(NAPS)—The next time you drive into a filling station, you may find a different kind of "gas" for sale. More than 800 natural

may find a different kind of "gas" for sale. More than 800 natural gas filling stations are now operating in the United States, according to the American Gas Association, with an average of five new facilities opening every week.

Natural gas offers a cleaner, lower-cost alternative to gasoline, A.G.A. says, selling for an average of 70 cents for the energy equivalent of a gallon of gasoline. Natural gas also reduces carbon monoxide emissions by up to 90 percent and reactive hydrocarbons, which create smog, by 85 percent, the association says.

Cars, vans, trucks, and buses can be converted to run on natural gas by replacing their existing fueling system, and federal tax incentives are now available to offset the cost of converting. Deductions range from \$2,000 for a passenger car to \$50,000 for trucks over 26,000 pounds or buses that carry 20 or more pas-



sengers, A.G.A. says. Companies building natural gas refueling facilities also are eligible for a deduction of up to \$100,000.
A.G.A estimates that a passenger sedan conversion costs about \$2500 \$2,500.

\$2,500. In addition, all three U.S. automobile manufacturers plan automobile manufacturers pian to produce natural gas cars and trucks in 1994, according to the association. Including the factory-built natural gas vehicles and the converted vehicles, A.G.A. expects about four million natural gas vehicles on the road by the turn of the century.

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
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
