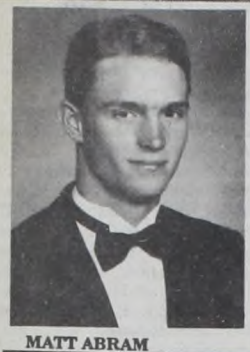

Plainview Lender Will Pay Its Customers Again In April

More than 1,300 area farmers, ranchers and rural property owners who do business with the Panhandle-Plains Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA) will find more than the usual bills and letters in the mailbox next month.

Member-stockholders of Panhandle-Plains FLBA will benefit from a \$1 million dividend distribution announced today. This dividend will reduce their interest cost by 3/4 to 1/2 percentage point depending on the rate plan they use. Checks are to be mailed to members around the first of April.

For members of the association formerly known as Caprock-Plains FLBA prior to its merger with FLBA of Amarillo and High Plains FLBA into Panhandle-Plains FLBA, the dividend check sent in April will not be the first check received from the association this year. Just under \$2.1 million was distributed to these stockholders the last of February. As part of the merger, capital of the three associations was equalized. More than 590 farmers, ranchers and rural home owners in Briscoe, Floyd,

Hale, Hall and Motley counties received checks averaging \$3,547.00 per member.

"Panhandle-Plains is pleased to return profits to association shareholders. Dividend payments are planned to be issued annually, which will lower the cost of credit for our members," said Kenneth Hooper, Sr. Vice President at the Plainview office. "This adds validity to our cooperative philosophy of providing the lowest cost credit possible to the stockholders."

Panhandle-Plains FLBA has approximately \$135 million in loans outstanding to farmers, ranchers and agribusinesses in 16 counties. Offices are located in Amarillo, Pampa, Perryton, and Plainview.

The association is under the direction of a stockholder-elected board of directors. Members include Larry E. Fairchild of Adrian; C. L. Edwards, Panhandle; Ervin J. Davis, Happy; Ronnie N. Hopper, Petersburg; Dean Turner, Matador; Jerry I. Oswalt, Abernathy; Jon "Mike" Garnett, Spearman; Dean H. Burger, Pampa; and John C. Duke, Follett.

Remember when girls wore garters to hold their cotton hose up? When in the early thirties Turkey Schools ran out of money; the teachers were given vouchers to cash later, and the children went out and pulled bolls, or picked cotton so they could buy their school clothes. The vacation was over in two months.

Quitaque boys dated mostly Turkey girls and Turkey girls mostly dated Quitaque boys. Nine miles was a long journey then, as our world was smaller then. Lewis lived five miles in the country and we'd never met till all small schools consolidated and came to Turkey High School. This circle has been broken and couples go to college and meet and marry out of state people or even out of other countries.

Flying was a big deal then, most people flew to their destination when it was an emergency, not for a business trip, attend a ball game or visit relatives.

Remember when a girl was told never to cross her legs, in a public place.

Sometimes we had to wear paste board in our shoes to keep the rain and snow out; and we all had dresses made of flour sacks, and all looked alike, and were so glad when our older sisters out-grew their clothes so we could wear them.

A lady never hugged a man outside her family, not even if she had grown up with him and had so much respect for him.

A lady never called an elderly man or woman by their first name.

Remember when your only outings out of town were to the "County Seat", meaning Memphis, and we got to eat grapes, cheese, sodas, candy and a hamburger and coke cost 5 cents.

Byron delivered the Childress Index for 15 cents a copy, riding his bicycle. Not many people could buy a magazine.

Your white clothes were your Sunday clothes, and you'd take care not to get them soiled because the rub board was work!

When all the children in our neighborhood met with their old pie tins and went to the Church of Christ tabernacle, slid off and challenged each other to jump further. The tabernacle was between Brian Wheeler's home and Gary Clinton's home. There were Browders, Cokers, Youngs, Gilmores and Reddell Irby, all within two blocks of each other.

We had four doctors in Turkey. Dr. Gilmore, Dr. Garner, Dr. Standefer and Dr. Sherman.

For our recreation, we made stilts on using tin cans with wire to pull on cans to walk. We pitched horse shoes, played marbles, jacks, had races and played paper dolls we cut from Sears or Montgomery Ward catalogs.

We had "Childrens Day" once a year at church. Each child participated in singing, quoted poems and recited biblical favorites.

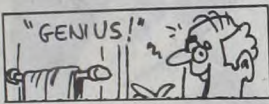
