

The mix, which contains Texas sweet potatoes and wheat, will be merchandised as a nutrutious, low-fat breakfast item. Each two-pancake serving provides 16 percent of the Recommended Daily Allowance for vitamin A. Heritage Tymes President Scott Johnson said potential exists for sales of 1 million packs.

The pancake mix received the "Best of Show" title by outselling 19 other products during the Texas broadcast of "The '97 Questfor America's Best-QVC's 50 - in -50 Tour" in November. More than 8,000 bags were sold in four minutes leaving about 500 callers waiting to order when the "sold" sign flashed on-screen

Lammes Candies Since 1885 Inc., Austin, was second runnerup with sales of more than 4,000 pounds of Chewy Pecan Pralines. The pralines will also be featured on QVC during 1998. Both companies belong to the ment of Agriculture marketing program that has more than



COTTON NEWS LUBBOCK, January 23, 1998

by Shawn Wade

With cotton prices stagnating below sixty cents per pound, High Plains cotton producers are looking for light at the end of the tunnel. Speculation about why the current price occurred has not provided any satisfactory answers at the farm level. Producers are now beginning

to wonder whether or not the situation will trigger some of the safety net features built into the 1996 Farm Bill. Specifically the Loan Deficiency Pay-ment (LDP) or POP payments as they are commonly referred

LDP's are triggered when the Adjusted World Price for cotton released by the United States Department of Agriculture Department of Agriculture (USDA) falls below the upland cotton marketing loan level. Currently that threshold is 51.92 cents per pound. The lat-est AWP calculation comes in at just over 56.7 cents per pound.

Regulations governing the LDP Program state that LDP's will be available when the AWP drops below the loan rate. LDP's can be requested under these circumstances by eligible producers who agree NOT to enter the commodity into the loan.

Producers who agree to keep their cotton out of the loan in exchange for the LDP will be subject to a \$75,000 per person marketing loan gain payment limitation.

Producers who enrolled their cotton into the CCC loan program prior to the AWP drop-ping below the loan rate have the option to redeem their cotton at the lower of the AWP or

the loan principal plat and and interest. Most speculation at this time indicates that the likelihood of the AWP dropping another 6 to

8 cents are unlikely. As U.S. producers develop plans for the 1998 crop year, estimates of planted acreage already indicate reductions of up to one million acres.

High Plains producers are no different. Insect concerns, curterrent prices and weather factors have already prompted growers to make plans for fewer cotton acres in 1998.

The 1997 Census of Agriculture currently being conducted by National Agricultural Statis-tics Service is the only source of uniform farm related data com-piled down to the county level on agriculture production and inventories.

Producers across the State of Texas and across the U.S. are being encouraged to cooperate with the survey process in order to keep this data up to date

All individual responses to survey questions are confiden-tial and are not subject to the tial and are not subject to the Freedom of Information Act so growers can be assured that the information they provide is not going to be seen by anyone except sworn NASS employees. The census is conducted every five years and the 1997 data will replace information collected in 1992

PURPLE MEANS NO TRESPASSING Provided By: Pammy Millican,

CEA-Ag. Purple paint can now serve as a warning to stay off someone's property. It's a new state law. Judon Fambrough (JEW-don FAM-brobh), a lawyer with the Texas Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University some Tex Texas Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University says Tex-ans will soon be seeing a lot more of the color purple because Texas has joined several other states in recognizing a purple paint mark as a trespassing warning. The new law requires landowners to make a vertical purple mark eight inches long and one inch wide and place it either on a post or a tree. The marks must be three to five feet off the ground and at a frequency of every one thousand frequency of every one thousand feet except in timber cutting feet except in timber cutting areas -- it must be every 100 feet. Fambrough says the new law resolves problems in two geo-graphical areas of Texas. In South Texas, there was a prob-lem in how many languages you had to post "no trespassing" in and also how often you had to place signs. In East Texas, there was a problem of marking prop-erty lines where a timber com-pany should start and stop cut-ting timber. To make sure every-one understands what the purple one understands what the purple paint means, until September you must also have a no trespass-ing sign posted at the entrance of the property.

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

PROMISE FOR BISON Provided By Pammy Millican. CEA-Ag.


A new vaccine to prevent bru-cellosis in cattle is showing promise in protecting bison as well. A positive result could save more of America's vanishing herds. Texas A&M researchers are vaccinating a herd of more than 50 pregnant females and will know later this year how effective the drug is. Texas A&M wildlife biologist and disease specialist Dr. Don Davis says bison are much more suscep-tible to brucellosis than cattle are. He compares them to Ameri-can Indians who were killed off in droves as European settlers introduced new illnesses to North America. The native popu-North America. The native popu-lation had no natural immunity to the new diseases. Davis says at first researchers deduced that bison and cattle were close enough relatives that Strain 19, the original cattle vaccine, would work. But it caused a high rate of abortions in the bison So page

of abortions in the bison. So now testing is done with a vaccine called R-B 51. What researchers at Texas A&M and at other test sites are determine could have a profound effect in Yellowstone National Park. Davis says nearly half of the bison there are infec-ted with brucellosis. That makes

people in the brucellosis-free states of Wyoming, Idaho and Montana worry that the infec-tion will reach their cattle and non will reach their cattle and put a cap on trade. So cattle owners shoot the bison when they wander out of the park. As you can imagine, that causes an uproar from animal welfare groups, American Indians and others. Davis says the Texas A&M bison herd will be moni-tored to determine the number of tored to determine the number of abortions that may be caused by the vaccine. The calves that are born will also be tested for brucellosis. In a companion study, researchers are also testing elk since they, too, keep the disease alive around Yellowstor




