FIRE DESTROYS WORKS DRY GOODS STORE

BAIRD- Thursday, August 2, an early morning fire destroyed Work's Dry Good Store and the old Griggs Hospital. About 30 firemen from Baird and Clyde responded to the fire. The fire alarm went off at 2:40 a.m. Clyde arrived at 4 a.m. with 3 trucks.

Glen Curtis first noticed the fire. He was driving down the alley and heard a glass break. He thought someone was breaking in. Curtis didn't notice evidence of a fire until he was driving down the street to notify dispatchers.

Baird Fire Chief Pat McKennon said the fire had been smoldering for quite a while before firemen arrived.

The firemen entered through the front door and said that the heat was so intense it has melted some items in the store. Once the fire reached the rafters, the firemen had a hard time fighting it.

The fire was under control by 5 a.m. and was out at 7 a.m.

Bill Work, owner of the store, said almost all of the merchandise was damaged either by fire, smoke or water.

Mr. Work said he wouldn't rebuild. The fire came at the worst time possible. They had just finished restocking the store's merchandise for the Fall.

Work had been visited three days

earlier by a fire inspector representing his insurance company. The inspector had given him a clean bill of sale.

The second floor of the building, unoccupied since 1938, suffered extensive smoke and water damage.

The fire started in the southwest corner by an air conditioning unit.

This store was not the first of the Work's to be damaged by fire. They once owned a dry goods store in Clyde, and it was also destroyed by fire.

Mr. Work is 78 years old and his wife Beulah, 77. This fire has launched them into an early retirement. Mr. and Mrs. Work, their daughter, Patsy, and two other employees worked in the store.

Thompson's Variety Store next door received some smoke and water damage, but a brick firewall between the two buildings was credited with lessening the damage.

Sheriff Bill Skinner said that Thursdays fire was the first downtown fire in Baird in 20 years. The last fire broke out three doors down from Work's, in the old Will Boydston building, which is currently the First National Bank.

A special thanks is given to the Baird and Clyde firemen for all their efforts to extinguish the fire.

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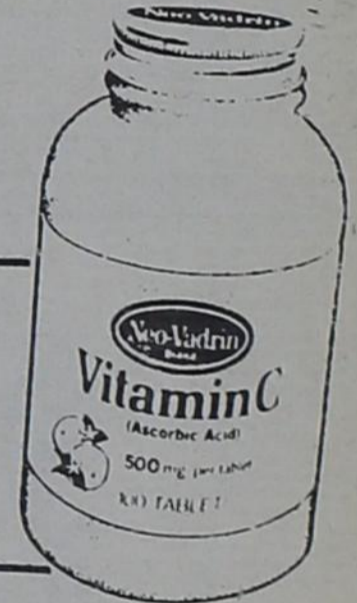

Registration For Students August 16 & 17

BAIRD- Parents of students who will be in grades K-8 this year in Baird Elementary School are asked to register their students at the principal's office between 8 a.m. & 5 p.m. on Thursday, August 16, or Friday, August 17. If students cannot be registered at this time please contact the principal's office at 854-1315 by August 15.

All new students that will be entering Baird High School should also register on these two days, August 16 and 17.

Kindergarten students who registered in May do not have to register again. If your child will be in kindergarten or first grade, a birth certificate is required at registration, also all immunizations must be updated for all school children before school begins.

Immunizations requirements for the 1979-80 school year are as follows:

1. Polio. Three doses of oral polio are required, provided one dose or a booster has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

2. Diphtheria/Tetanus/Whooping cough. At least three doses of DTP are required, provided one dose or a booster has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

3. Measles. Measles vaccine is required on or after the first birthday, or provide a history of measles illness.

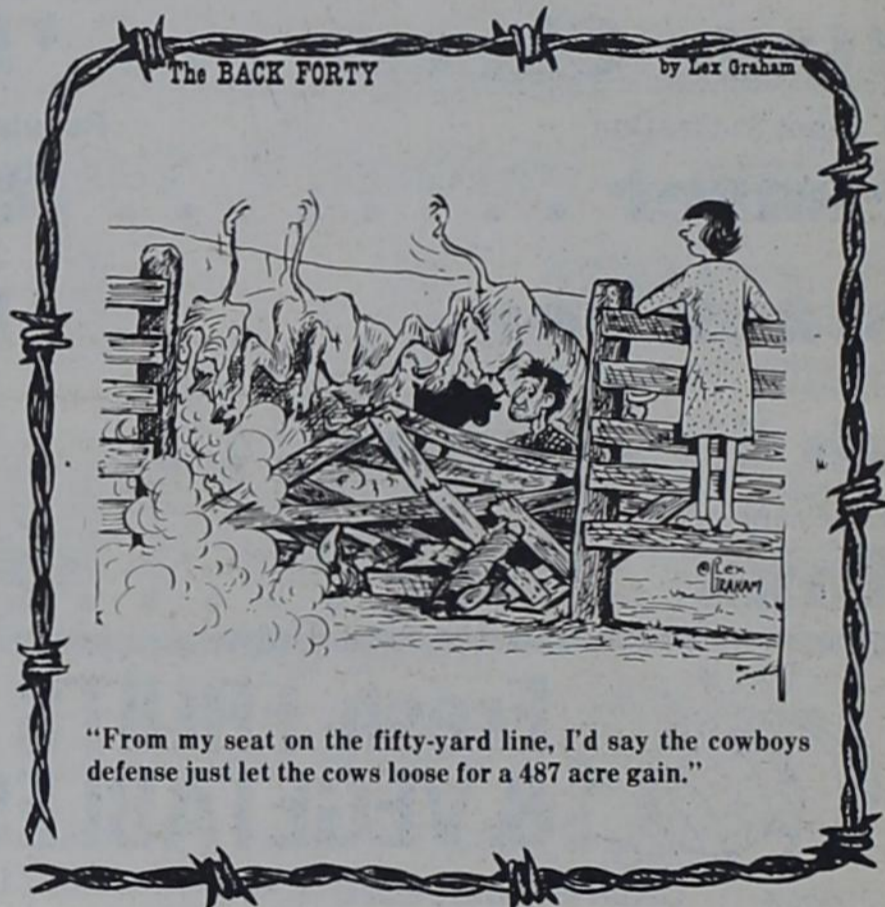
4. Mumps. Mumps vaccine will be required for all students under eight years of age. A history of mumps illness will be accepted in lieu of vaccine, if it has been validated in writing by a physician.

5. Rubella. One dose of rubella vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the twelfth birthday.

Law To Change August 27, 1979

COUNTY- Frontage road traffic on Interstate and other multi-lane highways must yield to traffic leaving or entering the main lanes. That is the new law which becomes effective August 27, 1979.

House Bill 1421, passed by the 66th Legislature and signed by the Governor on June 11, 1979, provides that frontage road traffic shall yield the right-of-way to traffic entering an on-ramp or leaving on off-ramp on controlled access highways. It also applies to rural areas where two-way frontage roads exist.

The change may cause problems on

two-way frontage roads for motorists who have grown accustomed to main lane traffic doing the yielding at exit ramps. A problem could be in store for other frontage road drivers who think vehicles about to enter the main lanes must yield.

Although the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will have new YIELD signs in place by August 27, the habits already formed will be difficult to break. Careful observance of highway signs will continue to be very important during the re-development of frontage road driving habits.

Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor:

I came to Callahan County in 1949 and after 30 years I would like to make a few observations.

I have seen the town of Baird, with some good growth potential, actually commit suicide because of a clique which thought the town should own its own electrical generating system. Thirty years ago Market Street was a beehive of activity...no vacant buildings...look at it now! New businesses would hesitate to move in for fear of an inadequate source of electrical power.

In the fifties this clique succeeded in running West Texas Utilities Company out of town and the town has been going down ever since.

Then, in the seventies, inflation and the fuel crunch reared its ugly

head. All costs skyrocketed...A referendum was held to determine if the City should sell the plant to West Texas Utilities but this same clique garnered enough votes to defeat the sale. Earlier I said Baird committed suicide...was it suicide or was the town killed by the biased thinking clique?

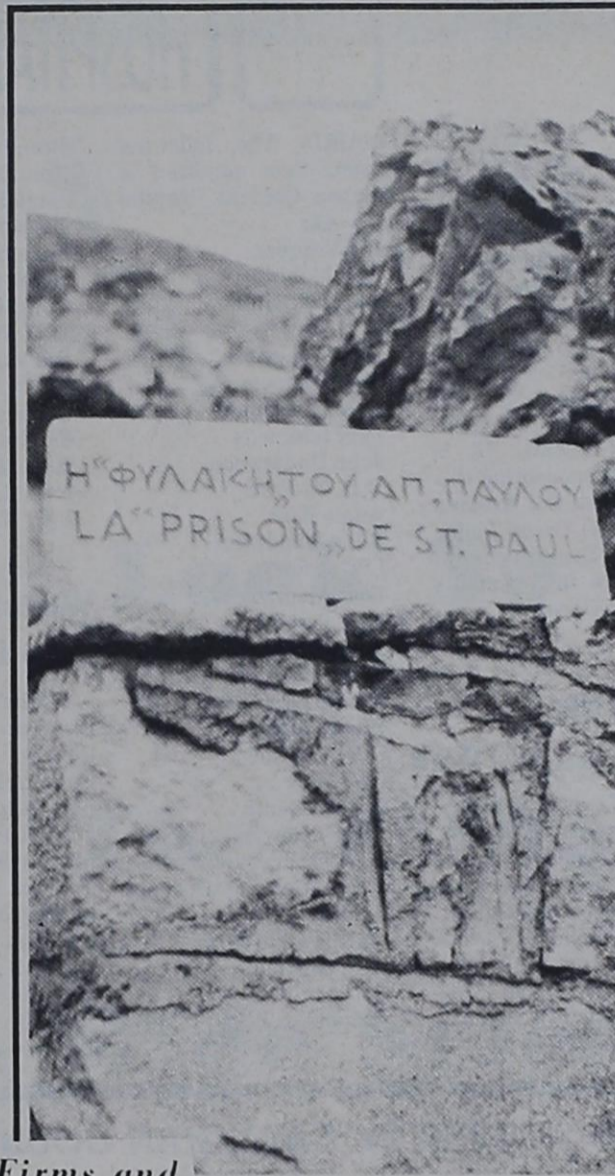


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IS THE CHURCH PART OF YOUR LIFE?

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.

Lone Star Proposes Rate Hike

COUNTY- Lone Star Gas Company filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission Wednesday seeking to increase its authorized city gate rate to \$2.21 per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas—a 15 percent increase in the city gate rate in effect December 1978.

If the request is granted, the company would realize an additional \$40.9 million in revenue annually.

"The increase is necessary," says Donald W. Williams, senior vice president of Lone Star, "because of the sharply higher costs of buying gas in the field and the increase in the general costs associated with operating any business."

The city gate rate is the amount Lone Star Transmission Division charges the company's Distribution Division for gas delivered to residential and commercial customers and for dis-

tribution company-used and unaccounted-for gas. Transmission is the segment of the company that buys, cleans, stores and delivers gas to the cities.

The increase, based on the city gate rate in effect last December, is 29 cents

per Mcf. The average residential customer's bill would increase approximately \$28 per year.

Lone Star's current city gate rate, established by the Railroad Commission in 1977 and based on a test year ending December 1975 allows Lone Star to recover only 85 percent of the increase in gas costs above \$1.1802.

As part of the application filed Wednesday, Lone Star is again requesting a 100 percent flow-through of gas purchase expense consistent with the rule-making request presently pending before the Railroad Commission. "As a result of the 85 percent flow-through restriction, Lone Star absorbed approximately \$13 million in gas costs in 1978 alone," Williams says.

The proposed rate increase will only affect residential and commercial customers.
